Your two letters dated November 20th. and 24th. were safely received by me, Tony, and I have already answered them mentally.

Thank you for the typewriter which was received in good order. Since you insist on my accepting it as a gift from your wife and yourself, I shall be pleased to do so. However, I accept it only on the condition that in turn you and your wife accept the Christmas gift which I shall mail you in the near future.

The book by Hyam entitled "Wisdom with Power" is one which I already possess among my own books. I have been in touch with the author over a number of years, and therefore there is no need for you to do anything in this matter.

The services you rendered me at Harmon were most warmly appreciated and your labours were of great assistance. I also appreciate your offer to render similar service again, but at the present time there is no opportunity for me to avail myself of your offer -- and next May I am hoping to visit Europe for the summer.

I do not find Tucson and Arizona quite suitable for my purposes owing to the extremely high cost of living; most foodstuffs have to be imported from Los Angeles and Mexico and the variety and quality of the food is none too agreeable. Probably I will try California for residence next winter on my return from Europe.

The fluctuating moods through which you pass are common to many aspirants. According to your generous offer, I have relieved Romaine of the work of picking up Box 34 mail, as it is becoming difficult for her. I plan to close down the use of this box altogether on December 31st this year. Please let me know whether it is possible for you to attend to it until then.

It need be cleared once a week only; if however at anytime you are under pressure and cant make it, that wont matter if the clearance is ten days or so after the previous one.

I expect to remain here in Chicago until some time in July but anyway please continue to forward mail to the above address until you get a new one from me. Kindly keep my address strictly confidential; there are no exceptions for anyone. I have gone into full retreat and see no one. For the next 7 months I have to limit my desk work to 2 or 3 hours and divide the rest of the day between meditation and the new book. I am living on the outskirts of the city, where it is very quiet and only a sandy beach and a lake that fills all the horizon in front of window.

There are certain items left at the Lincoln Storage Room No. 1, 1517. Would you be so kind as to search for them, pack them in a small carton and mail them to me here? They are: (a) The "Traveler" Ultravioletray Sunlamp, small size, gold color.

I shall be grateful to you for these things. I don't know where the ultraviolet lamp, is packed. It is a very small travelsize item, which I returned to the store room a few days before departure from NYC

Kindly accept the enclosed dollar bill as a start towards refunding postage on the readdressed mail; the carton refund will be added to my next dollar remittance. Let me know how you are getting on from time to time.

The 2nd batch of mail sent by you was air-mailed. Please note that it is wrong. Send it ^{all} cheaper way, that is, train mail.

I am waiting to know whether or not it is possible for you to collect from 545 ^{5th are} ^{once weekly} the printed matter mail (advertising booklets, ^{catalogs} periodicals etc) + parcels? Please let me know, as if you cannot I must seek someone else. I dislike imposing more burdens on you, knowing how you are placed so please do not accept this one unless you really can conveniently manage it.

If acceptable, the material can accumulate in your house for 2-3 weeks, (but not at allens) + then all put in one paper wrapped parcel + sent me, again by the cheapest way. I am in no hurry for this 2nd 3rd 4th class mail + content to wait until you have enough pieces to make a package. This means less work for you.

My dear Tony

The large carton of warehouse items was received in very bad condition. The string was hanging 2 inches loose so had become useless. The carton itself was in pieces. All the fragile items inside were smashed to pieces. To profit by this experience may I make the following suggestions: 1) The carton should always be enclosed inside a second one. 2) Do not use ^{SOFT} thin flimsy cartons: they do not endure post workers handling. 3) Use thicker string. 4) Enclose fragile items inside little but strong cartons or metal boxes; as special protection 4) feel free to use any of the packing or posting material you can find in the warehouse room 1517 — paper, cartons, string, envelopes; flat boxes; anything. 5) Insure all packages of warehouse material, or register them. This is to get them better handling

but I do not eat this any more. Sorry. Do
not send gifts again, anyway. thoughts are better.

I have left it to Romaine to explain all the details of the 545^{5th Avenue} work: you can always phone her when in doubt on any point.

Nothing further is required from the warehouse to replace the broken things, I have now bought them locally here. Also, for your instruction, the jacket, and 2 trousers you sent, were medium weight, not summer weight tropical suits. So perhaps you should have enquired further from me if in doubt whether they were right. There are no summer weight ones left in NYC, evidently, so I have bought them locally now. The suits you sent, together with the heavy ones I brought with me, will be sent to you for warehousing in a month's time. Meanwhile, in a few days, I shall send you a carton of various small items for warehousing.

