Clara Waegner Letters

Editor's Note: Clara and Fred Waegner were friends of PB's who ran an organic food company in California. They were one of the first companies to produce vegan instant soups – called "soup powders" at the time; PB's interest in vegetarian diet and his uncertain dining options as he travelled made him particularly interested in and supportive of their work. These letters are a mixture of friendly conversation, philosophy, and logistics for shipping food to PB. Most of the letters in this file were handwritten from between 1938 to 1979.

PB had a tendency to make edits, write notes regarding his replies, or insert address information and meeting times on the letters themselves after receipt. We have noted PB's insertions and marginalia, but have not noted edits made by the original author, assuming that they were corrections made at the same time as the rest of the letter. To preserve both readability and the voice of the author, we have corrected spelling errors but have generally left grammar as is.

Less interesting letters have been summarized instead of fully transcribed. Please refer to the scanned PDFs for the full content, or to view all stationary headers, postmarks, unidentified markings, marginalia, etc. Proper names and dates have been written exactly as found in the original for each letter in this file; where we discovered multiple versions of a person's name, we have noted the full name either in the body of the text in {curly brackets} or in a footnote.

In many letters, there are words that are illegible or missing; in such cases we have included either our best guess or the word "illegible" inside {curly brackets}. In rare circumstances, we have added a word or phrase to a letter for readability, which are also noted with {curly brackets}; a footnote was added where we deemed it helpful. – Timothy Smith (TJS), 2020

1 - 2 Writing by Micha-El (Alan Berkowitz) about Clara Waegner and PB Undated

Clara Wagner and PB

Clara Wagner and her husband Fred were among a small group of students in the United States who had intimate contact with P.B. P.B considered them confidantes and trusted them with many personal tasks. For most of the period of contact with P.B. they lived in California and were friends of the Massons and were the Godparents of Jeffrey Masson. When saw P.B. came to the West Coast he always made an effort to see them. At the time of the impending nuclear war in the 1950s they abandoned a successful organic food business (which was begun at P.B.'s suggestion) and moved to Ecuador. Fred died many years ago, and Clara lived well into her 90's. During the end of her life I had contact with her and spoke with her occasionally on the telephone. When she died last year her son Alan sent me her correspondence with P.B. PBPF/Larson has a short video clip of P.B. and Evangeline looking over some of P.B.s possessions and sorting through them. This took place at the Wagner's residence. The same video contains some short clips of Fred taking P.B. to the boat or train for one of his journeys, and some clips of the Wagners in Ecuador.

Fred had cancer of the throat and some letters provide health advice.

These letters also contain extensive information about P.B.s travels and whereabouts along with occasional personal information. Some of them discuss problems and psychological issues that took place between P.B.'s students. There are also letters that contain notes from Evangeline, P.B.s wife at the time. Finally, there are letters from Bernard, Jacques and Diane Masson, Kenneth Hurst, and other students, including Anthony Damiani. The Damiani correspondence concerns the planned move of the Damiani family along with other students from New York City to Ecuador, where the Wagners were already residing.

The originals and a copy of these letters are being given to the Paul Brunton Philosophic Foundation. Copies of the correspondence from Anthony Damiani are being given to this family, c/o Louis Damiani. I have also kept a copy for myself.

Thank you for your kind notes... dear Clara and Fred,

and your good wishes are whole heartedly returned to you both.

Thank you, Clara for the recipes and useful food suggestions. I am taking Golden Seal every day now and note good results.

Raphael has asked me to give you several messages:

(1) He mailed to you, Clara, yesterday the brown corduroy trousers which you so kindly shortened for him when we visited you. They seem to be <u>too</u> short now, so if you have the time, could he trouble you again to lengthen them <u>an inch longer?</u> Thank you.

(2) Can you, Fred, remember how many mail packets you received for Raphael, and how many you forwarded to him, and to what addresses were they forwarded? We⁴ understand that five in all were sent to you from New York, but to our knowledge we have not received that many.

(3) We are going to be staying at Jacques home, so could you please (from this date on) send any letters which you receive or care to write to Masson's address.

(4) Raphael spoke with Jacque about the cash offer which you received for your house (for \$8,000) and he feels that you should immediately accept this. He feels it is better to receive cash than to get involved in payments & he also feels it may well be the best offer you will receive, with a likely depression in the near future.

All charges to Romaine {Stevens}, as usual. Mark mine "unsolicited Gift"

I shall arrive in London next week, and remain there for a couple of months. My visit to Denmark created a sensation and I had to give interviews to all the editors of leading newspapers. I felt that the time had come to wake up this little country and the editors treated all that I explained about mysticism with the greatest respect – a thing which could not have happened earlier, as the Danes are sceptics.

Henceforth your mail may go to my private London address, which is confidential to you.

9 - 10 Excerpt from a PB letter July-19-57⁵

"With reference to your question about a group movement, I must reply categorically that my standpoint remains just the same as it always has been in the past. I am not in favor of identifying philosophy with any definite group or organization. This stated, I may say that in view of the approach of the date – five years hence – which some of us believe to be a fateful one, the necessity of making some preparation for it has caused considerable discussion among various questers and also engaged my own serious consideration. If atomic weapons are not used, then most of the USA outside the great cities should be safe enough. In the unlikely event that they are used, some individuals who wish to take no risks are considering emigration. What they do not seem to realize is that the fallout danger from atomic bomb explosions on a war time scale would spread over the whole planet and there would then be no safe area at all. Against this, it may be said that some areas would be less dangerous than other areas, even though none would be quite free from any danger at all.

"My own considerations have not been brought to a conclusion as they require further data, which it will take me at least another year to procure. You may be assured that if I have anything definite and of value to recommend to you and other questers, it will then be communicated. Until then, I can only say that any movement or grouping about which you may hear is simply a personal matter on the part of the members concerned, that I have nothing to do with it, and that I neither approve nor disapprove since, as you know, I have never previously interfered in their personal lives.

11 - 12 Letter from PB c/o W. W. Stirling, Whisconier Hill, Brookfield Center, Connecticut (May 29, 1953)⁷

After consideration of your desire to purchase a good violin either here or abroad Fred,

it seems the best course of action to pursue is careful investigation which is dependent upon the authority who will pass final judgment on the quality of the violin.

I am not sure as yet that such a critic exists in England whom I could approach with confidence. But I shall certainly make inquires for you now that I know the price you are willing to pay. However, I cannot guarantee that the selection of an instrument [may be]⁸ commensurate in quality with the money you are ready to pay, I suggest that you purchase your violin here in New York where there is a reliable authority who can be trusted to see that you get the proper value. This [is taking]⁹ a little time, but I shall let you know as soon as I know myself.¹⁰ Isn't this [wise]?¹¹ The person here in New York who knows musical circles is still inquiring.

I have rented a cottage in the country at the above address where I shall reside throughout the summer. Do not write me at the Hotel Cameron anymore as I leave for my summer residence tomorrow.

Is the Monosodium Glutamate entirely free from salt? Therefore safe for me to use? Many thanks for the extract from Loma Linda doctor's book. It will be useful.

I still await to learn from you whether you have been able to ascertain from the manufacturer in California if there is any New York any distributor or agent for the Regina Concentrated Grape Juice, and if so, his address. The parcel of foods was received. Thanks. Will you please send me a supply of Burgomix again but minus onion. Also send some celery powder to use as a salt substitute. Also a supply of your soup powder containing several de-hydrated different vegetables but minus nuts minus sugar minus onions.

I enclose a check, which, please place to my account against these various parcels [over]¹²

In¹³ what way does Clara use the Golden Seal medicine to improve her eyes. What dosage and what strength?

Reference to your circular advertising my new book, you know your customers mentality better than I do. It would seem suitable to them. Nevertheless you seem to give the impression that the book is principally concerned with health and that of course, would be a wrong impression. I therefore suggest that you take from the jacket with my permission some paragraph which indicates that it deals with the world crisis.

Furthermore, I want you to print a different and special short circular for my own use and on better paper which I, myself will get mailed from New York. I shall write the "copy" for this circular during the next few days and send it to you. A friend of mine will pay for the cost of printing and the cost of paper so when you receive "copy"¹⁴ please set it up for a rough proof.

15 - 16 Letter from PB to Fred Box 34, Cooper Station, New York 3, U.S.A. April 1, 1953

I have recently returned to New York, Fred

after nearly a year's absence abroad, including India.

Thank you for the herb which you have sent, but rest assured that my mouth condition healed perfectly before I reached America and that there is no further cause for alarm. The only tropical trouble which is left, is a disease called Sprue, but physically I am active and strong, so you are to cease worrying. In any case, I have something in mind which I wish to consult with you about. It is the particular properties of the Sunflower Seed. It seems that whilst visiting a Health Store here in N.Y., I was told that the Sunflower seen contain much less fat than nuts, they actually claimed none at all! This does not check with the idea I had originally, so will you be good enough to let me know the correct of¹⁷ fat in the seed, as compared to the quantity of fat in nuts? It is important for me to know as strictly as possible the amount, if it is less, how much less, etc., as I am on a [fat]-¹⁸ free diet [to a large extent]¹⁹ and this must be taken into consideration. If you can help me in this matter, I shall be glad, but in any case, send me a pound of your Sunflower seeds with this qualification: they must be only in the <u>meal</u> form. Be sure that they are ground finely into meal first.

How are you coming along with celery stalk or leaf which was added to your soup recipe in place of the salt? As I shall not be traveling for a few months, now is the time for you to send me what samples you have so that I can test them. It is [now here]²⁰ no longer necessary that the sample [be soluble; it may]²¹ require only two or three minutes cooking, but if you have developed a better recipe I now have the time to cook and give you a report. I thank you and Clara for your excellent attention.

Owing to excessive postal costs of restamping²² at each transfer point, London agents are not allowed to forward them to me; and as I was moving from country to country it could not catch up with me, since time is long & uncertain in Europe for parcel post.]

The magazine PREVENTION Sunflower Issue will be read and returned to you within a week or two. However, in view of the oil content, we shall not use it again owing to our fat-free diet.

As regards my tropical-troubles, I am improving so rapidly, under the treatment now prescribed, that they have mostly disappeared.²⁴

I am now about to start using GOLDEN SEAL experimentally, this week as a tonic to note what effect it has upon the mild anaemia, which developed within the past year.

The Regina Grape juice has a taste which I like <u>very</u>²⁵ much. I presume it is rich in iron and therefore, I intend to take it regularly. You might ask the California manufacturers whether²⁶ it is being sent to N.Y. so that I could purchase it, locally. Also, are you quite sure that it contains no preservatives?

Evangeline has tried the sample of Burgermix and is delighted with it. Will you please send either one large can of it or two small ones for her. Is it possible for you to prepare it without onions? And to use turnip and parsley instead in the ingredients? If so, I would like a separate packet for myself as I was also pleased with the taste except for the onion.

I ²⁷ have tried the sample of soup powder; it is good, but still open to improvement. The problem is still the old one of giving it more flavor to compensate for the absence of salt. Is it possible for you to add to the ingredients, some turnip and some green pepper? And to increase the celery-stalk-leaf content a little more?

I have not been able to obtain from the local Health Food Stores, a pure celery salt. There are several brands of Celery Salt available here, but they seem to be a mixture of pure celery with mineral salt. Do you know the name of any brand or maker who supplies an unadulterated mineral-free celery salt, or other salt substitute?

Thank you for the sample of Filbert Nut Powder, but I have abandoned the use of nuts altogether now, in view of the oil content.

On page 38 of the PREVENTION MAGAZINE a sentence reads: "After the extraction of oil from the dehulled (sunflower) seeds a protein rich residue or meal remains." Can you tell me whether it is possible to obtain such meal, which is oil free? The high protein remainder of the meal would be very useful to me.²⁸

There is someone here in N.Y. who is an authority on violins, and I shall make an inquiry as to verification about their cheapness in England, and also what possibilities there are to getting a good one here at a special price. I cannot remember anyone in England who would undertake the purchase and packing for you, but will think about

I am grateful to you for your kind and thoughtful gift, which was such a pleasant surprise! It is so prettily made; and its clear, invigorating scent reminds me, for some reason, of mountain meadows, brimful of tall, quiet flowers: a very agreeable thought these January days, particularly when one lives in the heart of a city. Thank you for sending it and for thinking of me.

How fine of you to have sent out 10,000 circulars recommending <u>The Spiritual</u> <u>Crisis of Man!</u> This should have a wide-reaching effect and lead many, many people to finding the Message it carries for them.

