Readers' Letters 31

Editor's Note: The Readers' Letters files consist of correspondence between PB and his students, followers, fellow philosophers, spiritual leaders, friends and family. Most of these letters were sent to PB by readers of his books. They are in no particular order, and there may be letters by the same person in other files as well. Most of the letters in this file were written between 1935 and 1944.

PB had a tendency to make edits, write notes regarding his replies, or insert address information and meeting times on the letters themselves after receipt. We have noted PB's insertions and marginalia, but have not noted edits made by the original author, assuming that they were corrections made at the same time as the rest of the letter. To preserve both readability and the voice of the author, we have corrected spelling errors but have generally left grammar as is.

Less interesting letters have been summarized instead of fully transcribed. Please refer to the scanned PDFs for the full content, or to view all stationary headers, postmarks, unidentified markings, marginalia, etc. Proper names and dates have been written exactly as found in the original for each letter in this file; where we discovered multiple versions of a person's name, we have noted the full name either in the body of the text in {curly brackets} or in a footnote.

In many letters, there are words that are illegible or missing; in such cases we have included either our best guess or the word "illegible" inside {curly brackets}. In rare circumstances, we have added a word or phrase to a letter for readability, which are also noted with {curly brackets}; a footnote was added where we deemed it helpful. – Timothy Smith (TJS), 2020

Sir,

After Mr Brunton's repudiation of the baseless allegations against him, one thought that the controversy was at an end; but it is surprising that The Sunday Times which till the other day was swearing by quotations from Mr. Brunton's books in connection with the Maharishi and after its short sermon on Eastern silliness should have again set the ball rolling by opening its columns to Freidman's letter. Is there a conspiracy against Mr. Brunton?

As a humble devotee of the Maharishi, and as one who has known the Ashram and Mr Brunton for over three years I feel bound to say something as an onlooker from outside the ring.

Many readers of The Sunday Times have read the article of Mr Brunton in the Statesman or the Ceylon Paper. If the real object of Mr Ramachandra and Mr Freidman had been to criticise his views on Yoga the article could have been published in extenso and the public would have been in a position to follow them. Instead a few distorted quotations are given, divorced from their context. Such isolated sentiments abound even in his earlier works. The³ motive of Mr Ramachandra and his sponsors seems to have been to merely fling mud at him under some pretext.

Even now it is not too late to publish Mr Brunton's article in extenso and readers will then realise that there is as much connection between that and the allegations against him as there is, to quote a vernacular proverb, between Gulam Sahib and Gokulashtami. The strangest part of it is, that the controversy instead of being sober and dignified about Mr Brunton's views on Yoga, has been converted into a personal one between him and the Ashram.

I can prove to the hilt that this has been prompted by interested motives. But the columns of a newspaper are about the last place to discuss purely personal questions and the pity of it is that where persons like Mr Bose and Yogi Ramiah have feared to tread, Mr Ramachandra has rushed in like the man in the proverb.

Mr Brunton in his article enumerates the consequences of incorrect practice of Yoga – hallucination and fancy being mistaken for reality, callous indifference, the decay of reasoning power etc., and may I add fanaticism. Both Mr Ramachandra and Freidman seem to be victims of these consequences.

Mr Freidman met Mr Brunton years ago for a few minutes and on the strength⁴ of this, and having played with the yellow robe assumes the "Holier Than Thou" attitude and presumes to assess Mr Brunton's mental make up <u>now</u>. He begins well, drifts into twaddle and winds up ludicrously with lachrymose effusion. His main

sorrow is that Mr Brunton did not mention the Ramana Ashram in his article. Evidently he has not read Mr Brunton's reply. Bearing in mind that the Maharishi and the Ashram are two distinct entities, he would do well to make out a case for the Ashram being mentioned alongside the Ramakrishna Order of Monks, in Mr Brunton's article.

Mr Ramachandra's article is mischievous, misleading and dishonest. I will deal with only some of his contentions, having regard to Mr Brunton's reply.

He has got a pliable vocabulary. "Of course the Ashram have used Mr Brunton's name in some of their publications", but if Mr Brunton uses the name of the Maharishi it is "exploitation" and in the same breath he accuses him for not mentioning him in his article. Mr Brunton is ridiculed for praising the Ramakrishna Mission, and yet Mr Ramachandra drags in the name of the Maharishi ingeniously as if Mr Brunton denounced him and devotes a column to his virtues, as if He (the Maharishi) solicited it specially from⁵ him.

Mr Ramachandra's logic is noteworthy. The Maharishi allowed himself to be beaten by thieves. Mr Brunton avoided the attention of goondas and thieves at Tiruvannamalai and ergo he has not crossed the mystic border.

