



Dear Mr. Hurst.

My mother and I were deeply touched to receive your letter about the passing of Paul Brunton. It was most kind of you to have informed us. Although we never met on the outer planes, he has been a guru to us through his books, and through letters, since 1953. He has been a great teacher to many thousands throughout the world, through the many languages in which his works have been translated. His was a truly great spiritual mission of a unique kind, going from the west to the east, and bringing back and reinterpreting the highest wisdom in a way that was not only truly inspired, but designed to help each individual soul who read his works. Particular favourites of ours are The Inner Reality (which I had with me throughout my world wide travels) and The Quest of the Overself. We have all his books, of course. Following the Mystic Path under his guidance, has been the true Way Home.

Many sincere and devout followers of many religious paths may pray, and try to ascend in spiritual consciousness, but how can one come into the Presence when the mind is like a merrygoround? Paul Brunton has shown us how, given us simple but wise and the most profound counsel. ## **English Wills and Trusts in** Switzerland

by Michael Brandon, an English Barrister resident near Geneva, Switzerland

The purpose of this article is to examine certain problems of English wills and trusts in relation to U.K. citizens resident and domiciled in Switzerland.1

Firstly, certain foreigners considered resident and domiciled in Switzerland under Swiss law, including U.K. citizens, are in a privileged position insofar as will-making is concerned.2 Thus, the Federal Law of 25th June, 1891 on Civil Law Relations of Citizens Established or Residing in Switze land which permits under Article 22, para 2, a Swiss to declare that his will shall be governed by the law of his Canton of origin, allows by Article 32 such a declaration to apply by analogy to foreigners domiciled in Switzerland. This means in effect that nationals of countries which have not concluded treaties on the subject with Switzerland - and those which have concluded such treaties (the United States being one) are excluded under Article 28 of the Law of June 1891 - may make a "professio juris" in favour of their own national law. This is the position of U.K. citizens.

It is open to a U.K. citizen to make a will under Swiss law. However, whereas Swiss law imposes considerable restrictions on testamentary freedom, there are no restrictions as such under English law and the present legislation which is the Inheritance (Provision for Family and Dependants) Act, 1975, and which applies where the death occurs on or after 1st April, 1976, is based upon a discretionary system whereby a surviving spouse or other person entitled to apply must persuade the Court that the deceased failed to make "reasonable financial provision" for him or her. However, under this Act it is essential to establish that the deceased died domiciled in England and Wales. It is therefore of no concern to an English person domiciled according to English law in Switzerland who may exercise the abovementioned right to make his will under English law without regard to the 1975 Act.

The question therefore arises as to the extent of the testamentary freedom available to an English person domiciled in Switzerland and making an English will. Since neither the Swiss restrictions nor the English family provision legislation apply to such a case and since the "professio juris" will extend to both movables and

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immovables the testator can in theory leave all his assets to an old dogs' home. However, it has been suggested by Swiss writers in this field that in a case where a spouse or minor children were left destitute as a result of their being excluded from such a will, considerations of "ordre public" or "contre bonnes moeurs" could apply or alternatively that if the spouse sought relief in a Swiss Court, the latter applying Swiss private international law rules would look to English law to determine what would have happened had the testator died domiciled in England. This would mean applying the Act of 1975 whereby the spouse or child would be able to seek "reasonable financial provision".

Normally a "Swiss domicile clause" is the first clause to be included by an English testator domiciled in Switzerland in his will. This clause contains a declaration that he has taken up and acquired permanent residence and domicile in Switzerland, where he intends to spend the rest of his life and now regards as his permanent home and that he has abandoned his domicile of origin in one of the countries of the United Kingdom and has no intention of taking up residence again there. It should be noted, however, that such declarations of intention are only one element in the determination of such a testator's domicile and their evidentiary weight will vary from case to case. 4 The striking difference between the rates of Capital Transfer Tax (CTT) in the U.K. and Swiss Cantonal and Communal Succession Duty rates is usually the reason for these declarations. 5