I have at long last made out a list of our present needs which you will find enclosed, together with a check. The address listed at the top of the page is about as permanent as any address can be nowadays, and it is to this one that the foods should

be sent. I travel around a bit, but anything reaching the 965 Fifth Ave. address, will eventually also reach me.

Dr. Brunton appears very well these days: he is completely over his sprue (was last summer, in fact) despite the protestations of various doctors that this was impossible unless he (resorted to) a flesh diet! It might interest you to³² hear that another victim of sprue – a television actress, who has followed the advice of various "specialists" and eats large quantities of meat in her attempts to overcome the disease – is now entering her <u>seventh year</u> with the thing. Both she and the doctors cannot believe that Dr. B. overcame it in less than one year – and without eating the highly advocated flesh diet (which they claim is the only path to a cure!)

Did you know that the Waegners and the Wesselmans have more than a little in common? My husband, Henry, is also a lawyer: and we, too, have two sons (ours are 12 and 6.) However, (or perhaps I should say, "Alas",) I am the only vegetarian in the family. We are all, each in our own way, students of Dr. B.'s, though – even the little one, who is very fond of trying to recall what happened to him in former lifetimes! Both boys have witnessed for themselves the departure of life from its human form, or shell, and know that there is no such thing as "death" – so perhaps that is a start, at any rate, on their Quest.

What a wonderful way you have chosen to serve and to help others!

31 - 32 Letter from PB and Evangeline to Fred and Clara Box 292, Montauk, LI. N.Y.³³ April 6th. 1956

I am sorry, dear Fred and Clara,

that I could not write you earlier as I wanted to, as I had to go into New York City twice for some days each time, and this threw me back in work again.

With reference to Alec Bodnock the experience I had was on the Sunday evening following his death. At the time, I was meditating and so was Evangeline; Suddenly, I felt the chill which always indicates to me the presence of a spirit of some departed person. I have learned to recognize this, as I had it so many times, preceding a contact. Soon the picture of Alec appeared before me. He was trying to say something to me but appeared to have the greatest difficulty in communicating it to me, from which I gaged that his mind was still somewhat numb and only just beginning to function again. However, he seemed quite at peace and even relieved to be free of the body. I explained to him what he should do to establish himself in the new state, and gave him a deep lesson and by that time he faded out again. After the meditation, Evangeline spoke to me (not knowing what I had experienced) and said: "While you were meditating, I looked up from my own meditation and although the room was in

darkness because the lights had been turned out, I saw a white ghostly face next to you. I did not know who it was and it gave me a shock as I had never seen such a thing with you before:"

My impression is that he will try to communicate with me once more, although you must understand that such communication is extremely difficult and not to be encouraged after the first few attempts.

I have arranged to move from Montauk on the 30th of this month to a place forty miles nearer to New York City, called Quogue, which is still on Long Island. Other plans call for my next visit to California about the end of this year.

I have just found the note I was searching for which was to the effect, Alec undoubtedly had a spiritual experience during the fast, but his mind as unable in that state to balance it, with physical consciousness, so that it was really thrown out of balance³⁴ towards the end. I have also found another note which I had copied for you from an old Health Magazine referring to the treatment of skin cancers. The man who wrote this is well known to a friend of mine, is a practicing osteopath and regarded as very reliable, so his statement is worth considering in view of the remedy I mentioned previously along the same lines.

Thank you for sending the room heater which was very much appreciated as after its arrival we got snowbound again and were unable to go out to get food and mail for some days.

The sample of barley flour we could not use as we abandoned attempts to do any more baking, and the only soup we are using is your broth concentrate, which is now about finished. So would you please send me another box (salt-free). I would also like a can of the malted coconut. Regarding dates, I have found a source of supply for the Barhee in California, so I am able to order direct. I don't eat the deglets, in fact, cannot. But these invert sugar Barhee, are excellent. However, the season is just about over now. The Khadr[a]wi that you sent were delicious! But we have enough Barhee at present arranged for.

The magazine has not been dropped but I finally decided that printing would have to be done in England so as to enable Europeans to subscribe to it, as they are unable to obtain dollar currency.

I remember receiving a sample of raisins from you once which were free from poisonous insect sprays. We liked the flavor very much, and if you are able to get any more, please send some. So much of the food here in New York is poisoned with sprays that I think the only solution will be to live in an area where spray free food is being grown, as the problem is getting more and more serious. I intend to mention it in the current book on which I still have some months more work.

I passed your Smallpage letter on loan to a woman who lived in the same district as he and who is afflicted with cancer, so it was of service to her.



Dear Fred-Clara

I send you my opal tiepin. I would like to have the opal removed and replaced instead by the oval piece of jade you showed me yesterday, if the latter can be cut to fit.

Keep the pin for me until my return unless it could be delivered airmail to new york before my departure, which is doubtful.

Do what you like with the opal, sell or keep it for yourself. I enclose \$2 for the jade.

It was so good of you to help yesterday and to give the food stuff. But the extra food to be sent to nyc (2 lb more soup, nut fruitcake & 3 lb more nutpowder) <u>must</u> be billed for, please.

Have no doubts about my marriage. It is a spiritually-based, God-guided, destiny-ordained matter, to help me cope with my work, and demonstrate how to live in the world under a higher rule & yet be in it.



Dear Fred,

Today I was surprised to receive a package of stationery printed with the above address. As you had already asked in a letter whether I would like such done, I assumed you were still waiting for my answer.

Owing to the heavy pressure on my time I could not answer you earlier, partly because the matter was not urgent also and partly because I wanted to prepare "copy" for the curclar.

However to avoid your wasting further time and materials on needless tasks I hasten to tell you NOT to print any more of the above, and not to print anything else of the other address without having a goahead signal from me first.

The above address is known only to half a dozen people in this country, consequently I hardly have any use at all for it, on stationery. I have other means of contacting local people, for this – my residential address—is necessarily confidential. The promptness with which you have set up and sent the proofs of the circular letter is indeed admirable. I congratulate you.

Within ten or twelve days you will receive from my agent in New York, Mr. Anthony Damiani, a package of stationery for cutting off the old imprints [and] cutting down to the new, agreed size of 6 by 8 and a half, and printing with the new address. Some of it when received by you, will bear the old imprints of either 545 Fifth Ave, or United States Trading Corp, or some other firm name; I do not remember which.

I have gone through the proofs of the stationery and entirely rejected the threeline version, so the choice now remains between the single and the double line versions. I have cut and repasted the lines experimentally and sent them to you. When you

Regarding the circular from London concerning the Oriental herbs, my own recollection of *it* the so-called articles*i*- in English magazines from which the circular claims to be a quote were noted editorial articles at all, but advertisements. Consequently, the claims made are viewed with suspicion. However, I shall investigate the matter by visiting the Institute of Oriental Medicine when I am in London this Spring.

I much prefer the carrot juice treatment. Perhaps I told you of the case of a lady in California who was cured by taking carrot juice alone over a long period. Her ailment was cancerous. It is only as a specific for use during a limited period of time that I ever recommend raw juice or raw food for people living in the temperate zone, not as a permanent diet. I'd like to know what is the present condition of the sore?

Richard is a piece of karma, as you may have guessed.

I am informed that you have started to collect foreign stamps for yourself, so I send you a batch under separate cover.

You mentioned some months ago in a letter that you had salt-free broth and dried fruits surplus. If not too late and you still have some bananas and peaches, we could use some – especially bananas.

Evangeline is progressing excellently with her singing studies, and has invented improvements in the vegetarian recipes which she has been feeding me.

Reverting to the emigration problem again: it will not be easy to obtain an immigration visa for any country unless you have some financial backing, not only to cover transport but also to cover maintenance. This is why it is essential to collect as much money as possible, because there will be heavy outgoing expenses to be met after arrival, and as far as I can see each person will have to have sufficient to meet his own.

I am looking forward to seeing you early in January.

Dear Fred and Clara:

Your letter of April 26th reached me two months later as during the present year I have had to do a lot of traveling in the other parts of the world.

Needless to say your letter was very welcome, as I was always glad to hear from you in the past years and my own silence did not mean any change at all in my feelings about you both, which have always been warm and affectionate.

As regards this particular matter of the letter which Bernard wrote to you, I may say that I have not heard from him since three years and as regards you going out to live in Ecuador, although I did feel some share of responsibility for this decision on your part, it was, after all, a decision made on your own responsibility in the end. Therefore, it is very interesting to learn from your letter that you do not regret the experience of having lived in Ecuador and that you learned much there and made a lot of friends. I think, indeed, that if Fred's health had not broken down, you might still have remained there.

This matter of your health condition, Fred, I fully accept what you say that you do not hold any blame against anyone but here again accept your responsibility, only I feel in¹¹⁹ myself very pain at¹²⁰ the thought of all your sufferings during so many years.

It has been my destiny during the past couple of years to meet a number of cancer sufferers who had various experiences. Some of these cases have ended in cure through the methods which you know, and I believe tried, of living only on carrot juice. Others ended in death.

In¹²¹ the fatal cases I have seen miraculous transformation of consciousness taking place in the last days leading to a conscious entry into joys and lights as the spiritual withdrew from the body. From what I observed, at first hand, all these sufferings of the illness were completely compensated by this new world of joyous being which was entered into. It was a very deeply constructive experience, not only to me but to others around.

Anyway, you may drop from your mind any thought that Bernard's accusation about your being bitter has ever been accepted by me or even known to me, since I do not hear from him. I have, however, written him today about other matters concerning himself.

I have just arrived in France after several years absent and I just met Jack Masson and we had some reminiscences of the old days.

I remember that you used to collect stamps, it was, I think, for your son Alan. I, therefore, am sending you a large package which I have collected during the past two years, but it is being sent by sea mail and may take two or three weeks to reach you.

I want you both to know that this letter goes with all my Peace and affection and every good wish for your welfare.

Dearest Clara and Fred,

It's been a while since we've written, but we've been moving about.

As you can see by the above, we're settled here in Cannes for July and August as it's difficult to keep traveling during the heat of the summer. It's been lovely here and the kids adore it. Also they're able to practice their French which improves daily. Mine is what you call fractured, but it will do.

P.B. has asked me to give you a message for him. As you know he is expecting a severe crisis in the world events within about 3 years. With that in view, he has been looking for and studying for a place to go to at that time, and so far the search is down to two countries, South American and or India, though of the two, So. America seems more likely. And so, he advises that you do not tie yourself down with any land in Texas now, but keep yourself liquid against the time in [about 3] years [at the latest]¹²³ when we would all migrate to safer shores. We, ourselves therefore, are keeping that move in mind and upon our return to America will start all preparations for that time.

We shall be leaving Cannes the end of this month, and expect then to go to Spain, and if we like it, spend a little while there. We are all anxious to learn Spanish of course, and Span would be a start. Our plans for this coming year are uncertain as yet, but we shall be back in California by next summer if not sooner. After this month, our address again is:

We shall be anxious to hear from you as much has happened at your end since we heard from you last. Did you sell your business — and if so, what about your house there and the land? It would be nice for you to have a well earned rest now. Hope to hear from you at this address yet, so it will reach us before we start moving again.

By the way, we had some incense sent to you from India and we are wondering if you received it?

Richard's studies in agriculture will be extremely useful if he will be able to come out on the Great Emigration. There is the military draft problem however, so perhaps it

would be wiser to get the problem settled as quickly as possible after his studies are over. Inasmuch as we don't expect to be in a state of war as yet, it might be better to put in his time in service as soon as possible so as to have it over and done with in time for our emigration. On July 7th, P.B. posted to you from New York the 3 books which you kindly lent him, and trust you have received them back. Also P.B. will most probably have to stay on in Europe until March of next year. So until we hear from you, we send you our love and best always,

Was happy to get your letter before leaving Cannes, and it took only 3 days to make it here. Glad you got the incense – and must have missed one of your letters to India.

Sorry to hear about the lip being so sore. Anyway, now the grape season is here again, and you have the time free, would it be an idea to try the grape cure once again and include grape poultices? Also, what about earth compresses, ala Adolph Justand yogi method, that is damp earth, with clean cloth around it. If all these fail, you will have tried every natural method – and may have to resort to stronger measures. But at any rate, to go to S.A. one has to have a medical exam and a certificate issued of good health. The sore could be a bar, therefore, it has to be dealt with and healed during this rest period.

This period is also a good time to start learning Spanish.

Also, the fares to S.A.—it might either Chile, Argentina, or Uruguay, is rather expensive, so it's needful to start economizing and saving.