Enclose a dollar towards expenses.

I am grateful for the added work you have taken on, but I wonder still how you can cope with it. It would not be practicable to use your Staten Island address. But what do you say to my abandoning the Allen address in favor of Box 34 again? It would take some months to arrange, of course.

Your weekly mail has arrived regularly. However there is one further instruction to be noted. all printed material, whether catalogs, magazines, journals or ~~advertising~~ mimeographed circulars, ~~are~~ to be kept separate from letters. The latter are to be sent as usual by 1st class letter post. But the other material is to be put aside and kept for 2 or 3 ~~seven~~ weeks and then sent by "Parcel Post" in a single batch when you have accumulated enough. It will be necessary to affix the printed label (which you can buy at Woolworth) saying "Postmaster this may be opened for inspection etc."

My object in doing this is twofold 1st to save money, as 1st class letter post costs much more than 3rd or 4th class parcel post. 2nd: Most of this printed material is unimportant & often unsolicited advertising. I do not want it mixed with letters, which are the important thing. Of doubtful you may open a package to see if it is Printed Matter. Usually the appearance, wrapping or bulk indicate it. Of course, you must not enclose a letter of your own, or anyone else's, with parcel post, as that is against P.D. rules. And you may remove the wrappers of the printed things to keep down bulk.

Next time you visit the warehouse (no hurry) you might send me about $\frac{1}{4}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ lb of Tea, preferably in powder form if there, if not then in bag. Also 3 or 4 feet of gummed brown paper sealing tape.

Always acknowledge receipt of the package, I send you (such as the large carton last week) of items for warehouse storage.

Enclose money order for \$5, as you will have to pay \$4 out of it to the Cooper Station Post Office.

("Enquiry Windows") being my rent of the lockbox 3k due about June 25th or 26th. The other \$1 is toward postage.

Yes you may certainly use the small radio until I return to NYC. I hope you enjoy its music.

The young fellow in Frank's restaurant should be left to decide himself which language to read the books. However I cannot lend him my own Italian copy as I must preserve it in perfect condition for certain purposes. He could write to the publisher in Verona.

Why let all this confusion (mental) overwhelm you?

Surrender that too, to the higher power — and be resigned + patient. Smile at the ego's mental states (that is what it is) and know that they will pass.

The feeling of another presence at night may be good or bad; it depends on what other feeling accompanies it. Anyway it is psychic, not spiritual, and not to be encouraged: just nip it in the bud.

Your first letter to Mexico came in today.

Your parcel post packets by which I presume you mean the printed matter, magazines, etc. in large envelopes, have been arriving in a satisfactory condition.

As I told you in a previous letter, Mr. Masson is now ready to receive the trunk of valuables by Railway Express, so you may despatch it to his office on West Fifth Street as soon as it is ready. There is nothing to pay for transport at your end if you send it "Collect", which I have arranged with him.

I gratefully accept your offer to store the remainder of the goods in a closet at your home. However, I am wondering how you can possibly get so many things in an ordinary-sized closet.

In that case it is no longer necessary to ship them to Dr. Pushkin, so that plan is cancelled.

However, it will still be useful for you, I suppose, to avail yourself of assistance to pack the goods and transport them to Staten Island. As mentioned in the previous letter, Romaine's three weeks vacation starts August 18th. If Jim is employed in a job he should not be asked for help, as I would not like him to give up his job. But if he is free, that is another matter. If he is going to help you I think the Lincoln people will require a written authority from me before they allow him to enter the room, but I will not send this until you know whether he is free and whether you will need him as well as Romaine. In any case, the work of packing and despatching the single trunk of valuables is to be done without their help.

Here in Mexico I find that the cost of living is half what it was in the States and many things in the country and amongst the people remind me of my life in India. It is almost like revisiting India. Also the tempo of life is much slower and therefore it is easier to live a spiritual life. I think you would like it here.