Mr Ramachandra cannot think of anything except in terms of 'coin and contribution'. Mr Brunton never coveted publicity or any pedestal, least of all a pedestal which could be bought for coin and contribution. Mr Ramachandra asks what has Mr Brunton contributed to these Ashrams. Herein he has let the cat out of the bag, his real motive. It is extremely distasteful for me to answer this, but it has to be done. I would ask him to refer to the introduction to "Five Hymns" by Mr Grant Duff and to pages of Sri Maharishi, The Sunday Times publication. It is for him to say whether increased visitors have not resulted in increased coin, and contribution to the Ashram, though this is the least part of what Mr Brunton has done.

If Mr Ramachandra has eyes he should know that Mr Brunton's article appeared first in the Statesman of Calcutta. Mr Brunton did not court any reception at Ceylon, he simply avoided it. He has no axe to grind anywhere, least of all in Ceylon.

I⁶ claim no perfection for Dr Brunton or the Ashram. Why not give every man his due?

The editor bemoans that Dr Brunton has snapped the divine chord with the Rishis. He is entirely mistaken. Dr Brunton cannot and will not. The relationship between him and the Maharishi can be realised from <u>The Hermit in the Himalayas</u>. As for me I can never forget the beatific simile which irradiated the Maharishi's forces at sight of Dr Brunton on a certain evening in the Hall, after a short absence. It reminded me of one of Sri Ramakrishna's trances.

Mr Brunton's name will be remembered along with the Maharishi's, if not for anything else, at least as the man who pointed the way to Tiruvannamalai to thousands of weary souls all over the world. Would that we could have more such "journalists

It has been my practice since years to concentrate in the fore-head between the eyebrows and now since my eldest boy left us I am doing it all the more keenly. 

Dear Miss McDonald:

[Research work, literary production and world travel maintain such heavy pressure on my time that it prevents me from dealing promptly with correspondence. In addition, I was in spiritual retirement and retreat until lately.]¹³

I'll send you an exercise which you can practice for physical self healing. However hard it is to overcome the feeling of rebellion and cynicism, you simply have to do it, especially since the prospect of a medical cure are so remote according to your own statements. The prospect of a spiritual cure is just as important and negative emotions have to be cleared up if a spiritual cure is attained.

The fight to be won is within yourself, but there is real power in this exercise if you do it. You have to undergo psychic cleansing not only of this rebellious tendency but also of the despair and hopelessness which surrounds you. It's absolutely necessary to go through this inner cleansing and allow the spirit forces to come through and heal your body.

All my instructions are drawn from experience, either my own or people I know, so they are not theories. So if you wish spiritual cleansing, practice this exercise and have faith. Take it on my word as I have seen healing after healing take place. Have the faith as it can be done and I have experienced it myself.

Have the faith that the inner work and healing will start immediately with the reading of this letter. It will come through if you'll open up the door.

This diabetes came through [Karma.]¹⁴ If you'll work this out mentally, the physical [disease]¹⁵ will work out [more quickly].¹⁶

... Yes,²⁷ I know Ernest Wood's book, "The Great Systems of Yoga," very well. It is a reliable and useful introductory work for beginners, but does not attempt to go deeply into its subject. I also know William MacMillan's book, "The Reluctant Healer," in fact, I knew the author very well in England and was instrumental in getting his writings published. He died suddenly of a heart attack about two or three months ago. He had a wonderful inborn gift of healing but not having undergone any instruction, he did not understand, in my opinion, his powers fully but only partially, consequently we did not agree on all points. He visited India but fled after three weeks, finding the psychic atmosphere of the country very antipathetic to him. He wrote another book called "This is My Heaven." Although I have seen it on sale in Chicago, I doubt whether it has been published in this country, only in England. I wrote an introduction to that book.

I was pleased to learn that your step-mother made a settlement with you after waiting a year and a half with all the negative thoughts that the matter had generated in her now brought to an end.

I am pleased to learn Socrates' thoughts became so much clearer to you as a result of the progress you have made. All these illumined men, who wrote works that should live for thousands of years, are in the end the only ones worth studying. understand, as you and I can do, that the old gentleman did not ask his questions out of mere querulousness or out of carping mentality, but because he was trying to clear the encrusted thought conditions of the society around him, to clear them enough to let in a little of the spiritual influx which is truth.

If you have achieved an intellectual comprehension of the Quest, the next step is to apply that understanding into practical everyday action. This you can successfully do by constant reminders during the day to yourself that the inner meaning of life is the real and enduring one, and you should analyse events for a deeper meaning. Why is this or that happening to you? In this way you will unearth the lessons you need to know, and by mastering them you will modify the negative Karma they [may]²⁹ bring with them.