It's a very good idea to get going before the boys are 18 years – and we shall talk of all this when we see you.

Maybe the fruit and nut cake business could be started in S.A., where there will be plenty of cheerful questers to help.

The part of Chile we're interested in, Santiago, has a climate similar to Central and Northern California. Anyway, cheer up, the prospect of S.A. is much brighter than Mexico – and there is a much bigger European element there.

We are thinking of having a farm down there if possible.

Think we've covered about all the important points. As for our return—it doesn't seem likely we'll be coming back before next Spring—but one never knows. Anyway, we expect to visit Spain in Sept – and if we like it there, try and start learning a little Spanish.

Everybody is fine and sends you their love. Will be looking forward to your next letter sent out to the American Express in Geneva. Shall keep you informed of our whereabouts.

Dear¹²⁵ Clara,

We received your letter of December 8th and are really sorry that you do not see your way clear at the present time to come and live with us in Brazil.

In two weeks we will have lived in Brazil for nine years. We would not now return to the U.S. for any consideration, nor look for any other country in which to settle.

You mention problems of health and money as your reason[s] for not being able to make it this time. As for health, unless you have a chronic disease which is incurable, I am quite certain that it would appreciably improve here with us. As for the money, all you need is enough to buy the transportation. I am sure that should you present your problems to P.B., he would find a solution.

I am very very/sorry that destiny did not permit our two families to make the change together from the U.S. to a South American country. It would have been so much easier for all of us. Our first few years in Brazil were very tough on me and Ida. Now, thank Heaven, the difficult time is a thing of the past, and we are entering a period of peace and comfort.

We have found a way to make a living without moving from our little six-acre farm. We are only one hour's ride from Sao Paulo, and have all the things we had in the U.S., a car, TV, electric refrigerator and washing machine, etc. Ida speaks Portuguese fluently, and we are raising three girls of Brazilian ancestry.

We had information right along of Fred's worsening condition and we know how you must have suffered all these years. Now that you are alone, of course you must go on, as you say. But Clara, listen a little bit—you do not have to continue in sorrow in adverse surroundings. Here with us, you'll find peace and sunshine and plenty of leisure for meditation and other things. You don't need money here, for three or four hours work a day will more than pay for all your expenses. Our land is unbelievable fertile. An hour's work a day can produce enough vegetables to feed a dozen families. We made good money selling eggs from our two thousand chickens. Now we have stopped, for lack of help. Brazil is a/growing country and one of the richest nations in the world, with a European civilization. Also I was told that you

speak German, and there is a growing community of German-Brazilians all over Brazil and these people are very friendly and helpful, if you speak their language.

Be cheerful because you will meet Fred again, as you surely know, under conditions of happiness and joy which is impossible to describe. One of my teachers wrote that the gladness and bliss the soul finds after the death of the physical body is beyond description. Not only does it more than make up for the sufferings and unhappiness endured during the last earth life, but it goes much beyond, filling the soul with bliss and rapture unending. That is waiting for you, Clara, only have hope & faith! But why not live from now on a life of peace and comfort?

Ida joins me in wishing you a new year of happiness and fuller understanding.



Meditation Need Urged Author Offers Advice to Americans as Aid in Solving Problems

"America will solve many of her problems when Americans learn how to sit down and do nothing, plan nothing and think nothing"

That statement was made yesterday by Paul Brunton, a man who has written six books, some of which have gone into thirteen editions and all of which have been translated into French, German, Dutch, Danish, Czechoslovakian and Indian languages and dialects. He is staying for a few weeks at 5600 Tuxedo Terrace, Hollywood, before his departure for the Orient to continue his studies of life's mysteries and to gather material for a new book.

STATEMENT EXPLAINED

Mr. Brunton, who is said to know more about Yoga than any other Occidental, made haste to explain his statement concerning America's need for the "do nothing" attitude.

"I do not mean that Americans should take a lazy or defeatist attitude toward life," said Mr. Brunton. "Quite the contrary. I mean that they should learn, through practice, and under competent teachers, when they can be found, the science and art of meditation.

SOUND PHILOSOPHY

"In this nerve-wrecking, mechanistic, money-grubbing, power-seeking age, nothing is so conducive to peace of mind and physical health as sitting quietly for a few minutes, each day, allowing the mind and nerves to rest and inviting the cosmic forces and the cosmic love and intelligence to enter one's life to direct him in his various activities.

"There is nothing mysterious or 'psychic' about this practice. It is fundamentally sound philosophy. It is pragmatic, if you will, bringing practical, useful results.

PEOPLE AWAKENING

"Slowly, but surely, I think America is awakening to the need for the life spiritual. Hard-headed businessmen and many scientists who ten years ago scorned every mention of a spiritual search as indicating weak-mindedness, today are definitely sending out their intellectual antennae, trying to find some more¹³⁴ respect for science than for organized religion because they see that science is, at least, always sincere in its search for truth.

"Finally, there will be no quarrel between science and religion since both seek to know the {illegible} about life, and their {illegible} of the truth will tally {illegible} best that philosophy {and mysticism} have to offer."¹³⁵

Dear Fred,

At any rate, I can tell you that I was right in all the advice I gave you in all our conversations. When P.B. gets to California, he will only repeat what I X told you many times, that there is no time to lose, that every quester must get rid ready to leave as soon as possible, that each must make himself or rather place himself in a xx position of freedom to leave at any time, and this is not possible when one is encumbered by house, land and all kinds of stuff.

P. B. has postponed his departure for California until some time in November. I have been trying to get him to make some recommendations in your case and he has repeatedly warded me off with the statement that he never interferes in a quester's personal life, and that you should know what to do by this time in order to cure your trouble. However, I have kept after him for definite recommendation. I told him that I felt that a real grape diet, honestly conducted, followed for a period of about two months should completely eradicated the skin condition. that you have. Then I asked him point blank if he approved of this, or if he had some other suggestions to make. Finally, I got him to make a positive and definite statement. This is what he said: "You may tell Fred that I am also personally convinced that if he follows an exclusive grape diet, of organically-grown grapes, for an extended pet-period, without any mixture, I am convinced he his condition will greatly benefit and should result in a cure." I believe they are cooked in deep vegetable fat, hence not a good food.

Well, old man, will leave you now for I am frozen. They've had a cold spell here the last two days and everybody says it is unusual weather. We've been hearing this "unusual weather" stuff for the past ten years wherever we go.

I told P.B. you sold the printing press, etc. and he was pleased, although he did say you should have kept the grinding machines for the nut butters.

Dear Fred,

Just received your letter of the 24th. I wish to tell you that in accordance with your request, I shall go ahead and prepare the advice in order that you can fully reestablish yourself to a condition of health. It will take me a little time, for I have been busy helping P.B. to get ready to move to his new quarters, as he has to vacate the premises he had on Park Ave.

I just want to send you this little note to let you know that I will get busy for you. Meanwhile, try to follow the grapes \mathbf{x} for as long as you can, as long as your body can stand it without any repulsion. When you feel fed up with it, the books tell you to fast for a day or so, so as to give the body a chance to reestablish a craving for the grapes again. When you resume your eating, please do not go in for any concentrated foods. That is the main trouble with practically all vegetarians and for health-minded persons. They analyze the different foods and conclude naturally enough that the ones containing the richest mineral elements and vitamins are the best for them. Then they proceed to fill up on these, under the mistaken assumption that if a little mineral and vitamin is good, a whole lot would be much better, to the point of saturation. Nature does not work that way. Experiments have been carried out, in which a cow and her baby-calf were kept for several years on land containing nothing but grass. Both cow and calf thrived, the cow yielding rich milk, the calf was born to the cow and started to grow bone and flesh at a very rapid rate – all from grass. Any farmer knows that by feeding a cow on concentrated grain foods, the result will be trouble. Inasmuch as you are a big eater (so am I!), and like to feel a full stomach, you will have to cheat a little by eating a lot of greens, salads, etc. so as to fill the void, and at the same time not get too much nourishment in the body at too rapid a rate.¹⁴¹ The flesh you will have lost during your grape diet will be replaced very slowly, so don't get impatient and start to gorge. Of course, Fred, I am fully aware that you know much of what I tell you. But it is a good idea to hear it from someone else. By the way in one of the pictures you sent P.B. pointed out your wife to me....and we were informally introduced....will you acquainted her with the fact!

In another carton that I am in the process of gathering now there will be included, and I have people searching, a Scott stamp catalogue, a dozen or so booklets

on Spanish for travellers (a phrase book) I want you to mention whatever books are needed ... do not worry or concern yourself with prices, I have just located a seller in this type of book so that I should be able to find you what you need. I have gone through your letters and compiled a list which will be enclosed in my next letter for you to examine and add or detract according to your knowledge. More of that later.

As for business Fred I suggest and cautiously This¹⁵⁴ is being recounted in case you think there is any change in my plans. They remain as expressed to you in private. I am not in the least exaggerating when I say to you that we are indeed very fortunate in having P.B. with us. Well here's another item that needs talking about. It seems that Mr Franz is cooking up some scheme so that they could go to Chile with Red (a catholic priest of the reformed or liberal church, do you know of him, has a small church in Mexico ? I personally didn't know the existence of any such church.) at any rate all you would need accordingly would be just passage money. Again Franz refuses to recognises the need to work and save money. As far as I am concerned it's the old shenanigans all

over again. And chile for me spells out violence....besides I have a brother in law there, still doesn't appeal especially the people. I mentioned to you before that there are here a few people that will follow me to Ecuador. This I can personally vouch for; those that will follow are picked, P.B. is of the opinion that I am too much severe but in my experience any organization that lacks the proper people cannot succeed. And although we are not going in for colony stuff, we are friends and have been for many years, and will continue as such whether we live in the same area or different countries. I know that myself and brother could plow up an acre in one day with two horses. My sons like all children in the U.S. will be taught by necessity, and the point is this for many of those people in the west (California) I have serious doubts (of course this excludes Charles) but when I compare the questers here who are struggling to save pennies and dimes with those out in the west coast you must forgive me if I draw a line. I cannot from here really say if a hacienda is the best for all of us concerned, but five picked families each contributing \$4000.00 each could certainly get one big enough to keep them separate except in their work.....I do not have to explain to you the advantages of [co-]operative buying and selling....providing there is cooperation.

(by the way just picked up a huge copy like new, of the van Nostrand Scientific Encyclopedia for \$5.00)

Fred¹⁵⁵ I would like to keep in mind that though I may not answer a question immediately it does not mean that I am not concerned....generally it takes a few days to get around for me to do anything since I am on a tight schedule. However I do keep all your letters so that I can refer to them as the opportunity arises. Also bear in mind that what you write is as d far as I am concerned very important and determines or will determine many of my actions. The letters are also read by P. B. whenever he has dinner with us and can manage to spend a little time with us

My wife Ella May has asked me to mention to Claire that an apology and a letter will come following this one.....I know that she understands the work a woman with four children has besides working to help me save money. We will have to save close to Seven thousand in order to arrive there with Five.....five hundred for a bond, a thousand for passage etc., but events are shaping themselves. And with a little luck we will be there soon. We have to continue putting \$50. a week away to reach our goal and not too far from it now.

Are there any items that you would like us to pick up for you while we are yet here and we could bring it in as ours/? We would also like to know the sizes you wear for let's say sweaters clothes of different kind. Please don't hesitate I know the

conditions you left under were very trying....and since I never saw you I can't even guess....

I have not been able to buy any of those wooden footlockers....as yet and to me they sound like the *idle* ideal solutionwill they keep trying in the meantime I thought perhaps I may be able to interest a local woodworking shop to build me fifty and share them with others, providing the price is right.

By the way during some small talk with my doctor (homeopathic) he mentioned the kit that is sold by a small homeo drug store that contains numbered vials which for his patients who travel around and call on him from different parts of the world for advice. Enclose you will find a list I have compiled from your letters, excluding the last wherein you mentioned meters & etc which I will investigate for both of us, add or detract as you think fit, what I have is not mentioned and will be freighted anyway but I do not have for instance a sewing machine and I am wondering if it is not better to buy there than here ? I did not take a week off for summer vacation as I was supposed to instead earned another weeks salary by working and since I have another week coming in August 23, you will receive then a few cartons I am sorry that I pushed the mailing date back but you understand, a hundred dollars is a lot of \$\$. Well, finally I managed to purchase some of those foot lockers you spoke to me about, got six of them for thirteen dollars, need at least five more to take care of all the books and records, kitchen stuff ... they look as though they can do the job. I can get all the details from them and start now in packing. I wish to be prepared regardless of the exact date I leave. And assuming that it takes about six weeks to deliver (or more) I would like to be there and ready to receive it upon arrival.