It is advisable, if possible, that a U.K. citizen having acquired a domicile of choice in Switzerland and having made an English will should arrange his affairs so as to leave no assets at the date of his death in the U.K. This then avoids the need for any application for a grant of probate or administration6 in order to deal with any such assets and consequently also avoids the usual enquiry instigated by the Board of Inland Revenue, Under the Convention between the U.K. and Switzerland for Relief from Double Taxation with respect to Taxes on the Estates of Deceased Persons of June 1956 certain situs rules now applicable to CTT are laid down. It is provided, inter alia, that moneys payable under a policy of assurance or insurance shall be deemed to be situated at the place where the deceased person was domiciled at the time of his death. Moreover, Section 19 of the Revenue Act of 1889 enables moneys under such a policy to be paid out without production of a U.K. grant where the policy has been effected by a person who dies domiciled outside the U.K.7

With regard to U.K. citizens domiciled in Switzerland making an English will after their establishment in Switzerland, it is normal practice to include a phrase whereby the testator directs that his will be construed and take effect in accordance with the law of England. With regard to U.K. citizens who have drawn up English wills prior to leaving England, it is possible naturally for them after their establishment in Switzerland to add a codicil to the will explicitly directing that it be construed and take effect in accordance with English law. However, this is not absolutely necessary for under the rules of English private international law "a will is to be interpreted in accordance with the law intended by the testator. In the absence of indications to the contrary, the spresumed to be the law of his domicile at the time when the will is made".9

It is not unusual for a U.K. citizen dom ciled in Switzerland to make two independent wills: one in the Swiss form, handwritten and without witnesses, applying to assets situated in Switzerland, and the other in the English form, 10 with two witnesses and provision for an executor, applying to assets outside Switzerland. Normally, "the personal representative taking out a grant [in England] is required to file an affidavit exhibiting a copy of the foreign will and a note drawing attention to the affidavit is made on the probate".11

With regard to the position of executors, there are notable differences between English law, on the one hand, and Swiss law and other civil law countries, on the other. Whereas under the former the estate of the deceased under a will vests in the executors from the moment of the testator's death, it vests, under Swiss law, in the beneficiaries.

It is interesting to note that the Convention Providing a Uniform Law on the Form of an International Will done at Washington, D.C. in October 1973 will enter into force on 9th February, 1978 following the deposit of the fifth Instrument of Accession. The five States which had acceded to the Convention as at 9th August, 1977 were: Canada (for Manitoba and Newfoundland), Libya, Portugal, Niger and Yugoslavia. The Convention provides that an "international will" shall be made in writing in any language, by hand or by any other means, but need not be written by the testator. The latter is required to declare in the presence of two witnesses and of a person authorized to act in connection with "international wills" that the document is his will and that he knows the contents thereof. The testator is required to sign the will in the presence of the witnesses and of the authorized person.

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Whereas under English law in dealing with pure personal property the executors have several authority so that acts by one executor bind the other, 12 under Swiss law executors can only act jointly. Again executors are not entitled to be remunerated for their services under English law in the absence of express directions in the will. 13 In contrast, executors under Swiss law are entitled to a reasonable fee.

The question arises of what law governs the administration by executors appointed under an English will of an estate situated in Switzerland of an English person dying domiciled in Switzerland. With regard to the exercise of their functions relating to the administration by the executors, English law will look to Swiss law.

English law having looked to Swiss law to govern the administration by the executors, this reference is said to be acceptable having regard to the following position under Swiss law according to Swiss legal authority. Where a foreign national resident in Switzerland takes advantage of the Federal Law of 1891 and makes a will under his own national law the rights of succession properly so-called are governed by the law of the foreigner's nationality. But the testamentary execution thereof is governed by Swiss law. The functions of the executors are based upon a fundamental contractual relationship under Swiss law and are totally independent of the foreign law governing the succession.

