# Camps Farthest Out for 1947

## Why the Camps Farthest Out?

The Camps Farthest Out have grown and become popular for only one reason. They make the religion of Jesus a personal and a creative experience that people can appreciate and understand. The experience so takes hold of the individual that he goes home to find himself joyously creating what Jesus so aptly termed "the Kingdom of Heaven" in the routine affairs of making a living.

This is why Glenn Clark founded the camps in the first place. He found, in his own life, that what Jesus taught was not something to be locked up in churches and hidden in books, but something that could be lived creatively every moment of each day of the year. And more than that, it would work for anyone—if given the chance.

People first began to hear of Glenn Clark when his The Soul's Sincere Desire was published in 1926. In it he described prayer in language, in laymen's words, that made his book a religious best seller for many years. Readers found that what he said was true, that his "secret" worked! Religion took on new clothing; the clothing of joy, creativity and abundance. The demand for a camp bore fruit in 1930 when a group of people in the Twin Cities made possible the first Camp Farthest Out—more on faith than on money. This was held at Lake Koronis in Minnesota.

People came to Koronis from all over the country. Soon these first campers, after meeting with others similarly interested in the new approach to Jesus' promises (actually taking Jesus at his word and acting upon it), established other camps.

Each camp is a cooperative endeavor. A group of people who believe in the reality and power of prayer meet together periodically throughout the year. At these meetings plans are made for established camps; and new camps are born.

After all, is not this the way that the first churches were born and grew? In a fellowship that was powered by the spirit of the Almighty Himself, men and women found the answer to their needs. They experienced the joy that is in life if we cooperate with the laws and purposes of God. They discovered that their own life was important, and that life had definite meaning.

So, the reason for the Camps Farthest Out is that they are experience laboratories that bring to life what Jesus taught about the Eternal. While they remain this, they will continue to grow each year, and people will continue to come to them in greater numbers each year.

#### Flash

## New Books By Camp Leaders

Four camp leaders are having books published this spring.

Glenn Clark is the author of a new book titled *The Way of Love*. In it he describes how we may bring together, and purify, all levels of love. The price is \$.35 each, or three for a dollar.

Mary Welch's new book is called *Bright Captivity*. Her theme is that when one is willingly in "captivity to Christ" one is the natural recipient of the infinite liberties and eternal freedoms which stem from God. The price is \$.50.

J. Rufus Moseley has written How To Receive The Healing of Jesus Christ. In it he lists thirteen things one can do to be healed, and he illustrates each step with examples of healing that have made use of it. The price is \$.25.

Agnes Sanford's book, The Healing Light, is concerned with the art and method of Christian spiritual healing. She explains the basis of all healing, and describes the techniques and spiritual conditioning which makes healing possible. The Healing Light will be published on May 1st, and will cost \$2.00.

Harper and Brothers, New York, are bringing out a revised and enlarged edition of Mr. Moseley's Manifest Victory this spring.

## The Camp Program

The details of each local camp program will differ from others. Local conditions, needs, interests and emphasis demand methods suitable for satisfying them.

However, there is a general program which has grown up, and which is considered the framework for the local program. The basic program is as follows:

7:00—Meditation. The early morning meditation under skillful leaders sets the tone for the whole day.

7:30-Breakfast.

9:00—Spiritual Orchestration. This is the main spoken message of the day. It is given by the main camp leader, or the co-leader. Expositions on spiritual laws and the principles of Jesus.

10:00—Creative Rhythm. A unique method that makes use of exercise on the one hand, and consciously making the body sensitive to the completeness of Spirit on the other hand.

11:00—Creative Painting and Writing. Adventures in freedom and in self-discovery.

12:30-Dinner.

1:30-Rest Period.

2:30—Recreation. Individual and group recreation as one desires.

4:00—Forum Hour. Talks which emphasize ways in which we can express our discoveries in daily living.

5:00—Prayer Laboratories. Experienced leaders direct small groups in communion with God. The art and methods of creative prayer are discussed. Prayer participation is encouraged.

6:00-Supper.

7:30—Evening Song. Praising God through song, as the evening shadows begin to lengthen, fills the heart with spiritual expectancy.

8:00—Galilean Hour. A spiritual message from one of the leaders. With mind, spirit and body relaxed and at rest, this is a meeting of high peaks and deep insights.

## Registering for Camp

Some people had the unfortunate experience last summer of not registering for a camp until the last minute. Unfortunate because most camps were filled long before camp time arrived.

Some camps have a definite limit on the number they can adequately serve—both spiritually and physically.

If you wish to be sure of having a place at any camp, REGISTER EARLY. Applications are accepted in the order they arrive.

The registration fee is credited to your account.

# The Star Island Camp

For the first time, since before the war, Star Island off the coast of Portsmouth, New Hampshire, is open for camping purposes. This location was one of the most popular before the war.

The Star Island camp this year is going to be for advanced campers ready to give time and much prayer and meditation for world needs. The usual camp program will not be followed. So unless you are interested to give your time and energy to this type of a camp, choose one more in line with your interests.