I expect to go for a retreat near Boston for a few days. A complete rest and fast for two or three days. While I am there I wish to personally visit the Northern for inspection and understanding of the machines you spoke about and maybe buy them on the spot....But for a few days I must bring everything to a halt, in the silence where I can relocate my center and attempt to grapple with my own inconscience and darkness. This August has been one of the hottest on record, besides that it has been close to a year and a half since I took a short rest. Kenneth Hurst may come along and also rest. 

Unfortunately as yet I have not been able to buy a Scott's catalogue, but it will come around, so be patient. (includes tarot book for Clare[) & plant diseases, magazines]

After a week or two I would like to send you two or three cartons with your permission, just in case anything should happen, I would like for these books to be in our possession, that deal on the aspects that interest us in the way of making a living;

farming, machinery carpentry, radiation, etc., They will weigh about thirty lbs each. The limit allowed by postal regulations. I am not interested in this type of music, but I am interested in seeing one of our friends succeed. Another one you probably know decided to stay in U.S., Evangeline who married recently and is concerned about her husband's carer, believes that there will be some safe places in U.S., this sounds very strange to me, but then again that is why the Self is so difficult to discoverrationalization is so subtle and penetrating a process, it pervades all the real[m]s of our being. It is simpler to surrender oneself and accept destiny rather than weave a garland of lies.

I accept P. B. version and what I have thought out myself, there will be chao[s] and devastationthe northern hemisphere will be uninhabitable for <u>many</u> years....and I am not God who knows where the pockets of civilization will be ? Nor are they.

The question of land, is still the main one and I am constantly referring back to it....but there is no solution from this distance more and more I realize that reading on these subjects....one must be available on the spot....but this much I have realized that

the big city is not the cultural center, only from a business point of view should it be regarded,¹⁶⁴ for if I manage to bring what I have with me what they could add to it?.

Well Fred I have a project ahead these motors will keep me busy I must try to understand it in its entire context, [them in their context],¹⁶⁵ also ways to keep gasoline (I have a few government pamphlets) for let's say two years. I will buy nothing without consulting you first, and even then with caution. So any information you pass on to me will be scrutinized.

If it at all become possible to take in some of the country through snap shots please do so, I would of course pay for them. But it would be interesting. I understand that Otavalo is only one degree further north of the equator, now I think it's all right, but have not discussed with P.B. [who is out of town], ¹⁶⁶ as yet[,] but from my understanding too strict a precision in these matters is foolishness. The books that were mailed to you are clearly mark Libres, (books) I do not think there is any duty on them but let me know whatever the outcome is)

The price you mentioned on records is high. I bought mine and can still do so for three dollars each (the best). So it will be wiser I think to put all that I have in one foot locker, well protected and shipI think there is over a hundred fifty long playing type....

Fred the reason that I spoke to you so persistently about a hacienda[;] although I cannot possibly know anything about it was due to certain considerations. Dear Fred,

Here it is Sunday again, and now that I spend it at home with the family, it's the day I look forward to....besides it includes a letter to you all and that's like having friends share with you what one likes. Charles I'm sure will write to you soon.....I think the house has been sold. I advise caution....and for him to precede slowly gradually, feeling his way about....he should know from previous experience. Has Tea got mineral content? Anyway it seems that signs and conditions are starting to shape our movements. P. B. has told me that Mike Franz and his wife have left for <u>Chile</u>, his wife is pregnant and with a child....I think he has done the right thing....if for no other reason than to remove himself from Dan's influence. P. B. thinks I should get plates done here in this country so there goes another two hundred dollars....Yesterday P. B. came to where I work and took me out to lunch, Fred no matter how many times I see him, and I have spent whole summers with him, amazes me. I am getting older and he is getting younger ***** we spoke of many things in the short time we were together and will try to repeat what I believe you should know.

First, it does not seem to matter too much about the relative safety of the fall out problem in respect to the dry or rainy areas...it is either washed down and reaches the earth or it remains in the dry areas in the atmosphere which is just as bad, in either case the difference is negligible....which naturally would help us in the selection of land or homesite. Secondly, he holds out some hope for peace <u>if</u> at present the two leaders of the great powers and can get together and really compromises- naturally all his efforts

Remember these bombs will make a large part of the earth uninhabitable for years as a matter of fact one objection that I had to Ecuador was its nearness to the northern hemisphere, and weak central government which might be unable to meet and cope with the thousands that will drift down into the southern hemisphere The entire economy will become defunct and that's what I find so amusing about people that want to hoard money...and gold....onl[y] the habit will prevail the



I do not[;] it is just that they force me [think that way]¹⁷⁷ to by their actions, but as I mentioned to you in my previous letter it is impossible to measure and gauge the extent of upheaval that will prevail...and in business matters I have found that P.B. is unpractical however this does not in anyway detract in my appreciation and devotion, it is true a few[,] with quality and character can do what many cannot and this is a point in favor

A small hacienda is still in my opinion that best out providing that it is self sufficient and capable of many aspects.....but where are the few.....four or five families that can put up the money for such an enterprise? And work like an ox if necessary to keep it independent and self supporting....and of course the distance it provides from centers of population [is very important]

Anyway we will have to return to our original plan and work towards a solution for ourselves before we can help others. But I know that others will follow me[,] including I think some with a little more money than I have.

In my last letter I may have sounded a bit pessimistic but please believe me when I say that if anything I am not stating all my convictions on the seriousness of the situation, and I also can understand and appreciate your point of view. The point is that a few heads put together may come up with an answer.

I would like to mention in passing that my preference is for weather that is not warm or hot, for I do not know how to prevail against the heat....and besides it is much easier to work in cool weather, but that is a trifle and remember I am speaking about warm weather that we are accustomed to having in N.Y. which reaches 90, and is always very <u>humid.</u>

Anyway your judgement in these matters is good enough after all we are both human in our toleration limits. And that's sufficient so just try and keep me informed. A Geiger counter is a must, are there any for sale there reasonably or should I get one here?

Those of them that I mentioned to you about purchasing the hacienda are very pleased when they heard about your willingness to help them in whatever way you can. I know that you will like this bunch. They have learned to be balanced and respectful of the others persons right as an individual nor did they tact upon themselves the role of teacher....and give themselves airs, for when they did....I pointed out their simple humanity with mine own. Most of them, I should say all of them were in the army at one time or another

Please do not buy any books until you get from me a list of all the books I have which I am in the process of compiling now....they include many books on tantra yoga. There are too many for me to mention offhand. But with care and consideration they should last even unto our grandchildren. I am bringing them for that reason, and they will cost more to freight than I am willing to spend.....if my figures are right it will cost about \$200-300 just to transport the two thousand odd volumes, so Clara please be patient.....for many health books and cook books and drawing books are included. I will take your advice and ship them altogether, about twelve footlockers full. I will do[,] or am doing all the packing myself, everything that I can do, I will – and thus reduce expenses somewhat. I have repaired all my electric appliances and will bring them along rather than give them away....(what you recommended)

To your list of foods to eat frequently in order to help the body throw off strontium add broccoli .

The U.S. government is selling to defence agencies in this country for a hundred dollars a kit for use of, in case of war....I am inquiring, and trying to find out what it includes, supposed to be for use in radioactive fal[l]out, this may be the very thing I am looking for. I have a great deal of difficulty in trying to explain to others the seriousness of this problem, no mxxxx matter what part of the world one may be in. And I think, I do not know, that when it happens it will be wise not to eat any food that is growing at the time, rather should it be stored as Joseph had to do for the future, and furthe[r] at that time and for two or three weeks following, we should stay under shelte[r] In other words all that we know about how it operates should be put into use. Those who tell me otherwise simply do not understand the problem, although I agree with them about the equator being relatively the safest place from fall out....all this I will in our letters explain as we go along. Just as for instance in last week's times it was definitely ascertained that those bombs exploded tend to distribute the following fallout <u>in the same latitude</u> [-] enough for now, more will follow.

In speaking about P. B the way I did, I uttered what I felt was true, and as an intuition in his presence, I do not ignore them. I mention this to you in confidence, but a very transparently clear vision that I had some years ago convinced me that the complete and final enlightenment came. For I saw his beloved face, just as one would see the scu[l]ptured bust, high in the xxxxxxx blue sky....and it was radiant....in the flash of a second, lightning struck it....and in the twinkling of an eye the supreme

Are there any bikes available there?

A couple degrees north of the equator does not matter much in P.B.'s opinion concerning fallout, and if I could add my two cents, that would not be the problem. So that Otavalo should be looked into.

Eva married a musician, and got him interested in occult studies, has become a vegetarian, of course for me this is all uncertain...but since she now has a child her entire attitude has changed about leaving U.S. and it's natural to be frighten...so am I but the future looks that way to even the ordinary man...underneath the superficial awareness there is this dread of an approaching cataclysm...they too suspect. Even Russia feels that the tail (china) is wagging the dog. And it would not surprise me if like Blavatsky said many years ago the white and yellow race will exterminate each other or be involved in a war of such proportions. This month will be extremely critical, if we pass through it we will have another year of grace. But with all this Eva's inwardly afraidI feel it and know o[f] i[t] through its existence in my own self. I have a dinner date with them this week, if there is any change I will let you know....



Dear Fred and Clara,

This letter should have been written to you a week ago but because of a few developments I have prolonged it, perhaps unwisely, to this date. I am writing to you from my new address, which is 8835-Tobias Ave., Panorama City, California, (Apt. #4) Tel. Empire 4-2687, and I'm in my bedroom typing this letter on my new typewriter (An Olympia portable). I'm not used to it yet so I have made a lot of mistakes in typing. But to get on with more serious news...I went to the consul again here in L.A. and he gave me the same story...I have to write to Quito and so on...I told him about what you told me but he said you were misinformed . What a hard nut he is. I've given up on him. I don't think he can do anything for me. I wrote to Jim Covell in San Francisco About a week ago and told him to enquire at the consulate there. He sent back very good news. The people there are just the opposite....very anxious to help. The consul, a Mr. Leonidas Baquero, assured Jim that I would be given prompt service and that the visa would take about 3 weeks (Travelers visa immediately upon evidence of proper fulfilment of conditions to be met: character, health, finances, etc.) I have decided to get an immigrants visa, and not take a chance of running into trouble later if I tried to apply for one later. Besides the consul told Jim that "I do not feel it is a wise course of action to go into the country on a travellers visa and apply for an immigrants visa once there. Though everyone has known of people who have had to hire legal protection before they finally succeeded in getting what they wanted. It can be done that way, but it can

be more bothersome and...what is more...even more expensive in the long run than to complete the process beforehand and clear away all obstacles before going down.—In this case, you are pro (I overran the quotation)"

At any rate Fred I filled out the papers you sent me, all 3, but I don't think I'll need them. The consulate in S. F. gave Jim a new application to fill out and which I have. It is different from any of the others but in essence it is the same. I'm filling it out and mailing it to him, and see what happens. If any further delay should arise I will get the travellers visa and take my chances.

Now that I have sold the house and am living in the apt. with my parents I can think of what needs getting done, especially in regards to things to bring (machinery). By the way Harvey Hanley just phoned me up this morning (he just got back from a 3 week business trip to Chicago) and told me he has made a good deal on his burner invention and final papers are being drawn up to sign this Friday . He's leaving for Brazil in early spring. But to get back to what I was saying I am keeping in close correspondence with Tony and we are working this matter out between us. We are getting prices on all pieces of machinery and lining up the ones we will buy. I think I told you I was going to New York City first before coming down, I will then join Tony in working out the last details and final purchasing of these items. The only thing I will buy before leaving California is the shredder. Temple city is not far from here and I'm going to see the manufacturer of the shredder soon and see If I can't get it cheaper. I am enclosing the brochure they sent me. What do you think of it? Is it worth while buying it? When you get through reading it please send it to Tony.