To be distinguished from the administration, <sup>15</sup> however, are the matters of the designation of the beneficiaries and the distribution of the assets and directly related questions, <sup>16</sup> which matters are governed by English law. Within the latter category falls a deed of indemnity which may be validly required by executors under English law from beneficiaries in numerous instances to cover them against liability, for example, in respect of transactions which may constitute breaches of duties of some kind owed by the executors, or in respect of unforeseeable liabilities arising from transactions done in relation to the assets. The fact, therefore, that such a deed is unknown to Swiss law would appear irrelevant.

More difficult problems may arise when a trust is created under the English will of a testator who has died domiciled in Switzerland. Since it is not possible under Swiss law to form a trust as such, a Swiss writer approaches this problem by saying that the wishes of the testator must be construed and given affect to within the possibilities of the Swiss legal framework. This is regarded as being a case of

The suggestion has been made that the concept of tes execution with prolonged administration is the answer. <sup>18</sup>

The absence in Swiss law of the trust concept does not facilitate the "e of an existing English trust to Switzerland. Nevertheless, the end resi achieved by other means.

Assume an English settlement, created by a settlor domiciled in English, time, the life tenant and adult remaindermen, the class being closed, resident and domiciled outside the United Kingdom and enjoying no status for exchange control purposes. 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The life tenant in the present example, as a resident of Switzerland, would thus become in due course a trustee of a non-resident Guernsey trust.

Suppose in the aforementioned example that only the life tenant were resident and domiciled in Switzerland, that the adult remaindermen were domiciled and resident in the U.K., that the trustees were the life tenant and two resident trustees and that the trust funds were not in exempt gilts but invested in other securities on which gains had been made. The question would arise how far could the Swiss resident proceed in "exporting" the trust. The residence in the U.K. of the remaindermen would prevent an actual transfer of the trust funds outside the U.K. as in the previous example. The question therefore of changing the proper law of the trust would not arise.

Assume it became necessary and desirable from an investment standpoint to make sales of some of the holdings in the trust. Liability for U.K. Capital Gains Tax (CGT) on gains realized upon such disposals of assets would arise. However, no such liability would arise, even on disposals of assets in the U.K., if a majority of the trustees were resident outside the U.K. and the administration of the trust twere carried on outside the U.K. Under Section 42 of the Finance Act, 1965 there twould be in this event a charge upon the remaindermen as being domiciled and resident or ordinarily resident in the U.K. on a proportionate part of the gains of which the trustees had they been domiciled and resident in the U.K. would thave been chargeable.

There would be benefits both for the life tenant and for the remaindermen were ione of the existing U.K. resident trustees to retire and appoint a trustee resident outside the U.K. and preferably in a country where the courts would be able to enforce the rights of the beneficiaries.

An existing trustee under an English settlement has power under Section 36 of the Trustee Act, 1925, to retire and appoint in his place another trustee. The terms of this Section do not preclude the appointment of a non-resident trustee. The exercise of this statutory power can be made without the intervention of the Court in circumstances in which the Court itself would make such an appointment. Where mout of Court appointment is made which would not have been made by the tourt itself, such appointment is voidable but not void. However, the appointment would only be voidable at the instance of the beneficiaries. <sup>20</sup> If the appointment he appointment.

Although the Board of Inland Revenue would have no standing to apply to upset an appointment, it would be necessary for all the beneficiaries to provide the thiring trustee with personal covenants against any possible invalidity of the

appointment and against any possible CC-1 liability in respect of future disposals secured by charges on their respective beneficial interests.

The disadvantage of this solution is that there would be CTT liability upon the death of the life tenant unless the trust funds at that date were invested in exempt gilts. However, one cannot have everything in life, and U.K. citizens established in Switzerland should rest content with the thought that it is "the envy of less happier lands". 21





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#### A PERSONAL NOTE.

Dr. Paul Brunton died July 27, 1981, in Vevey, Switzerland. Born in London in 1898, he authored thirteen books from "A Search in Secret India" published in 1934 to "The Spiritual Crisis of Man" in 1952. Dr. Brunton is generally recognized as having introduced yoga and meditation to the West, and for presenting their philosophical background in non-technical language.