~~xxxxxx~~ I canceled the order for the carton of loose leaf binders in one of my previous letters so the statement in your latter of 7/29 that you will send it shortly means either that the letter did not reach you or that in the maze of instructions I have been sending you it got overlooked! However if already sent, no matter, it will be OK

Your plan of attack on the warehouse seems effective except that Romaine is an expert packer so far as cartons are concerned and is willing to use her vacation for the job. But it does not start till 18 August so nothing could be done by her before then anyway. I am willing to wait until then rather than rob you of hours needed for sleep. She could do practically all the packing during her vacation and then you and Jim would have only the transportation to look after! Anyway do as you find you can do and I will accept any result; if you really can put in three days a week without suffering by it, OK.

None of this stuff will be moved to California ~~xxxxxx~~ as I have decided to keep it on the east coast after all, except for a few items for which I may send individually to you later in the year.

Also Jim has not offered to help, I have not been in correspondence with him, whereas Romaine has. I do not know his present situation as regards working hours. So if you prefer to do the job alone, it is OK; or if you want the partial help of one or both of these, also OK.

Yes, it is very important not to redirect parcel post mail to Mexico. There is an exceedingly heavy custom duty here for one thing and also parcels are held up for months at the frontier--so simply retain every kind of mail except letters--retain even periodical printed matters--and merely list them in your letters once or twice a month so that I may know they are with you.

I wrote you the other day that I am going to sell the whole dictating machine set; recorder, transcriber, earphones, microphone loudspeaker ~~xx~~ plastic records and paper index strips. I have asked Romaine to take it over from you and advertise it and sell it for me.

The "Special Delivery" letter which you sent me by ordinary mail was correctly handled. There are people who get very emotionally excited and do not have balance who usually send me such delivery letters and even telegrams; I usually refuse to give such missives special treatment since they are expressions of egoism. However when you write yourself on business matters that is different and you may use special delivery if you deem needful.

Now You may now drop the words "en casa de masson" from my address as the postman here is now acquainted with my name. Next time you are at Allens service, you may pass them the same information.

Every day I find this country and people reminiscent of my Indian life; but the mysticism is lacking here--I intend to make some research as to how far it existed before Christianity was implanted. Did you know that the Church destroyed all the pre-Christian books and slaughtered all the priests, seers and mystics? Is it any wonder that karma, the law of consequences, has brought persecution to the Church in turn, here in Mexico?

Thank you for the last paragraph of your letter but alas I am all too human and myself seek Gods grace often.

I have your letter of August 14th and am glad to find that the job of moving is well underway. I am most grateful to you for the attention you are giving to moving my effects and for your assistance.

I have already given the Lincoln Warehouse notice that I am vacating the storeroom by 14th September. Therefore, you may take your time over the job of transferring my effects to your place, as the storage rent will have been paid until the 14th anyway. So don't rush yourself.

As for the loose leaf ring book-binders which you ask me about in your letter, don't do anything with them. Simply keep them in storage at your home until I call for them.

Since I have found ^{now} that there are no customs duties on magazines and books coming to Mexico, only on parcels containing articles, you may send me the following journals:

Wait, however, until you have a batch of six to ten ^{pieces} ~~copies~~ before you mail them to me. Then you can send them all in one batch. As regards the other ~~magazines and~~ journals and other printed matter, keep them in storage in New York ~~and~~ ^{but} notify me as to their receipt.

Regarding the packing of my goods at your house, your idea of putting the suits in a closet and the shirts in the trunk is a good one, but all the rest of the material can be put in cartons or cases and labelled, including all material for office use and other things. Keep all keys in a safe place until I collect them from you personally.

Please don't send me more ^{redirected} ~~letters~~ by airmail. Instead, send them to me via train mail ~~and airmail~~. Don't send them to me individually, but put them in a large envelope or packet and mail them to me via the cheaper train mail, regardless of the fact that they may arrive at the Box 34 address via airmail. The mail received at Box 34 will gradually increase in amount, as I am shifting from Allen's Service to Box 34 for all of my mail. 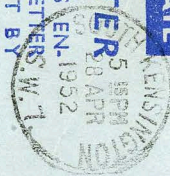

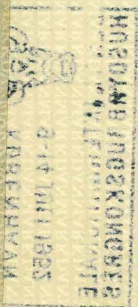
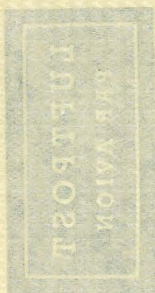

Send the parcel direct to Denmark, removing any paper price tags which might indicate any garment was new, and mark it "Personal Clothing for a Tourist"

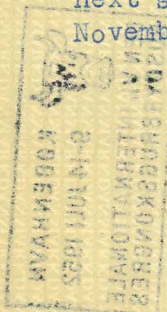
If I do go to India it seems my visit there will be extremely short. How I have to change plans constantly! Better never to make any, in my case.