Conditions here at home changed a little, that is the tensions have lessened for now and there is less friction. This does not change my plans any though...I'm still going alone! There is something I am considering at the moment and that is whether it is wiser to leave before the holidays or wait and leave immediately after New Year's day. I've weighed the pros and cons in my mind and have not reached a decision yet.¹⁸⁰ What I'm thinking most of Fred is you. I know how anxiously you have awaiting my arrival and that your funds are getting low and that I have holding you up from going ahead and buying a place of your own and not waiting for us. Would This cause any hardship to you if waited till the Beginning of January? If you think I should be there as quick as possible please say so. I Don't particularly want to stay another month. As you know I was planning on leaving by the end of November. I still may because as I said my mind is not made up yet. If I stayed I could save about another three hundred and fifty dollars...with this we could buy a lot more machinery or whatever we need. Of course it also depends on how soon my visa will come through. More on this in my next letter.

I have 8 foot lockers packed already. I looked up the allied address you gave me. They want \$72.00 per 40 cubic feet or for 2000 pounds the same (whichever is greater) I also called up another company in L.A. and they asked me the same. Tony sent their address and he thought it would be cheaper but it does not seem this way. I'll work

this out easily. Do you want the pulleys and the ³/₄ inch pillow blocks sent to you now? Or should I put them in with my things? I didn't quite understand if you needed them right away. Please clarify. By the way what does a Volkswagen cost? Tony also sent the description of the generator. I will get one also.

I plan on coming by plane...cheaper and faster. I'm feeling better now. The change has brought about a different daily routine which is welcomed from the old. I don't think I would like to live in an Apt all the time. It's alight for a while.

Poor Olga.. she is probably wondering what has happened. I've just been too busy. It takes time for me to right spanish. I have the letter written in English but translating it is slow. I will have to send her one and soon too. I hope she doesn't think its intentional. Have you seen her....perhaps Alan has and has explained things.

You know Fred this freedom of ties is all new to me and I have get used to it. I've got to keep up my strength with this. I hope you are all well. Have not heard from P.B. about anything new. There is lots¹⁸¹ of talk about disarmament here but I think they will not be willing to give in to each other sufficiently enough to bring it about. When you get right down to the facts nobody wants to make sacrifices in order to get something. That is why I also believe that even if they want to get together on this they are incapable of doing it. You are right the W will come will suddenness and with unexpectancy.

I don't have anything more to say to you for now Fred so I8LL close9 (this typewriter is tricky). I' also pressed for time. I hope that you are getting some idea where the best land is. We can get things underway soon with Gods help.

Take good care of yourselves – please, there is nothing so important and try to tolerate your restlessness a little while longer, for I am of the opinion that soon – as Charles arrives – things will start coming to a head.

As for myself there is really nothing essentially new to report . . except a brief item.

P. B. has left . . . and is incommunicado, anyway for a while[,] a few months[,] none of us will hear or see him. No correspondence will be answered, xx therefore it would be wise not to write to him, at least for a while or until we hear otherwise. In the meantime Ken and myself have a few items to clear up for him and ship to storage for eventual transfer to (?). And from there who knows? {Checkmark}¹⁹⁴

I was very strange and I certainly should have taken notice of it, I who am convinced of my keen perception. But sometime before he left, he began to see me much more than usual. We spoke a great deal and many details were brought up to the surface that were left in obscurity to long. . . I began to better understand and in {anx} for my life there is no greater creativity than to participate in true knowledge

At any rate he gave for me to consider the entire file he built up on S. A. and to Ken to handle private and personal affairs with whatever help I can contribute in my [spare]¹⁹⁵ time. At the last luncheon we had together, I felt very much inclined to kiss his hand, it was unexplicable, and as I told myself to stop being childish I remained content to warmly shake hands with himuntil the next time. As I turned around to look at him as he walked away I felt like running after himbut he turned around and smiled at me.

A week later Kenneth call me and told me that he had seen P. B. suddenly off. A quick short call and P. B. told Ken that he was leaving would he like to see him off ...and then gave last minute instructions. I sometimes feared for his safety but through the mail he assured both of us. Yes metaphysical knowledge is one thing it's actual realization in the mind another. I have known P. B. from the time he came to N.Y. in 46, and through all the years my familiarity has grown to respect, honor and cherish the presence and memory in my heart. Sometimes and often enough our common humanity allows us to make comparisons, such as the prophet of gllo gloom role that Bernard assumed, but soon enough it is driven away, it's faults bloom and become an awful weed but not in the garden of Allah.

He has been quietly working for the past year and a half when all seemed so forlorn, but now he says that there is hope for the best but prepare for the worst. Which oncea again brings me to exodus.

Since I have made up my mind to try and get there with 5000.00 [clear]¹⁹⁶ it will be necessary for me to work up to Feb. I must allowed 800-900 for fares, 500 for freight, have at least a minimum amount of clothes for all[,] then there is the incidental expenses, like fees for immigration, bribes for doctors certificate, etc on top of that I must buy generators radio, motor down there, tools....preferable power tools, I am

speaking to [you] above board ---there are no reservations in what I am saying, no implications that I have not made explicit. It may even be necessary for me to organize a number of us to help the others, but especially if God preserves my strength ... P.B.

Incidentally the ones you think are so capable of helping themselves-even though single are not necessarily so self-reliant. I want to mention to you[,] and in confidence[,] that another has dropped out with good reason. Jerome Fischer whom I think you once met has had a nervous or mental breakdown...whatever you may want to call it...the important point here is to be very careful should he try to communicate with you.

after¹⁹⁷ the psychiatrist got finish with brainwashing him, he has rejected all . . . including P.B. And this is natural. he must regress, in order to re-acclimate and integrate with society, which he once rejected, in order to become balanced again.

I try to point out that nature abhors secrecy in our own mind and will seek out, one way or another. But the mental rigidity he surrounded himself with, prevented even the slightest light to enter, frustration can easily become aggression, and even hostility if not properly manipulated.

Din[n]er with Evangaline convinced me that her [to]¹⁹⁸ too much preoccupation with a singing career, leaves no room for the serious problem of withdrawal, although she has a fine husband...one that is capable of lending her direction and support. In a sense P. B. has left to Kenneth and myself the awareness to follow the various threads among the few questers left here. But I seriously doubt if more than those few [who] are willing to make the effort will see this thru. Time and destiny has been gradually weeding out, and there is no averse [criticism] or unfriendliness meant by this observation. {Checkmark}¹⁹⁹

As of now it will be an uphill fight all the way...in terms of work. I do not have to point out that this trip will be in the nature of an expedition, with such a large family. I will soon be packed, then we will live with my sister in law, so that I could [c]ut out some time and thus shorten my stay in N.Y. If it is at all convenient I would like for you to categorically list the possibilities open to us. What you say to that? Our first operation will necessarily be homesteading, yet simultaneously we must try to realize an income in the shortest time...and prepare a hideaway. Charles I believe will cooperate intelligently, although of late he has been somewhat depressed, I'm sure that some direction will remedy that situation. Included with Charles, I know that I can count on these people to get involved within the foreseeable future. Kenneth Hurst, Michael Damiani, Myself & family, Cosmo Sheridan among these people {illegible} is the nucleus of an improvable society. It should be within our reach to buy a farm for Ten thousand that is producing and with you the choice is unconditional. Anyway you cho[o]se, join us, xxxxxxxx or build alongside of us, we prefer to have you state your terms....you can maintain complete independence, or work with and thru me to help


the others but I think we should carefully consider, the contingency within which life will be held. If you feel uncertain and insecure, and you certainly should[,] not personally knowing any of us except charley...even though I claim that these friends are of higher calibre than you may have met in the west coast.

Yet you would be justified in holding off decision until you know them personally. This I understand, and of course a great deals depends on the local laws prevalent in that area. But this above all & I think we should bear it in mind....regardless of the outcome let us remain friends. Even with those that stay behind.

I do not expect you to write as often as I would like, nor can that be helped...in my own case there will be less and less to write about as I start packing and preparing. On the agenda is a big item: the visa.

Another box of books is starting to fill up and soon will send it off to you....waiting for the new Scotts.

Well Fred....

This letter has a lot of explaining to do ! But before it does that and it will certainly go around and around, there are some prefaces.

XXXXXXXXX To begin with....I must mention and if I did it before I don't mind repeating myself-an unqualified admiration for the guts you showed in breaking all your ties and leaving under the strain and stress of your illness. I cannot speak too highly of it, and furthermore the lack of <u>all</u> negativity in reference to it in your letters. This is remarkable. I salute you I bring this up in direct relationship to your problem. I imagine that you must have often thought of returning to U.S. and continue treatment

or at least stand by until some judgement can be reached on the problem. And now delay follows delay, also you are faced with a diminishing income (savings); please do not think I am unaware of the extent of your involvement ... personally. Now comes the important point; suppose and suppose only that the summit conference guarantee[s] some form of peace for another two years[,] let's say two years for no one knows in these matters with any certainty[.]W]ouldn't it be feasible for you to return for treatment? On the other hand if it should come to be otherwise and we know that the big puff is on its way let's say in June (which seems to be the time wars are generally started and in this one the climatic conditions must be brought into consideration) I say would not this be better than for you to jump into any premature activity? Now mind Fred, I am not saying that the big puff is not coming[,] all I am trying to get across is that you must think first of your health[!] But unfortunately if it comes off, then for you to come here would be like literally jumping out of the frying pan into the fire. Believe me you will never know how close we were to it last September. Do you understand. I want to keep you informed, above boardno reservation. So if any question arises please send it forth. Nor must you think or infer that in anyway I am restraining Charles; on the contrary I think he is doing well, the umbilical cord is being cut, and with conscious intent and understanding...spiritually, I mean that it's not just an emotional[/]reaction. He is now holding on because there is a very good possibility that in rezoning of the property he owns...a great heap of money will come his way. In either case, he already has more than I have (and who hasn't) also at the same time waiting for his visa, before flying here. so I look forward to seeing him soon.

Upon his arrival I am sure that we will spend at least three or four days together in continuous discussion. He will, when you see him be fully acquainted with all details as to operation andes. But while here a few last minute purchases can be made during the time of the day I am working so that no time will be lost at this end. All the items you mentioned and that I have enumerated will be covered. But in passing I wish to mention that I have no intention of competing with the Indians in farming, that would certainly not be the way. On the other Hand you are overlooking the magnitude of the fallout problem [masons have this idea]²⁰² which will be on a wide scale, nor can it be answered simply in a [tried] business fashion like Seigmeister had his representative do[id] recently[caret]²⁰³ with Mr Kenneth Hurst. By the way I would like you to keep in mind that Kenneth has undertaken a great deal of correspondence for me and lightens my load somewhat...we work together like a team, since he is reliable enough for P. B. in very personal matters you can understand why I trust him in this. Besides keeping in touch with J. Lovewisdom, B. Masson, and x very recently Seigmeister (I don't think it matters how the name is[/]spelt, and besides it's hard to keep up with them) Anyway besides my own file on these matters, I have P.B.s[,] also the collecting and collating of information has not come to an end....the facts count, this

should not discourage you in any manner, human frailty being what it is we must make allowances for contingencies in spite of ourselves, but to continue....since I do not correspond with Bernard for instance, Kenneth does and very discreetly too. On the other hand he wishes that I should include in this letter recognition of your letter to him correcting some point of view expressed by the Brazilians.

[(as I called them) & Thanks you very much for coming to the point immediately. (Your answer was welcomed & to the point) I can understand the scientific point of view – but you must try to grasp the situation in regard to farming.]

[P.S.²⁰⁴ Send anything you want to old address unless I specifically point out to you by letter otherwise – even if I should make the move all mail would be forwarded, - O.K.]

And²⁰⁵ on a few points I know for certain that they do not know what they are **‡** talking about. Nor is it necessary for I am well acquainted with the advantages that Brazil offers ...especially from an economic point of view. But that is not in question at the moment.

I would like you to write or get in touch with Jacques Masson for me and question him as to his impressions on Brazil not only for me but more so for two of our friends that intend going there soon (March) and by the way Jack's hunch is correct...that entire part of the world is now under investigation by P.B. . . . at any rate don't let out that you know, at least for the present. The last of his trunks has been shipped to the west coast but his presence remains ...how strange!

I think that his work there is on a spiritual level and not for other reasons as one might supposed , from a distance The letter to the dept of Immigration to Quito is on its way, I have started the ball rolling in that direction.