His mode of writing was to jot down paragraphs as inspiration occurred. Often these were penned on the backs of envelopes or along margins of newspapers as he strolled amid the flower gardens bordering Lac Leman. They later were typed and classified by subject. He then would edit and meld

these paragraphs into a coherent narrative.

Paul Brunton had lived in Switzerland for twenty years. He liked the mild climate and majestic mountain scenery. Visitors and correspondence came from all over the world. He played

an important role in the lives of many.

"P.B.", as he is known to his followers, was a gentle man. An aura of kindliness emanated from him. His scholarly learning was forged in the crucible of life. His spirituality shone forth like a beacon. But he discouraged attempts to form a cult around him: "You must find your own P.B. within yourselves," he used to say.

Paul Brunton, the author of 13 books on Oriental philosophy, died in the Good Samaritan Hospital in Vevey, Switzerland, on July 27. He was 82 years old and lived in Vevey.

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

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

I felt so fortunate to reach you this morning to express my sympathy, and to talk to you at length about your father. Since I was first led to his teachings 16 years ago, Paul Brunton has been probably the most inspiring and influential person in my life. Hardly a day has passed when I have not read from at least one of his books or from the copious notes which I have made from them. The two great texts, "The Hidden Teaching Beyond Yoga" and "The Wisdom of the Overself" include enough material to take a person years to assimilate, but I have found the study not only compelling reading but fascinating and profitable as well. The concept, for instance, that space is in the mind interested me enormously and led to my first encounter with Bishop Berkeley. And again, the fact that Schopenhauer was influenced by The Upanishads which I had read, led me to my first readings of his.

The profound ideas expounded in "The Spiritual Crises of Man" have helped me add balance to my life and have gradually given me insight into the necessary role played by good and evil particularly - and the answers to my own paraplegia. Paul Brunton had a rare gift and wrote in a direct, uncomplicated manner. In 1975, his teachings culminated in a first-hand experience for me which verified the truth as he taught it. In time, this helped me see life from a more detached and long-range viewpoint. In short, your father's books made my homebound years more balanced and worthwhile. I feel fortunate, too, that I had reached a point where I could absorb the teachings.

It is marvellous to hear about the Center in Valois, New York. This interests me a great deal and I hope to see it one day soon. The fact that your father left many notebooks filled with writings is exciting to anticipate.

I hesitate to invade your privacy but I do hope that sometime we can meet - perhaps for lunch in Englewood Cliffs. It would be an easy drive from Short Hills. Specifically, I would love to hear what early interests led your father to the mystical life (my own interest stems from teachings from my grandfather), something about your father's life in India, the role he played there in World War II, as well as where he took courses which led to his doctorate. As an ex-publishing man, I would naturally be interested in the books which have sold the best. I am aware, however, that the facts which peak my curiosity should not obscure the more important matter: namely, the works of the man, himself.

My deepest sympathy to you and your family. Paul Brunton was a rare soul and his contribution to the world is assured.



Dr. Paul Brunton died on July 27, 1981, following a cerebral hemorrhage.

Dr. Brunton, whose books are known in many countries, was born in London in 1898. Following a successful career in journalism, he decided to devote himself completely to his interest in comparative religion, mysticism and philosophy. He traveled extensively in the Orient living among Yogis, Mystics and Holy Men.

He introduced Sri Ramana Maharshi to the West in his book "A Search in Secret India" published in 1935. He had spent several months at the Ramanasramam. His next book "The Secret Path" outlined the Maharshi's "who am I" technique of self enquiry.

His subsequent works included "A Message From Arunachala",
"A Search in Secret Egypt", "A Hermit in the Himalayas",
"Indian Philosophy and Modern Culture", "The Hidden
Teaching Beyond Yoga", "The Wisdom of the Overself", and "The
Spiritual Crisis of Man".