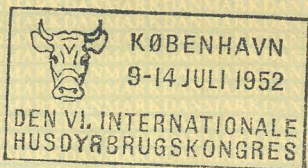

Its real good to hear from you and I had to laugh as I caught a mental picture of you slogging the streets wiping streams of ~~mix~~ perspiration from your mentally perplexed brow! Its really tough, hon, and if it affords any consolation (which it rarely ever does) these tortuous twistings and turnings have been going on for all of us, despite outer appearances. Your letter was awaiting me, Tony, when I arrived in New York this week from abroad.

The news that Ella May has given birth to a boy explains all the changes which you felt impelled to make last year.

However, I must ask you to concentrate your mind and try to remember what became of the large brown paper envelope containing important documents which I handed over to you the day I visited your apartment, last April. I asked you to take special care of this packet because of its importance. I went to Strang's Warehouse and searched through all the bags and boxes and could not find this packet. It would seem that because I asked you to take special care of it you may probably have kept it with your own belongings, in which case it would be stored in the other room in Strang's where you have placed them. Of course I have no access to the room and hence, my request that you try to concentrate and to recall whether this is so or not. If, as a result of this concentration you remember that the packet is stored in one of your own boxes, it would be necessary for me to have access to your room there. How is this to be done? What I mean is, would you have to write and instruct Strang's to give me access to your room? 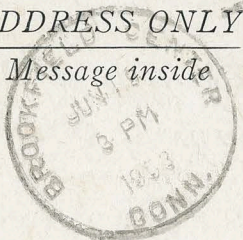

Paul Brunton was born in London, November 27th, 1898, and was educated at the Central Foundation School and by private tutors. His early years were devoted to extensive European travel, to his interest in philosophy, literature, art, religion, mysticism. After some free lance journalism, he accepted the editorship of *World Trade*. Later he served as editor of a travel journal, and as managing editor of *Success Magazine*, an inspirational periodical for young men.

Abandoning his journalistic career to devote himself to fulltime investigation and experiment in psychology and mysticism, he visited Egypt, Ceylon, India and Burma. There he studied the ideas and practices of the Yogis, fakeers, and holy men, and was the first white man to penetrate some of their secret hermitages. He was also initiated into many of their secrets and admitted as a member to some of their strange fraternities. On his return to England, he settled in a quiet Buckinghamshire village and began the writing of "A Search For Secret India," to which his friend, Sir Francis Younghusband, contributed the Foreword. (See back cover for comment on his other books.)

In 1938 Mr. Brunton came to America where he spent some months in New York and Los Angeles. Sailing from Los Angeles for China, he visited Siam and India, and it was there that he wrote the greater part of this present book. He is living in India now.

My previous letter requesting you to send the loose leaf
ringbinders may be cancelled if you have not yet despatched them. This
is due to a development of plans.

near I have been offered free of charge an excellent storage
inside a business store here. The Lincoln warehouse room was not in my
original plan, I was to have paid half cost and shared the room with
another man. He however failed to carry out this plan and I find the
cost too high. I have decided to remove the goods and abandon the room.

But it is a complicated operation and will have to be
done in stages extending over some weeks or even months but the sooner
the better for my pocket! Your help is needed and your suggestions too.

Job No. 1. The first stage is to remove the contents of the two
"security" trunks (black thin steel, they are locked) which contain my
records and important papers, jewelry and publishers' correspondence etc
black new-looking eight weight

These are to be collected together and packed into a single trunk. Their
present cases are too thin to be sent here so they should be collected
into the heavy wooden trunk with brass bound corners in which I believe
shirts are at present stored. The jewelry should be very carefully
packed in a metal or wooden box, which in turn is placed inside this
trunk. Each item should be wrapped with tissue paper or cloth to protect
against breakage. small

I do not think that a second trunk will
be needed if you pack everything tightly. However I believe that inside
one of these thin steel cases there are a collection of office
items, artistic curios and miscellaneous objects that were only
temporarily put there. Remove them and do not send them with this lot.