Kenneth has undertaken to purchase the Zenith transistor purchase priced here is 170. including tax. Do you want one for yourself? or let's put it this way do you think that one among our group will be enough? You see Fred, even Bernard is under the opinion that the major problem will be earning a living...whereas I disagreed. The major issue will be survival. The consequences are so fantastic that even considering the years Bernard spent with the problem he gave up as {insolvable}...there was a negative answer in his supposition that a high calcium diet with a low intake was the solution ... my answer is that this is only partially so...and to depend on the body intelligence to choose the right foods is avoiding the problem...we have to present the body with the right foods whatever they may be. I know of these others that have written to P. B. expecting some sort of letter but between you and me, they will not be answered. Not for nothing is P. B. incommunicado. They must now stand on their own feet...and ma²⁰⁶ make their own decisions. For six months none of us will hear from him...I am continuing in my Spanish class even sporadically is better than none. I will have some background in it.



As for being depressed or elated this is the time for philosophy to step in. My problems are my own and I want to solve them, I would not let anyone interfere in this matter, for how else can I grow...and I don't mean the bank account. But as you say we are all in the same boat so let's smile even in while in pain...it will help.

By the way some one offered to sell me a station van...Volkswagen for two hundred & fifty dollars, 1956....would it be worth all the bother? Buying and shipping, I know that Charles was interested in one and unfortunately is not here.

As for the kind of world that is coming will have to wait and see in the meantime lets apply all that intelligence, good graces and destiny that is ours onto this huge problem...I have started tighten my belt considerably and I ask you to wear your patience girdle just a little while longer

241 - 246 Letter to Fred, Clara and Alan November 10th, 1959

Dear Fred & Clara & Alan,

Received you last letter [& gave it] a lot of thought and I have come to [a] more clearer vision of what I am going to do. I was very sorry to hear about your lip Fred...I wish there was something I could do at this moment to help you. I have carefully noted all you have said....it is a difficult decision to make, whether to go back to Texas for a while or fight it out in Ecuador. I don't know what to say in this regard. Meditate on it as much as you can and I feel that inner help will show you what to do. I will only say this to you Fred, if you should go back to the States for the cure and your money runs low...I will do everything I can to help you get back to Ecuador and get started...I mean this sincerely. Do you have to go back to the States with Clara and Alan? Perhaps you can let them stay in Ecuador and you can go back alone. It would save some of your capital. At least let Alan remain. How long would the cure at Hoxey clinic take? A month?? Two months??? I am asking these questions so that I can get some ideas to help you with some of the problems involved.

Now here is what my plans are.... I have decided to stay till after the holidays. There are many good reasons that are urging me to stay longer. For one thing - it's going to take me at least²¹² till the end of this month to get my immigrants visa. 2. – if I stay till Jan 1st 1960 I have a chance to make over \$900. more than I have. 3. The other piece of property that we have is pending a City council decision that is coming through any day and the picture looks very favorable that we will get the new zone for it. This would mean a quick sale for it. We have the buyers ready to buy it at around \$50,000. and maybe more and not less. Out of this I would get at least another \$10,000. cash for myself besides more within 6 months' time. Right now I have \$5,038. (five thousand thirty-eight dollars in the bank in my own account. As soon as I quit my job I shall get my retirement money which is over \$800. and the money from the sale of my Buick which should be another \$700. minimum. All together this makes \$6538.00 cash in the hand so to speak. I could pull out December 1st if I wanted to. But If I stayed one more month I could save all the money I make in the Post Office plus the Christmas overtime plus the money I make teaching privately. This is the \$900. minimum I quoted you. So If I left on Jan 2nd or third I would go with \$7500.00 or better in my pocket. And I haven't counted anything from the potential sale of the land we have. They are building apt. houses all over the place and it is really booming here. We are living aonly aone block away from where we own the land and there are four apt. built already and more on the way. Panorama City has become very exclusive and the prices on property is very high. We would have no trouble selling. So you could see what I am faced with Fred.

I read very carefully the part in your letter about not waiting because the land prices in Ecuador are going up. I am really torn between going now or waiting this extra month. I am very anxious to buy something and get started too, as yourself, but I have the inner feeling that I should stay just a little while longer. It is only the difference of one month...but I am keeping everything ready for a quick getaway if I have to. I went to see about airline tickets today and they told me that I will have to buy them now even if I went in early January. I have decided to fly all the way. First of course I will stop off in New York for a short period and then fly down to Quito from Miami. I will have to get busy and get everything bought and stored away ready for shipment . I want to get everything ready by the end of November so that I won't get stuck if I should suddenly get the guidance to go sooner. With me[,] Fred[,] I have learned to make very flexible plans-they always work out better that way.

I think the consulate in San Francisco will give me no truble trouble. They seem very nice and anxious to help me. La Merced sounds good. I was thinking if you find anything that looks exceptionally well and at a very reasonable price you may find it very good profit in by buying now and selling a little later. This is if it is cheap enough and if you think you would have no trouble selling before the <u>boom</u> [W.]²¹³or maybe it could be kept²¹⁴ till after the W when things will be a little more stable. But this is only a thought and you should think any move over very carefully. I know that you are missing out on a lot of good opportunities Fred and I am sorry that it has been on my account....because of all this delay. Do you honestly think I am doing a wrong thing by waiting longer? Maybe people are jacking up prices a little because of the coming holidays and they may want to sell at a larger profit now. maybe after the holidays we could talk some of them into selling cheaper. I don't know but it is worth trying. We will have be careful with them and not let them think we are rich Americans.

Don't worry about the shredder...I will buy it before I leave. I take it we need only one! Is this correct? I have to see if it is worth buying the motor along with it at the same time. Kemp sounds more reliable. Another thought just came to me....If you find a large enough piece of property that will be good for all of us write to me about it right away and maybe if it is a real good buy we could buy it right away....maybe a small deposit could hold it...or small amount down would buy it. It will have to be a good piece of land. What about La Merced is there any large enough parcel there at a good price[?] [M]aybe several several different parcels could be bought up at the same time. You probably have all the good land located and pinpointed. I may not wait and come down sooner I will have to see how things progress these next two weeks.

Another thing has come up that is not so important but needs trying [out] from this side. John Haindel wanted to see if we could import a few of those Indian blankets here and sell them and try to make some money. Can you sent two blankets without going to a lot of trouble?. enclosed is ten dollars...if you need more notify and I will

sent more money. I know you wrote to me about this before and I never looked into it. But now the idea may help a few others make a little money. I believe you said they were \$4 a piece.

In case you're wondering what is happening here at home....the Steel Strike has been settled at least for a while. The supreme court has upheld the governments injunction to get the workers back to work....and a few days ago everyone one went back to work. However the strike has weakened a lot of things. You can't get new Ford or Chevy pickup trucks for 6 months now. It has caused a lot of things to offset one another. I'll be glad to get out.

I almost have Olgas letter finished...and I shall send it soon...I'm sorry that I haven't been able to correspond more often. I've had to look up every word before writing it and this takes time. I hope she understands.

I haven't heard anything from PB...and I Don't know what he is doing. I am in close correspondence with Tony and we will have all the items you mentioned in your letters bought before we leave. I just received a letter from him last night....he is very busy with many things that have to be done....he has 15 foot lockers of books, 3-trunks, 3 crates, and 5 valises for now....& probably more later. So far I have 8 foot lockers full and I need more of them, two suitcases, and one trunk (which I haven't bought yet) I am beginning to buy all the small items and some large ones...will have everything we need with some to spare. Tony sends his very best wishes to you all. He has asked me to mention to you that you should excuse him if he hasn't written a lot lately. He said he will write more soon. The dawn is approaching for us all....with just a little more patience from us all we will soon begin to arrive there. I have all the trust and faith in Anthony Fred he is among the finest type person I have found on this earth. As you know Fred I am frank with you...although we have not actually been together and known each other too long I feel that we know each other well. It is hard to plan too far ahead sometimes and I feel that our sincerest thoughts are expressed this whole operation will jell successfully by the fruits and thoughts of our actions.

If there is anything I can do for you please let me know...Above all Fred don't fear, pray for strength and guidance for only in the almighty's will lies our peace and salvation.

Anyway, I felt obliged to answer the letters he has been deluging me with lately; and have written him today setting forth again the facts of Ecuador vs. Brazil. It probably won't do any good, since as you say, he is in the real estate business, and thus has an axe to grind.

251 - 254 Letter from Walter Siegmeister to Mr Waegner Nov. 6, 1959²²⁰

Dear Mr Waegner:

I received your address from Paul Masson who lately visited our magnificent settlement location on a subtropical island swept by Antarctic winds that add health and vigor to the air, and who described it was "another Tahiti". He suggested I write you and tell you of the immense advantages of this location over Ecuador, where I was with John Wierlo (alias lovewisdom) from 1940-1944, helping him as best I could, but he returned my kindness by slander.

About the time I visited you in Vista last, Wierlo came to me in Morongo Valley near Palm Springs, where I ran an organic food business, selling sunflower seeds, sesame seeds, etc. He arrived penniless after a motor accident, and I helped him by offering him a job to do my mimeographing. He had a very small mailing list of his own as he just came from Ecuador not long before and so I gave him my list, and he used it as the basis of developing his own business by slandering and abusing me in the eyes of my followers, so that they may look up to him as a greater man and send him the dollar bills. Since this business of slander proved very profitable, and brought both money and renown, he kept right at it, devoting much of his time to revilxxing and slandering me.

Whether what he said was 5% true, or 10% true, $\frac{1}{2}$ % true, it is a fact that no decentxx person will try to base his success by slandering and disgracing others. That was a typical Inquisitorial policy of the Catholic Church and since he regards me as a heretic (since I am a freethinker and oppose religious superstition), he feels it is Jesuitical duty to "combat the infidel".

However I never paid more attention to him than a buzzing horsefly, as it is contrary to my principle to harm others, even enemies, as I do not believe in Jehovistic revenge or to harm any living being. So much for him.

Your coming to Ecuador was a step in the right direction, but you have no future there. John and I were there four years and both know how difficult it is for an American to get suitable land or make a living as a farmer. I am enclosing carbons of letters on the subject, so no use to repeat. Masson thinks you should come here. But since I am not running any money-making²²¹ real estate scheme as John no doubt may want people to think, I have no reason to induce you to come here if you like it so much there. You may like it until your money runs out, but what future do you have there?

Since you once did me a great service by finding the Sebring and Istopoga location for Dr Clements and myself, where I bought a property and spent the happiest years of my life and where John came to work for me, I would like to return the service by finding for you the BEST SPOT IN LATIN AMERICA, for once you come here and inhale the pure invigorating Antarctic wins that sweep over our island, as against the dust and carbon fumes of Quito, you would realize the different as I do and as Mr. Masson does, though he was never in Quito. But Mr. R. F. J. Romano, of Sunnyvale, Calif. lately made a tour through Ecuador and Peru (where he got sick with dysentery) and came here and as soon as he entered this brisk beautiful climate of green halls and gushing mountain streams, much like Northern Calif. where he lives, he was enchanted and bought 146 acres of land from me.

All I ask is a trip here to see for yourself and then make your own decision. After all John did little traveling and instead of spending 26 years visiting 25 countries, all he knows is Ecuador.

Dear Dr. Siegmeister:

First, please let me assure you that I have the utmost respect and regard for your good self and your objectives. You have pioneered and contributed a great deal to the cause of natural living in our lifetime. Our correspondence ceased a year ago simply because we seemed to have reached an impasse, not because of any disinterest in your activities or bad feeling on my part.

I agree fully with you that investigations for a migratory move must be made in a spirit of pure scientific objectivity. As you say, facts are facts. Therefore, assuring you that I am completely open-minded, here are the <u>facts</u> that to date incline my friends and I toward Ecuador:

1. Our primary objective is <u>not</u> to make a living – but <u>survival</u>. If we were interested only in making a living, we couldn't do better than stay where we are. Therefore, our aim is to keep on living; for unless we can survive a possible atomic disaster, all else is futile.

2. The facts all point to Ecuador as being the safest haven from a survival viewpoint. This is not just based on study of fallout tables in the NY Public Library (although even this would surely be a more productive source of data than the Joinville Library—if there is one?) but on thorough and painstaking collation of fallout data released by the U.S. and U.K. governments. Don't you agree that this data must be authoritative and reliable?

3. All this data combines to agree that the heaviest amount of fallout in the southern hemisphere is in the 25-40 latitude. The Equatorial region receives far less because of (a) the bulge of the earth's surface at the equator (b) the double barrier of the Andes (c) the prevailing winds from both north and south are deflected before reach Ecuador. Ecuador is also 800 miles from the nearest possible target (Panama Canal) more than 4 times the distance of immediate fallout damage. I suggest you go to the

nearest U.S. Consul and ask to see copies of the Congressional Hearings last year on fall out; and also a copy of the 2-vol. U.S. Govt. publication, "Nuclear Explosions and their Effects."

