PREFACE

This Third Edition of WHO'S WHO IN THE EAST—is a compilation of the Marquis-listed biographees currently of record in the Middle Atlantic and Northeastern Sections of the Marquis National Biographee Reference File, comprising the states of: Connecticut, Delaware, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, and West Virginia. Each Marquis biographical dictionary is now an appropriate segment of the File.

The Marquis National Biographee Reference File, which required several years for compilation and was not brought to full national coverage until early in 1951, is probably the most comprehensive listing of Americans, falling under carefully established selective standards for reflecting subjectivity to reference enquiry because of meritorious factors, to be attempted and maintained under constant revision. Each man or woman so recorded as a Marquis-listed biographee, has been considered by the Editors to come under the appropriate selective standards, and invited by them to supply firsthand biographical-career data for the File, and to assure these data revisionary scrutiny periodically. It follows that selection as a Marquis biographee is established by so cooperating with the Editors—after selection by them and invitation from them—in enlarging the available store of revised-to-date American biographical data, and *not* by the variable incidence of publication of individual data. As some tangible reciprocation for this essential cooperation in supplying and checking data, which is not only vital to File currency, but which can only be effectively obtained directly from them, Marquis biographees are extended substantial subscription preferences in respect to all Marquis biographical dictionaries.

Expert opinion and staff investigation confirm our Editors' experience (1) that—if selected under logical standards—biographees not within the national (or at least *inter-sectional*) scope of "Who's Who", yet noteworthy *intra-sectionally*, are subject to a significant degree of reference enquiry among writers, historians, biographers, and an appreciable number of others with specialized requirements—usually regionally (but on occasion more generally), and less frequently, than if liable to wide-spread enquiry; (2) that many not falling under the arbitrarily precise

type of general reference enquiry served by "Who's Who", are indisputably subject to specific types of inter-sectional and national—even inter-national—reference enquiry because of their professional, vocational, commercial or industrial standing in functional or "line-of-endeavor" callings; and (3) that biographers, and an appreciable number of others, on occasion require data *in respect to* "Who's Who" biographees which are not sufficiently subject to general reference enquiry to make inclusion in "Who's Who" requisite. The Marquis functional and regional biographical dictionaries are published to serve these reference uses for which "Who's Who" alone can not provide.

Since obviously the outstandingly important biographical service the Marquis regional and functional dictionaries can render is to increase the store of recorded American biography available to historians, writers, biographers, and others consulting them for specific purposes, all Marquis biographees—as specified above, those selected under Marquis standards for entry in the National Biographee Reference File who have supplied data to it which they revise down-to-date at the Editors' request—are listed, or their File data published, in part or in whole (assembled as biographies-in-brief), in every printing of a Marquis regional or functional dictionary within the geographical or activity scope of which they fall, until time-lapses make en bloc referrals to preceding editions logical. This unique method results in a greater, and more effectively selected, increase in the country's biographical store of data permanently-of-record, and distributed-for-reference-use, steadily, if gradually, accumulating, than would otherwise be feasible under the practicalities of cost and space. It also provides an "index" to far more biographees' data than has heretofore been practicable.

Each regional or functional compilation accordingly, and as arbitrarily decided by its compilers, (1) lists, or (2) sketches in condensed-to-essentials biographies in the format originated by Marquis, the Marquis biographees currently entered in the appropriate area section, or functional classification, of the National Biographee File. Thus all "Who's Who" biographees—who are of course the listings essential to the content of these compilations being either what the titles plainly represent it to be, or adequate for reason-

able service as biographical reference dictionaries in their owners' libraries or on their desks—and all the other Marquis biographees currently within the scope of each—are either listed or sketched. Arranging a group of biographies alphabetically obviously does not result in a compilation that can be truthfully represented, by way of title, title page or preface, as a dictionary of the outstanding within the scope of that title, title page, or preface, *unless* (1) at least those so markedly outstanding within that scope as to be generally considered subject to enquiry even beyond it, are included, or (2), conversely in the cases of titles, title pages, or prefaces asserting scopes restricted to world renown or similarly extremely exceptional attainments, those clearly and indisputably *not* of such achievement or position, are rigidly excluded. As a matter of fact, otherwise the result can only be simply an alphabetical arrangement of biographies of some men and women located in an area, or engaged in a common calling or profession (a directory, even, is not secured, for only "some" are involved). Certainly a number of these biographies will never have been published before—anywhere, at any time—and if title, title page and preface do not directly or by inference misrepresent that other than such a result is involved, no misrepresentation occurs, and those interested in acquiring biographies as biographies only, either of themselves, or all that get into print, become logical purchasers.

It should perhaps be specifically noted that all selected under the Marquis standards as appropriate for listing (on their making data available and checking them for currency) are of course not included in these Marquis dictionaries—as the percentage failing to provide data and revisions is predominate at regional, and certain functional, levels, those involved in that large percentage naturally can not be given entry in the National File as Marquis biographees. And all the biographees who are currently entered in the area section, or functional classification, of the National File from which an issuance of a regional or functional dictionary has been compiled, are not, as emphasized, sketched in that printing, but only those selected by compilers arbitrarily applying space, cost and other factors, and in addition, whenever in their opinion it is necessary to do so, their judgment

—admittedly fallible—of comparative exposure to reference enquiry.

The data published in this compilation include those of approximately 3,500 Marquis-listed biographees of whom biographies-in-brief have not heretofore been added to the store of American biography made permanently available through publication and circulation in Marquis biographical dictionaries. Their cooperation and participation in making that considerable addition possible merits the appreciation of all who are as a result, either presently or in the run of time, assisted—in the course of writing, research, or individual biographical interest—as directly as the Editors', which is here made of record by them. And corresponding appreciation is due those who have made available data listed as of record in published form in other Marquis dictionaries or as presently to hand unpublished in the Marquis National Biographee Reference File, for they have likewise cooperated in increasing the national store of biography reflecting the careers of the comparatively small percentage of Americans who come under carefully tested selective standards based on over half a century of specialized biographical compilative experience. This dictionary alone lists biographical records of over 9,800 identified with the region involved—in addition to the 3,500 now first-published in it—each a Marquis biographee selected under such standards.

A national store of *selective* biographical fact of the range indicated by this representation applying to groups of states, will unquestionably over the years not only provide for research of basic importance, but on occasion give vital individual service that might otherwise have been totally unobtainable. Surely all found to come under the selective standards who assist toward such ends by making individual biographical data permanently of record, do so on several sound and worthwhile grounds which will be convincingly evident from no more than passing consideration of what the present-day usefulness would be—to writers, biographers, historians, and those vitally interested for individual reasons—of a store of biographical data of carefully selected men and women typical of meritorious endeavor during America's formative years.

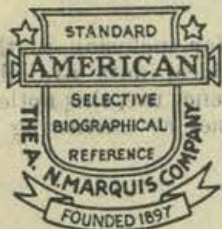

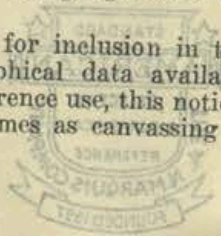