Taken in the spirit of Advaita (non-duality) we shall not regard


his physical end as a loss because `he' is absorbed into the Plenary

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



To a Continuer of Mr. Brunton's Divine Work:

In a recent telephone conversation, Don Weiser kindly agreed to forward this letter to the appropriate person. You are he.

This Summer I read several books of Mr. Brunton. I was very inspired by them. They also gave me a lot of very practical and valuable techniques which although I have studied Yoga for many years, were very Right for me.

I determined to find out if Mr. Brunton was still in the physical body. I was very disappointed (grieved) to find out he had passed away so recently. Yet I accept there is a reason for my "timing."

I had wanted to receive Paul Brunton's darshan and to learn from him what he would not teach in books (so far as I am ready). If appropriate, I make this same request of you. I've included a short "biography" of my spiritual life thus far so you will understand me better. If you can provide more Light on the path please do write or phone.

#### Odd-y-ssey

I started practicing hatha yoga asanas and became a Vegetarian in 1968. We were living in Chadron, Nebraska ("The Beef State) where I was teaching American literature at a small college. While in Chadron, I saw a Village Voice advertisement for the records of a Swami Radha of Kootenay Bay, British Columbia. We sent for the records on "Mantras" and "Guided Relaxation," and found them very valuable.

My wife Carla and I went to visit the Ashram in 1970. Our intention was to spend a few weeks of the Summer and then go on to a TM Teacher Training Course. We were persuaded by Swami Radha not to go and ended staying at the Ashram a little over 4 years.

At the Ashram, the main things I learned how to do was work. I coordinated the educational program, did the bookkeeping, managed the bookstore, taught in the yoga-teacher training course. The main theme of the period was ceaseless (as opposed to selfless) service. We left in 1974 with me at least seeing Swami Radha as an igneus fatui, a flase light posing as "guru" to those willing to cede her that power.

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We left the Ashram with \$1,250 approximately half of which was in silver coins which would hold their value in time of economic crisis. We went to Cranbrook, a town of about 10,000 150 miles from the Ashram. There I worked briefly for a Prefab Home manufacturer as a field accountant. We moved when my wife was hired by Selkirk College as a counsellor and after several months of searching I ended up managing a building supply firm in Castlegar, B.C.

During this period of time I felt quite spiritually adrift. Although I intellectually knew better, I tended to distrust Yoga and yogis. A lady named Ellafern Pindexter (MataAtmananda) (who has an Ashram in Thunder Bay, Ontario) visited with us in Castlegar and left a copy of Joel Goldsmith's the Mystical I in 1975. For several years Joel was my main source of spiritual nourishment. If you have not read his writings, he and Paul Brunton are on a very similiar band of consciousness, although Joel's works seem as if they had prepared me for Paul's writings.

For the past several years I've tuaght in the business department at Mount Royal College in Calgary, an oil-head-office city of about 600,000 in Western Canada. Recently I became chairman of the department. In the midst of a hectic schedule I am trying to demand spiritual practice and remember my true purposes.

That's my story. I would appreciate any help in any form you can give.

Dear Kenneth:

Your touching letter describing the passing over of your beloved father on July 27th was read with immeasurable sadness upon my return to Worcester on August 12th. I was in Palo Alto celebrating my father's 80th birthday on July 26th at the time of PB's transition. When mu father had a thyroidectomy on May 1st, he told me to bring his two notebooks of translations on Chou Tun-Yi, the 11th century sage much admired by PB. My father undertook these translations in 1973 after PB showed me his tankas of this great Neo-Confucian sage. I know that my father's absorption of these philosophical works rejuvenated his health and refreshed his spirit. I had hoped to show PB my father's completed translations which he expressed much interest, and I am saddened it will not come to pass.