4. All meteorological maps show prevailing winds from the north-east (USSR) coming straight down across the South Atlantic to Brazil. The Andes prevent them reaching Ecuador. (b) the Humboldt Current you keep mentioning comes up the East West S. A. Coast <u>only</u>; it does not affect Brazil at all.

5. Ecuadorean newspapers carry ads for plenty of land and haciendas for sale. And reports from friends on the spot there contradict your statements about volcanic ash. All the fruits you mention are available spray-free at low prices there. The volcanic soil produces 4500 pounds of potatoes from 100 pounds of seed potatoes, of finest flavor. The height of around 7,000 feet has not bothered other Europeans and Americans, and it obviates most insects. The highland natives are stable and stoical; less likely to run amok in a time of unrest. The Climate is no more damp that that of Joinville.

6. Remember, <u>our</u> aim is survival: shelter over our heads, and self-sustenance food provided by vegetable gardening (we have no intention of trying to complete with the Indians).

As I have said, I am open-minded. If you have any other facts and can back them up, I promise to give them utmost consideration. With all good wishes [and kindest regards,]

Well I'm in the thick of it now. Correspondence flying back and forth, packing on the side, the many little purchases that a women likes to make (something she never allowed herself). Of course I am still working (and naturally my employer is unaware of my intentions,) and I inten[d] to [continue]²²⁴ until the very last week. I have asked Charley to go ahead and buy the shredder. I expect today or tomorrow. You will be informed as to his expect arrival in Quito but I understand he wishes to stay here a few days in order to be thoroughly briefed. Recently Kenneth and I have been carrying on correspondence with certain people in Brazil. Our purpose obviously to find out all

about <u>it</u> (main problem: fallout) that we can. They informed us that according to the <u>1959 Anderson Report</u>, just released ...the heaviest fallout occurred in the 25<u>o</u> to 45<u>o</u> north latitude but that the 26<u>o</u> south latitude was unaffected or relatively so. We had the report in our hands and such a bareface lie I have not come across. For it is clearly stated that the next heavily infested area was 25<u>o</u>-45<u>o</u> south lat. I can easily accept their desire to live there, and even that their decision is the right one but why the contortions?

Anyway that problem seems reasonably shelved. As far human reason is concerned I have done all that I can be expected [be] do[ne]. . . .Next, I have ordered your book do you want it shipped or can you wait for charley? I believe that in one of my letters I mentioned to you that in my request to the Ecuadorean Immigration Dept I included you and Mr Falconi as friends (not for purposes of bond) I hope that you do not mind since I sent ahead such a letter . . .but rather oddly enough I received from Mr Falconi a card for the season's greetings[,] and he signed himself as a future friend. I hope he does not think that I am trying to take on any presumptions, perhaps you might explain this to him

Just received from Charley notice that he is already to come, but cannot because of his visa. The San Francisco consulate promised to have i[t] for him by the end of the first week in {illegible} as yet he has not been called. I told him to be patient . . . at any rate he is all packed and ready to go. The car has been sold {illegible} quit his job and [is]{[illegible]} wait[ing]. Kenneth has also sent off his {illegible}tte to the dept of immigration, he as mentioned <u>you</u> as a friend living in Ecuador.

There is no last minute rush except for the usual that cannot be done except at the end. At any rate all or most of the belongings that I have will be removed a month before I actually leave. At your suggestion[,] also try to keep in mind the number one problem we will have to face and which I think can only be solved by purchasing of a hacienda. Kenneth's resignation from the job is slated for and goes into effect March I , 1960. We will probably leave together for S.A. on or before the date I indicated. I want to avoid if at all possible spending any money foolishly by paying rent {illegible} it is wiser to immediately invest our money into land. When Charley arrives there you will understand more clearly our plans for survival. I shall speak to Dr. James Stephenson, in the meantime you go ahead and write him. He just cured a very good friend of ours a bad case of colitis....66 East 83rd Street. New York City 28. And please go on writing to me even if I should not answer. As I mentioned to you previously everything you mention will be considered, all your letters will be worked over. Should we get a hacienda do you think we will need yet a generator, especially that we prefer living away from populations centers? One package for you as arrived

Which is what Kenneth wants to do, anyway the solution is simple[.] P.B. has left behind for me to dispose of many magazines on health, I am bringing them along you may enjoy them. There is one

O.K. Fred,

The big push is on. I think we are all starting to converge to the same point of reference, and events seem to indicate very strongly the necessity to move faster[,] as of now. I expect to leave around March the first. As of now definitely fixed-whether[,] I reach my money goal or not. So does Kenneth. We will probably leave together. Naturally a great deal depends upon how soon we can get our visa. If any hitch should occur on the way you will be kept informed. But [for \$500 bond]²²⁸ I shall try to claim exemption on the grounds that I am bringing in machinery and tools of sorts. Not only are the generators included but I also hope to ship a shredder, Zenith, a few tools perhaps the guts of the washing machine, all the electrical appliances. As soon as Charley comes here we will go into a very prolonged and intense discussion. Every possible detail and aspect of operation survival will be fully dealt with. Especially on the purchase of a hacienda. So as to provide us with enough land at a minimum cost and with one purchase. At any rate among you[,] Charles and Clara you could probably find what will foot our bill. Then if any doubt comes along I am sure it could be efficiently dealt with even if it is necessary for one of us to fly down. Also when charley comes here we shall go over all your letters together and pick out all the most important items you have stressed in your letters. How serious are you concerning a hifi set? Let me know. I am glad you find Kenneth to your liking. After all P.B.'s son does try to live his father's (?) teaching and as sincerely as anyone I know. And this is unusually for in our culture the preacher's son generally turns out to be a drunkard. I have been (and so has Kenneth) been studying Spanish as well or as much as circumstances permit, we have at least some acquaintance with the grammatical structure/as a matter of fact it closely resembles the Italian. I am sorry that we could not manage to arrive sooner but I think your understanding is comprehensive enough to include some of our faults.

Take care of yourself Fred and remind Clara that all she request will be included. I had been with P.B. long enough as his kitchen and valet [man] to know the importance of home necessities.

Also I wish it clear that as soon as the ladies are paid, all income will go to repay Dr. Lozensky and Dr. DeVocht up to the limit of complete refund, while receiving a deed for 5 acres land free on their arrival here.

Copies of this go to the parties concerned. Mr. Moura is now giving me his 100% cooperation in preparation for your coming and is now conducting a survey of the land for subdivision into 10 acre tracts. A plan will be sent when ready so you can arrange reservations.

P.S. I²²⁹ am enclosing a letter from Mr. Paul B. Masson, one of my students, at Caixa Postal 32, Sao Roque, Sao Paulo State, Brazil, in reference to a group of vegetarians in New York going to South America. Also the address of a man who came to Quito, who will probably be disappointed, as I spent 4 years there from 1940-44 and know that THERE IS ABSOLUTELY NO LAND TO BE HAD except that it has one or more of a number of disadvantages not present here. I have covered the subject very fully in a letter I sent Mr. Masson which he forwarded to Waegner and Hurst, and to summarize: Most of the highlands of Ecuador is a volcanic ash treeless plateau except for eucalyptus artificially grown for firewood, owned by very wealthy hacienda owners who are not anxious to sell except the sale involves a big sum. The climate is cold and miserable in winter when it is damp and rainy, and it is impossible to make a living by competing with poor Indians. If Ecuador was better I would not be here. If this group goes to Ecuador because²³⁰ Mr. Hurst, who seems to base most of his calculations on fallout tables, believes there is less fallout there, what good will it be to escape fallout and finally become destitute because Americans cannot compete with peons who work for a few pennies a day and are terribly exploited by their wealthy masters, while the missionaries keep them pacified by making sure that each Sunday they become drunk and are found lying all over the highways and roads in a state of stupor. Thus religion stupefies their brains, and the rich hacienda owners enslave and exploit them. Can Americans face such competition? Besides fallout tables fail to consider ANTARCTIC WINDS THAT ARE MOST LIFE-GIVING AND MAN'S LAST PROTECTION AGAINST RADIOACTIVE POISONING. I spent 26 years of travel before I made my decision of the best location to escape radioactivity, and base my decision on the fact that the FURTHER ONE IS AWAY FROM THE RADIOACTIVELY CONTAMINATED NORTHERN HEMISPHERE THE LESS FALLOUT ONE GETS, REGARDLESS OF TABLES. I went to Peru first, 6 degrees south latitude, and found the entire town suffering from an advanced anemia that seemed identical with leukemia, and I myself felt sick until I escaped from there (3000 ft. altitude) and went to the coast to breathe the Humboldt Current Antarctic winds that sweep up the coast of Peru, but not Ecuador.

Dear Mr. Hurst:

Mr. Paul Masson sent me your present address and suggested I wrote you. I sent Mr. Masson my analysis of Ecuador vs. Santa Catarina, based on 4 years of residence in Ecuador, chiefly in Quito, though I visited nearly every part of the country and studied their possibilities for colonization. In Quito, in connection with the department of colonization, I attempted a colonization movement in the East Andes. I also studied the highland region from Cuenca, near where I secured land for planting to the Colombian border.

It is a grave mistake to base your plans on fallout data gathered in New York libraries, and to suppose that because a certain area, as Quito, Ecuador, is stated to have low fallout it is therefore superior to the more humid east coast, which is supposed to have three times as much fallout as the west coast. Such naïve reasoning is very fine, BUT IT IS NOT WHAT I ARRIVED AT AFTER 26 YEARS OF EXPLORATION COVERING 25 LATIN AMERICAN COUNTRIES, BOTH BEFORE AND AFTER THE ATOMIC AGE.

As a matter of fact, the city of Quito is enveloped in a blue haze of carbon fumes, since everyone in the city (at least when I was there), or most people, cook by carbon, which is cheapest. This fact was noticed by John Wierlo ("Johnny Lovewisdom) who was there at the same time. The carbon fumes in the air began to affect my lungs and I spit up heavy yellowxxxx mucus and started to cough like a consumptive. John remarked that I better leave Quito to save my health; and he went off to try to find land in the country. Finally we found an abandoned farm and house which we rented and planned to grow vegetables. The soil was just like the entire Ecuador highland soil, VOLCANIC ASH DEVOID OF ANY HUMUS, for which reasons the winds picked it up, as it had nothing to hold it, AND THE DUST STORMS WERE TERRIBLE. The dust filled the air, entered the house, covered everything. I got a new typewriter and in a few days the dust accumulated in it when I used it to such an extent that it put the²³² new typewriter out of commission in a few days. The same dust accumulated in my lungs. It made everything dirty, even inside a house with doors and windows closed.

We then started to plant a garden. We soon learned that the soil was completely devoid of humus and had to be irrigated, and the volcanic ash looked like desert sand. Either you must add humus by growing alfalfa and waiting a year or two until the alfalfa adds humus to the soil, or employ the usual Indian custom of using manure. Most of them use fresh manure and this infects NEARLY ALL VEGETABLES SOLD IN

QUITO WITH AMOEBIC DYSENTERY. I suffered from dysentery on and off during my study stay in Quito. Even fruits may cause it, since they drop on manured soil. With absence of heavy frost, the bacteria of the manure keep multiplying in the soil more than in U.S.

First I had a lung lung condition and nearly died from consumption due to carbon fumes in Quito air; then I suffered from dysentery from being Ecuador's manured vegetables, as nearly all are. Finally the oxygen scarcity of the highland air began to affect me and I came down with an advanced anemia. I rushed down to Guayaquil to save myself. In a few weeks the doctor met me on the street of xxx Guayaquil and said: "Why you are a different person. You have a rosy complexion and your anemia looks gone". Most Americans who settle in the Ecuador highlands must return to the lowlands at intervals to counteract the bad effect of the oxygen-poverty of the air at 10,000 feet. Indians born there have enormous chests, which enable them to take in more air and thus overcome the scarcity of oxygen, but the American born at sea level has comparatively small lung capacity and will suffer oxygen deficiency and anemia, because his blood cannot manufacture the number of hemoglobin that the blood of the highland Indian can.

If Ecuador was so wonderful, I would never come here. An American vegetarian who came there when I did was murdered and robbed by an Indian. This will not happen here, as the Germans of Santa Catarina are the finest people in the world.

Now, Mr. Hurst, it was most unfortunate that you contacted me when I was in trouble due to a Colombian gangster who arrived in Quito, and hearing of an American in town decided to give him the works. He skinned me alive by the cleverest scheme imaginable, based on a false scare. I was very upset at the time. I must have given you the impression that I was after your money or something of that nature, which caused you to stop writing.