This heavy trunk is then to be sent decorative
to me at the above address by Railway Express, collect, so you will have
nothing to pay for it. Both tie-on labels and gummed on labels should
be used. (They may be in the "Travel" carton or you can get them) But as
it contains valuable items if they accept insurance you may send it
insured for say \$700. Also they have a system of giving greater security
against loss for if the trunk, have it sent under that
system.

That first job is the most urgent. You are to do it
alone. The second job is to remove to your home the following items Job 2
because they are fragile delicate and breakable. (1) Dictating machine
(2) Transcribing machine for same (Both are the "Audiograph", No 2 is in
a leather case. (3) Portable typewriter. These three items are
to be stored in a safe place at your apartment until I can have them
picked up by someone travelling to the West coast and brought along

under his personal supervision as part of his personal baggage. I think someone will be coming in a few weeks time but of course I shall inform you in advance.

Feb 3 - The third job in order of urgency may be done with the help of a friend. Jim Covell is free now; also Romaine will be on vacation shortly. If an extra written authorization is required by Lincoln to admit them, I will furnish it on request. It will be a lot of work that is why I suggest help, especially as these two will be free. However work it out yourself in the best way.

This job is (a) either to pack in cartons and remaining empty suitcases the balance of goods and store them in your apartment until my next visit to New York, when I shall remove them or (b) have the Lincoln warehouse people pack and despatch by cheapest way (truck sea or freight train) to my new Los Angeles storage, billing me with the cost by invoice which I shall send a check for.

If you decide on method (a) I do not know how you would transport the cartons and cases to Staten Island; that is for you to decide, but whatever it is I would gladly send you the cost in advance.

I SEND YOU THE KEYS TO THE LOCKED CASES. PLEASE KEEP THESE KEYS AS THE TWO THIN STEEL CASES WILL HAVE TO BE STORED WITH YOU EVEN IF EVERYTHING ELSE IS SENT BY HERE SINCE THEY WOULD CRUMPLE UP IN THE JOURNEY: ALSO YOU WOULD HAVE TO STORE THE THIN CHOCOLATE BROWN SUITCASE FOR AIR TRAVEL made of plastic.

dark These cases I would collect from you in New York OR you would use them for packing the dictating machines and typewriter inside when they are going under the personal supervision of a traveler coming this way. The Chinese teapot is not to be sent here at all, not even thru him, but to await my personal collection in New York eventually; it is too valuable and fragile. In fact, all kitchen crockery made of porcelain is not to be sent here at all, but to be picked up by me eventually.

Your note, undated, about grant of vacation, now here.

1) You ask, dear Sony - -

for practical information, The weather about the time you are likely to arrive will be more or less ^{like your local weather} but probably a little better or sunnier here than in N.York so the same kind of clothes should do - raincoat, topcoat, warm under-clothing, boots or galoshes shoes. March is also windy here, strong currents. (2) When the train from Milan reaches Chiasso custom officers may ask if you have anything to declare say No! + bring no alcohol, tobacco or chocolate (all dutiable) ~~as~~ as are at times gifts but you want usually be asked to open cases. Stay on the train with your suitcases in Chiasso, where it waits for 15/20 minutes. don't get off. Take a taxi at Lugano R.R. depot to the hotel (I shall choose one + make reservation when you are able to send exact date). The train does not usually stop at Paradiso station, which is the one before Lugano, but if it does do not get off; continue to Lugano, or there will be problems.

3) Ask your travel agent to give you train times from Milan, so you can estimate ~~the~~ the interval of time as the airport is quite a distance from the depot. Remember that the airline provides a coach from airport to their city terminal ~~office~~ which is near the station.

4) Provide yourself with at least 100¹⁵ dollar worth of Italian money in New York to pay for Milan expenses - any balance can be exchanged here. Also 5 to 10 dollar of Swiss money for arrival expenses; the further Swiss money can be got here later. Safer to use Travellers Cheques - American Express or The Cook Son/Wagon Ltd Cook & Co. are usually cheaper - for all your funds. Travel Agency will give you any other information needed.

Q & your concern of 2-5 Jan not in: I will need to know if I may be 22-24 - but of reservation at the hotel. Your destination here since if you take a night plane it may be 22-24.

(5) Thanks for offering to bring with a soup powder. I have not yet found one quite suitable so I must take the nearest. It must be meat, fat, egg and milk-free. 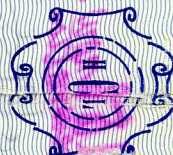