I was invited to the US-Japan "Protein Structure" Symposium at Cornell University (Aug. 17-21). It was my first return to Ithaca since April 1973, so I had a chance to visit Anthony in Valois after the scientific meetings. Oh how Wisdom's Goldenrod has grown and blossomed! stayed there until August 30th drinking nectars of wisdom from the philosophical discussions, the beautiful library, and reading PB's notebooks. PB has been and is most dear to me ever since Anthony introduced me to his books in 1968. I went to Europe four times, and spent my last days there with PB on all four occasions. How miraculous indeed! Those 14 days in his presence are deeply etched in my soul and are the most joyful moments of my life. After our first meeting in Montreux (August 1972), PB inspired me so much that I began to apply his philosophical principles more diligently to my scientific research. My laboratory at Brandeis University's Biochemistry Department became my garden of contemplation. My scientific studies bore fruits, and my papers on "Protein Conformational Prediction" (1974) achieved international acclaim as one of the most cited biochemistry papers of the last decade. Thus, each time I was invited to Europe for biochemical conferences (1976, 1978-79), PB welcomed me to see him. I was always nourished by his generous kindness, compassionate wisdom, and peaceful grace. PB was indeed my spiritual father and Teacher.

The Chinese sage Mencius said: "One who is virtuous and commands our liking is called a good man. He who is sincere with himself is called a true man. He whose goodness is full is called a beautiful man. He whose perfect goodness is brilliantly displayed is called a great man. this great man exercises a transforming influence, he is called a sage. When the sage is beyond our knowledge, he is called a man of the spirit." PB was indeed a sage of the spirit. After having met PB, I was moved to tears for I knew that sages like Buddha and Christ have walked on this earth. Every moment with PB has been a learning experience for my soul. Oh, how he has nourished my body, clarified my mind, purified my heart, and illuminated my soul. I am forever thankful to PB for his inspiration which enabled me to do beautiful work in science and to blossom in poetic verse. I'm enclosing some of my poems inspired by my meetings with PB for your reading pleasure. In his Wisdom of the Overself, PB dedicated the book fraternally to "those sincere pioneers of a nobler epoch whose deep need and silent thoughts called forth this work." In the silence of my soul, I have promised PB that I will dedicate my life to keep my mind in purity and my heart in sincerity so that I may carry on the sacred work which he has so nobly advanced.





Thank you for your letter of August 25. I am, as surely the many people who love Paul Brunton are, disappointed that a biography of his life is not comtemplated at the present time. It is more than likely that by the time any posthumous books come out that I, myself, may know the answers to perplexing questions. At least I hope so.

Well, this is the day that I should have been airborne to Hong Kong. But my plans for further travel, at least for the time being, had to be cancelledowing to circumstances over which I had no control.

I have thought a lot about the last sentence in your letter: "This is a difficult period for all his students, but the work will continue. . . " I find myself in the confusing situation of knowing so little about the person, who, as I have said, has so great an influence in my life, in that although his philosophy sank deeply into my mind, I have never known where or what he was doing apart from writing his books. Are his lectures and teachings those of the various paths of Yoga, or the teachings of Ramana?

The reason for my ignorance about his life lies in the fact that our medical life was spent in many countries, often in wild places among primitive peoples.

In April I received a communication from Switzerland - I had sent a letter to Paul Brunton c/o his publishers in London - on one side was the printed notice informing me of his enforced retirement owing to advanced age. On the other I read:

Thank you, dear Mrs Dymond, for sending me THREADS OF CIRCUMSTANCE. I read it with interest, as also your letter about Calcutta, and noted its sincerity. To be a follower of the Way, with all that it requires from us, gives a great meaning and inner adventure to life. Regrettably, this letter had to be written for me because of my operation and subsequent illnesses, but I have, however, signed my name to this myself. I have found a meaure of peace of Mind, and I wish you the same. Toward Highest Good





### A M HUTTON MRCS, LRCP, FFARCS, DA

Dr A M Hutton, who was consultant anaesthetist emeritus to Guy's Hospital, London, died peacefully at his home on 17 November, just six weeks after the day that he had planned to retire. He was 64.

