from a sermon preached by Dr. ROY A. BURKHART in Community Church, Columbus, Ohio in 1950 How become receptive to these healing resources? Let me tell you a story. Dr. Paul Brunton was here in Columbus last spring. I spent an hour with him at the Deshler Hotel in meditation. During that hour a whole plan of receptivity to healing came to me. It was an inspiration.

At the close of our period, just as I was about to take leave, Dr. Brunton said, "You give yourself so fully but you have not learned to be receptive to the healing resources in the universe. I am going to uphold you with my thoughts. From tonight on, when you go to bed, lie on your back and open your hands and be receptive to the healing resources in the universe. They will enter your body through your hands and through your head and invade every cell of your body. If any part of your body is affected, put a hand on it.

"After your body is in tune with these healing sources, then lift up others, so that these resources can flow to them in your thoughts. Start with those closest and move outward until you have included all the children of God all over the world."

But now to return, be receptive to these healing resources with open hands and with responsive mind. To be very specific, let all of us hold up all the families who are on relief in Franklin County. Right now in Franklin County there are 5,000 people on relief. There is a deficit of \$187,000 for 1949. To meet the needs in Franklin County in 1950, \$1,570,000,000 will be needed. To provide these needs in 1950 the city of Columbus will have to provide from its resources \$323,000,000 and the County Commissioners \$100,000. Let us each night lift these needy families up in our prayers and our city and county officials. Then let us follow it up with a concentrated effort to put our thoughts into deeds by letters to the Mayor and the Commissioners.

"One of the unusual thinkers in America is Dr. Paul Brunton, who has written anumber of books. Before his departure we were fortunate enough to have a talk with Dr. Paul Brunton who has been in Denmark for sometime. Is your new book about Yoga? -- we asked." No, not directly. It is called: "The Spiritual Crisis of Man!" and is an att -empt to throw light on the background of the critical period man is now experiencing."

We believe many people here are looking forward to it. You must have found many followers in different parts of

the world, haven't you?

Brunton emphatically declared: "I have never asked anybody to become by follower, nor have Imyself, been a follower of any one person alone or any particular"system." In relation to the highest reality of our lives I have always searched only for first-hand knowledge whenever it has been possible to acquire and I have always advised other to do the same."

Yes, but have you never come across a teaching which was

"the Truth" more than all the others?

"Yes, I have done so although I have never met "the only right faith, if that is what you mean." But, I have met some persons whose aspiration, exercises, and moral endeavors brought -t them to the experience of spiritual recognition by the methods or within the boundaries of the religion to which they belonged."

Are you especially thinking of the religions of the East in this connection?

"No; People who are seeking - in different part s of the world -- have the same possibilities and can everywhere reach the True, the Good, and the Beautiful, if they put their heart in it."

Do you then repudiate the fact that the religions and the different systems of learning have any meaning for those who are in search of the deeper and more mystical knowledge?

"No, absolutely not. On the contrary, they are still important. It is a support to know that others have reached the highest goal. Without the different religions life for millions Would have faded into hopelessness. So we must not forget how much we owe those who have used their lives to create the different religions and teachings even though they may have gone ahead of us, they still are valuable sources of inspiration for those who aspire to go on the path. It is only in relation to the need of personal achievement for oneself that I consider them second-hand knowledge. And in life's real situations it is mostly the contemporaty ideas that are more likely to be put to practical use."

The highest techniques which can be useable should be found. That I have done as well as I could on the basis of what I have had the opportunity to learn both in the East and the West, as well as from my own private initiation.

- 59. My first illumination was at the age of 19 years, the second when I was about 23% or 24. I have had a number since then, of which the last occurred on the morning of December, 11th, 1949.