Do not overlook the mystical side of the spiritual Quest. Regular exercises in meditation will prove worthwhile and will bear fruit if you practise steadfastly. The Quest is a balanced path; the intellectual understanding, and the mystical inner awareness, and the practical moral application are all equally important.³⁰

... Your³¹ ideal of a simplified life is an excellent one. I notice that in this country particularly people become caught up in ambition, which is excellent in a young man, but they do not know when to curb it in later life, and thus they become its victim, to their own spiritual and physical detriment. It is good that you have awakened in time.

Thank you for sending me the material on Radiotherapy. I find it interesting. As you say, it is a pioneer endeavor which has much to overcome in the way of medical orthodoxy and tyranny, but which is along lines in harmony with the teachings of Hatha Yoga and spiritual psychotherapeutics.

I am sympathetic to all such endeavors.

Further to my letter of instructions concerning the control of, and correct attitude to, sex, I would like to add the following: "The ideal of total regeneration is a correct one, but the method of sudden repression is not. Or, at least, it is not suited to most aspirants. They need to work on themselves by a double regime. It is more prudent to make a broad steady assault on it from all directions, and thus lead to solid and lasting results, than to make a spectacular dash only to be followed by a forced retreat. Nevertheless, the whole human race, as it develops spiritually, will have to free itself from this obsessing tie to its animal heritage. When that is achieved racially, the method of procreation will become entirely different and the two sexes will merge again into a bi-polar sex as it was originally.³²

... To³³ avoid further psychic manifestations it is advisable for you at this time to cease your meditations temporarily for some months. You may do this now without hindering your spiritual progress. You may substitute prayer during the time you formerly devoted to meditation. Let these prayer periods become appeals to the Higher Power for grace, and let yourself be moved as much as possible by deep aspiration and devotion. In addition to this, try earnestly to cultivate inner calmness and detachment, and to control the emotional turbulence and mental agitation which are hindrances to spiritual understanding.

Although dream experiences can become very interesting, it is not a good thing to be unduly impressed by their unusual nature or to burden one's mind in trying to search for their meanings. However, your second dream was a symbolical message from your higher Self, indicating quite clearly that your feet are set on the path.

The recurring conditions of mental darkness which you mention must be faced with fortitude. Mystics have sometimes described these ordeals as "valleys of despair" and "the dark night of the soul." When the aspirant's karma calls for the experience of such trials, then it cannot escape from it. The usual words of comfort and cheer fail utterly to make the slightest impress at this time. You may feel surrounded by a wall of loneliness which nothing can pierce and seemingly engulfed by inexpressible despair which leaves you bitter. It is one of the great trials and must be endured. If it be any comfort at all, remember³⁴...

... you³⁵ for your offer of hospitality; it is generous of you and is appreciated. However my route does not take me near Kansas City nor Minneapolis this spring, so an interview is impossible. Whilst your sincerity is appreciated, I must tell you what I have to tell others: The interviews given since my return to the U.S.A. were promised before or during the war and when they are completed I shall give no further ones. As I have said in the preceding paragraph my work is not through the personal medium of interviews and correspondence and I cannot permit myself to be sidetracked through these channels. In any case, it is only necessary to have one interview to establish contact. My work is on the mental plane rather than the external one. I regret the necessity to tell you this but I now have to tell it to everyone.³⁶

... The³⁷ earnestness of your approach to the Quest of Spiritual Truth impresses me. Therefore, I must point out to you that the successful following of this Quest requires the combined effort of all parts of your being and not merely of one part.

It is not enough to depend on meditation alone. That leads to great peace during the state of Samadhi; but as you have to come out and resume your life in the world again, it is needful to develop also those faculties with which you must deal with the world. They include strictly logical reasoning, scrupulous regard for the evidence of facts, the correction of weaknesses and faults of character and the general balancing up of the whole personality. Moreover, deep religious feeling expressed in prayer or worship must begin and follow meditation. Finally you have to rise to the summit and understand the Truth of the Vedanta which is that the whole world is nothing but an idea in your consciousness and that you have, therefore, to free your consciousness from its hypnotic holding of this [idea] all the time to the extent of being totally lost in it. When you can separate the world-idea itself from your consciousness and keep aware of that consciousness alone behind and your daily living, then you will have realised Truth. This is what you make your goal and not merely sit down in medication.

This can be done even whilst remaining in the world, working at a job and bringing up the family. It is not necessary to join a monastery or become a monk – in fact it is not wise to run away from the {able} lessons which worldly experience can teach you³⁸...