Andrew Michael Hutton, who was born on 11 April 1916, entered Guy's Hospital from St

Paul's School, London, with the intention of obtaining a dual qualification in medicine and dentistry, but soon decided to concentrate on medicine, in which he qualified in 1938. Michael Hutton completed house appointments in medicine and surat Guy's



before the outbreak of war, when he worked for a short period in the Emergency Medical Service before joining the Royal Army Medical Corps. Most of his war service was spent in the Far East, during which time he became a recognised specialist in anaesthetics with the rank of major and was mentioned in dispatches for distinguished service in Java.

Early in 1946 Hutton returned to Guy's as resident anaesthetist before being appointed to one of the first research fellowships awarded by the Association of Anaesthetists of Great Britain and Ireland. This research work made a valuable contribution to the use of trichlorethylene as an analgesic in obstetrics. During this period he also played an active part with the late Dr E H Rink in providing an anaesthetic service for Mr Russell Brock (as he then was), who had started his pioneer work in cardiac surgery. Hutton was appointed consultant anaesthetist to Guy's Hospital shortly after the advent of the National Health Service and worked with Lord Brock until the latter retired from clinical work. It is a measure of Hutton's ability as an anaesthet st that Brock, who never accepted anything but the best, held him in the highest esteem.

Essentially Michael Hutton was a clinical anaesthetist who took his work very seriously indeed: nothing was left to chance and, when preparing to give an anaesthetic, every conceivable problem was considered and a plan thought out to meet it, and ample time allowed for preparation. He was a kind and gentle person with genuine sympathy for his patients, qualities which made him an outstanding clinician and teacher of anaesthetics. In 1963 Hutton was appointed director of the depart-

ment of anaesthetics, a post that he held for almost 12 years, during which he built up the department to provide, firstly, an efficient service for the hospital and, secondly, to establish an academic unit. His efforts culminated in the establishment of a professorial chair shortly after he retired.

Michael Hutton was devoted to his family, and the achievements of his children in their different professions gave him considerable pride and pleasure. He had a natural talent for music and enjoyed his social life to the full, and he is survived by his wife Enid and their three children. Their son Peter also qualified at Guy's and is now a senior registrar in orthopaedic surgery.—PJH.

#### E C DYMOND

BSC, MRCS, LRCP, LMSSA, DPH

Dr E C Dymond, whose professional life was spent in various parts of the world, mainly the Far East, died on 23 November at the age of 78.

Elmslie Chalmers Dymond was born in the Yunnan province of China, where his parents were Methodist missionaries. Jimmy, as he was affectionately known, received his early education at Plymouth Hoe Grammar School, and from there went to Bristol University to take his BSc. Soon after qualifying in 1930 at St Mary's Hospital Medical School, London, he had the urge to return to China, where he was put in charge of the British Hospital on Nantai Island; he was also port health doctor and attended the British Consulate staff. After a brief stay in South Africa in 1933, he returned once more to China and settled in practice in Foochow until he and his wife had to leave in 1938 because of the Sino-Japanese war. After this he served as senior medical officer for petroleum companies in various parts of the world.

Jimmy Dymond was keenly interested in medical missionary work and served as a physician, surgeon, and hospital administrator in mission posts in Basutoland, Nyasaland, and St Joseph's Clinic, Mandeville, Jamaica. His wife Ruby, a nurse, had also trained at St Mary's and she helped him as nurse, chaperon, and dispenser. After taking his diploma in public health at Liverpool in 1946 he worked as medical officer of health under Colonial Office contracts in Nyasaland, Northern Rhodesia, Trinidad, and Jamaica. His work as an MOH prompted his interest and sympathy for coloured people, whom he thought were treated as underdogs in the communities in which he worked, and this sympathy inspired him to take up medical missionary work. Never keen on private practice, Jimmy always hated having to think of money when examining ill patients-one reason why he liked to work under contract.

Dymond loved life at sea and towards the end of his career he served as ship's doctor with the British India Steam Navigation Company in their vessel Sir Lancelot, which was based on Singapore, and in Uganda and Nevessa, ending his seafaring in SS Aureol. His wish was that his ashes should be scattered at sea off the coast of Barmouth, North Wales, where he eventually retired—apart, that is, from undertaking the occasional locum.

Jimmy's only hobby was painting, especially in the Chinese style on silk scrolls. At the age of 14 he gained all of the Royal Drawing Society's six certificates with distinction. He joined the Press Art School and received their diploma in 1960; in his youth he wished to

take up art, but was dissuaded and took up medicine instead. His silk paintings have been sold abroad as well as in Britain. No mean athlete, Jimmy played rugby for Bristol University and St Mary's Hospital, gaining his cap for England, and he boxed for St Mary's as well as being an amateur boxing champion who boxed in the Royal Albert Hall. A noted American boxing promoter tried to persuade him to become a professional in the States, but in the absence of his parents in China his uncle forbade the venture. Swimming was another sport that gained him cups and medals, especially for high diving. His golf handicap was two.

Dr Dymond was a man of parts with a wry and subtle sense of humour, and was always good company. He became a convert to Roman Catholicism in Trinidad in 1945, but never discussed his faith. He served his generation nobly and always strove to alleviate suffering, especially in the underdeveloped countries. He is survived by his wife and daughter.—IMW.

## J P MOREHAN



Dr J P Morehan, who was a consultant physician and clinical lecturer at University College, Cork, died at his home in Cork on 8 August. He was 75.

James Patrick Morehan matriculated from the College of the Presentation Brothers, Cork, and later pursued a distinguished medical career in the medical faculty of University College, Cork. After graduating in 1928 he spent some time in hospital medicine, firstly in Wales and later in St Finbarr's Hospital, Cork. Within a short time of completing his hospital intern years James P Morehan began medical practice in Cork and was appointed as a consultant physician to the Bon Secours Hospital and the South Charitable Infirmary. His true métier was soon apparent as he became an outstanding and dedicated teacher in all aspects of clinical medicine. As a result, his ward classes were highly popular and many generations of graduates remember with gratitude his emphasis on scrupulous clinical assessment and his brilliance as a diagnostician. His outstanding talents as a teacher were recognised by his appointment as clinical lecturer in medicine in the medical faculty at Cork.

James P was invariably kind and gentle and listened to his patients' complaints with compassion and understanding, and was unsparing in his efforts on their behalf. In addition, he always treated the nursing staff with respect and was a fair and friendly examiner in the nursing examinations. Despite his hospital work load he played an active part in the local branch of the Irish Medical Association, being a valued member of the Council for several years and a faithful member to the end.

J P Morehan was a large person, both physically and mentally, but withal a modest man with total honesty and integrity of purpose and an all-pervading love of his fellow creatures. He was a lifelong and much loved member of various clubs, including Sunday's Well Tennis and Boating Club, the Cork Golf Club, the Cork and County Club, and he was one of the founder members of the Kinsale Golf Club. Inevitably he was honoured with the presidency of the Past Pupils' Union of his alma mater and renowned rugby school, Presenta-



I understand that you do a bit of traveling and if you are ever in India, I am enclosing a postcard of a newly built center for persons visiting to stay in — to tempt you to visit us, and of course Meher Baba's tomb and the many close disciples who are still living here. Hundreds of people from America, England and Australia visit each year.

I am also enclosing an aerogram for your convenience in replying.

Thank you for informing me of the death of Paul Brunton.

I visited him last June on a sudden impulse, having not seen him since 1973. I realized then that it was not mere chance which prompted my visit. The time spent together was like a blessing and a leave-taking. As you said in your letter "P.B. will live on in the hearts of all who love him." For me, he was the perfect



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

It is very difficult, nay impossible to express oneself in words. Those who are in the realm of duality and never tasted the eternity will not understand what I am trying to say. They will think that we are eulogising a Personality. But those who ever aspired for the Person sometimes that Person manifests through a personality for our overall satisfaction, so that we may apprehend that even through our sense organs and thus divinise all of them. This is the meaning of transformation (what is much talked in the Aurobindo Philosophy) as I understand. But whether this can happen in a mass-scale, I have a doubt because the ripeness of the individual can not be excluded.