I wish to say here that while I have personally invested of my mother and my money \$7500 during the past 3 years in relation to this project, on top of \$35,000 previous travel expenses, I want not a penny of this back and this is a NON-PROFIT enterprise as far as I am concerned. I will renouncex any financial gain from sale of land, now and forever. So if you think I am trying to knock Ecuador to induce you to buy land here, you are greatly mistaken. I am a scientist and philosopher and not a real estate man and am not trying to induce you to come here to get your money, as your silence and refusal to answer my letters imply.

For that reason, and not wishing to impose myself on a person who does not seem to want correspondence, I am referring you to the new manager of our project, Dr. L. H. Coate, editor of AMERICAN RATIONALIST magazine. I am sending him a copy of this letter, so that you may deal with him. I wish to add in closing that it is almost impossible for Americans coming to Ecuador highlands to earn a living, for to do so they would have to grow corn, beans and potatoes in competition with Indian peons who work for a few pennies a day, and this feudal feudal system of exploitation of Indians by rich hacienda owners makes it almost an impossibility for American²³³ farmers to make a living and meet low market prices fixed by hacienda owners exploiting Indians who work for a few pennies a day. Most of them have dairies or large herds of cows, and so obtain manure for fertilizing the volcanic ash to grow potatoes and other crops. The vegetables, as a result, are not only tasteless as all manured ones are, but cause amoebic dysentery. A Czech who I met in Ecuador told me to be careful to wash lettuce and other vegetables (especially lettuce) with potassium permagnate to avoid becoming sick with Amoebic dysentery. AT THAT TIME I WAS SICK WITH DYSENTERY AND THE DIARRHEA WAS TERRIBLE. It continued all the time I was in Ecuador, on and off. On the other hand, in Santa Catarina, which was a virgin forest and with humus-rich virgin soil only 50 years ago, with conditions like the U.S. during Colonial times, there is no need to use manure and there is no dysentery.

Next, Americans coming to Ecuador highlands will have as neighbors Quechua Indians, who are of Mongolian extraction and speak the Quechua language. As the result of centuries of abuse and enslavement, they developed a fear complex regarding outsiders, and are not friendly and not desirable neighbors, who will steal your crops if you don't lay awake all night with a gun and make sure your neighbors don't pick what you grow. On the other hand, in Santa Catarina you find a race almost identical with Americans – blond, blue-eyed, with the most beautiful women in the world. They are very friendly, and our own race, and certainly more desirable neighbors than Ecuador Indians. Also here you find a ready market for what you grow, as Joinville has 400 factoxries and shops and its population of 50,000 is in the market for fresh vegetables and fruits. It is easy to make a living. Most Brazilians have a natural aversion to dirtying their hands by contact with the soil and are aristocrats who will never lower themselves to work hard. For that reason Japanese and other foreigners coming here and growing tomatoes, potatoes, onions and garlic (the most profitable crops) really become rich.

You are assuming a great responsibility to advise your friends to go to a place so completely unsuitable as Ecuador based on a very hasty and superficial consideration of fallout data, which cannot equal my own 26 years study of climatic, agricultural, social, economic and political factors involved in colonization and finding the right place. In your reasoning, which seems to rest completely on fallout figures in the library you omit completely the SUPREME IMPORTANCE OF ANTARCTIC WIND CURRENTS, and the fact that scientists now say that regardless of strontium 90 content of soil and foods, the CHIEF WAY IN WHICH WE TAKE IN STRONTIUM 90 IS IN THE AIR WE BREATHE 24 HOURS A DAY, AND THE AIR FROM THE ANTARCTIC, which you get only along the coast of South Brazil, Uruguay, Venezuela and Chile, has LESS RADIOACTIVITY than the equatorial air so near to the contaminated northern hemisphere, where fallout is 5 times as heavy as in the southern. Could your reasoning be so shallow and unscientific as to conclude that the equator is a dividing line and that below it, fallout is 5 times less than north of it? That is silly. If fallout is 5 times worth in the Northern Hemisphere north of the equator, as compared with a region as we

have south of the Tropic of Capricorn, then it should also be 5 times as bad in Quito as here, on our island, where we get Antarctic winds, REGARDLESS OF YOUR FALLOUT STATISTICS. Also you might go to a place where these statistics indicate a low fallout and die from poverty and starvation as in the Ecuador highlands with its humusdeficient volcanic ash soil and poor, oppressed Indians to compete with, as compared with the wonderful economic opportunities to make a living here.

Since you refuse to write me, I suggest you write to Dr. Coate, for whom you may have more respect, without the unpleasant background of your last contact with me when I was besieged by a South American gangster who came here from Colombia and fled from the police after robbing me. The Germans here are the safest people to be among.

There is a lot I have to do now that I'm ready to leave. A lot of little things need finishing up.

As it looks now, I won't be able to leave till the end of next week around Friday March 11 or Saturday. I have to see someone coming down from San Francisco middle of week plus time to get things cleared up. I'll be working hard to get ready.]

[I²³⁴ will be going to New York city for one week before coming down so you will have to wait about 2 more weeks from today before you see me arrive. I have to go to N.Y. I will try to leave here (L.A.) as soon as I canmaybe sooner than end of next week

See if you can answer this right away Fred. I want to get you the Pulleys and pillow blocks before I shipped my stuff.

Needless to say I am anxious to arrive & see you all & begin getting an idea of Ecuador.

I received two letters from Falconi. Tell him thanks for me.

I feel almost like a chicken running around with its head cut off.

I will try to get the generator in N.Y. on its way when I see Tony.

I want to make sure I get everything done before I leave, so bear with me a little longer.

I will try to get the medicine down to you. Will see how situation is when I get to N.Y.

Well that's it for now. Oh yet it is \$25 for visa I must have written down wrong amount.

Dear Fred, Clara, Alan,

I received your letter Saturday night (Feb 13) I couldn't write yesterday and I have to wait to go to the bank todayso I'm sending you this letter as soon as I finish.

Maybe you didn't get my last letter yet....perhaps it got lost like you said. In it I explained development up to now....I received your last letter & Mr. Falconi's letter to me & the consul. I sent his letter to the consul and got a quick reply. They told me that

they realize what kind of a position I'm in but that there was nothing they could do till they heard word of acceptance of application from Quito. No mention of \$500!

Now that you have written me clearing up the delay it makes me really wonder what kind of brains these consuls have. From the very first I was ready to pay the \$500 deposit. I asked & asked if it was necessary to pay this money now before sending in application. Every time they said no....we have to hear from Quito before it will be necessary for you to hand us the \$500. I even spoke to the consul in person when I was up in SF. & was prepared to hand him my cashier's check. He wouldn't take it. What are you going to do with people like this.

Well let me get on. <u>Enclosed is the \$500 cashier's check</u> made out as you & Falconi asked. Have duplicate slip so take it from there.

I've been thinking that now that I have already made an appearance to the consul in S.F. & that I've now sent in my \$500 it may not be necessary to go to their office in S.F. again. This would save me time, money, & trouble. All I have to give them now is \$ {illegible} 8 or so for the cost of visa plus some photos. I could send this in by mail. A thought just came into my mind, perhaps Mr. Falconi could ask his friends in the Immigration Dept to include a few words along with my Visa to the S.F. consul saying that it will not be necessary to make another trip and visit in person to pick up the visa. If this idea does not sound good to Falconi....then forget it.

I have been giving your letter a lot of thought. Yes²³⁵ I received word from Tony about the new extensions on the W. He said P.B. notified him that all of 1960 is safe from the big puff. Spoke to Tony over the phone. Will write more of this in another letter.

My plans have not changed. I will leave as soon as visa arrives. Read you have decided not to go into hacienda Deal with tony. You seem very anxious to buy. Falconi's land right now. The \$2500 per {illegible} you mentioned may be a good place²³⁶ for land business & agriculture and it may be a good buy for value increase later but I haven't seen the land so I really can't say anything from here.

Personally I think \$2500 per {illegible}²³⁷ is high...I am not saying that it is not worth it!....And I'm not saying it will turn out to be a bad investment. This I don't know & it²³⁸ will have to remain to be seen. You want to buy one {illegible}²³⁹ and you xx ask me if I want to buy the other half. I've thought this out well Fred and I have decided not to buy the other {illegible}.²⁴⁰ Now please don't get the wrong meaning from this. I am still interested about starting some kind of Agricultural business & I will work with you on this just as soon as I xxx get down there.

My reasons for not buying²⁴¹ (1) The price is high for what I had in mind. True it is close to the city etc....but this point is not strong enough for me to invest \$2500 for 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ acres of land. I had a cheaper price in mind with a little more land.

(2) If I bought the {illegible} It would cost me \$4500, at least, for house & land. Almost all my capital would be used up. This cash outlay would be alright under different conditions but this is a matter of survival & not only a profitable Investment.

(3) Besides this the land is very close to Quito. This, I feel, is another disadvantage. Not much land is available near Quito & it cost so high like you said. What will happen when the others come? What could they afford to buy that will be close to this Falconi land? I don't believe there is any more reasonable land nearby. So this means they will have to go some where else. Now even though you may not be interested in the hacienda idea you've got to admit that being close to each other has a lot of advantages. In fact more advantages than disadvantages.

(4) Land a little further out costs less....plus the safety features about being away from the big city potential dangers & mental & other negative atmosphere. Maybe this Falconi land is far enough away but it seems that it will only be 3 acres that one could buy and then it will cost <u>\$5000 for the 3 acres</u>. Let us say as an example that good, or even decent land, further out costs \$500 an acre, or even \$1000 an acre (which I personally feel is high enough per acre when you intend to purchase a lot of it close The savings on this kind of land would help compensate for any together) disadvantages. For instance With less money shelled out for land you can use the savings in buying²⁴² a car or two to travel into town?²⁴³ Perhaps build better equipped houses with running water toilets, electricity. You can install power equipment irrigation pump or system if needed. - If you got more land for your money as you well know you can plant more things - Utilize your land different grow more trees - even a part of it could be just for growing fire wood. Whatever distance from city could be worked out by buying a small truck to take things into market. Don't you still have to take your products into Quito by car from the Falconi land?

(5) Have you given thought to the altitude of the Falconi property....it seems like it is above X- 9000 feet for sure. Does this limit the amount of things you can grow? I'm²⁴⁴ sure it does. What about papayas & mangoes & avocadoes & oranges & the rest of the tropical fruit. I don't think you can grow it at this height...can you Fred? Don't forget that when the <u>Boom</u> comes we don't know what kind of conditions will be created. We may have to survive strictly on what we can grow and what we can get close by. Of course I don't think this problem will be very severe in Ecuador. People have lived for thousands of years without outside contact. The fruits & vegetables may still continue to come into market without trouble. But still there are other dangers. Ecuador is fast becoming a popular & safe place to go too. This thought seems to be

hitting a lot of people. I am reading & hearing more things about Ecuador now than I have ever before. Only yesterday there was a big article in the L.A. examiner about how Ecuador & the whole Amazon basis could very well become the starting place of a new & great civilization...& what is more important it said that here was a safe place from Atomic Bombs {illegible} - fallout. About 2 hours ago I heard a news report that a boat had landed in L.A. harbor that was going to Ecuador. A group of people had gotten together and had left Oregon, picking up part of the party here in L.A. They want to get away from the hectic pace of life & <u>also the danger</u> of the A. Bombs & fallout. They want to grow cacao, in some tropical area. So lots of people are coming to Ecuador. Lots more may come. The best idea is to try to get more land. Even if you don't use all of it eventually it will be worth more as time goes by & Ecuador grows.

You²⁴⁵ know how California has grown & how desert land has become very valuable. The same thing is going to happen to Ecuador What about this cheap government land in the Sano Domingo area where the Los Coloradoes Indians are? Have you ever {illegible} the land? I don't mean we should buy that land. But there is plenty of land around that is not so expensive.

Fred I want you to know that I am going into all this not to discourage you from buying Falaconi's land. I can not see the complete picture – you may being that you are there and can size up things differently Fred I say this: if you really feel that you must buy some land & settle down right away . . . then do as you think best. If Falconi's land looks & attracts you that much then I can only say follow your intuitive feelings on the matter. I can't join you in buying the {cuadra}.....at least not for now. My intuitive guidance tells me not to.....besides all that I have said I have not seen the land.....I don't like to buy something I have never seen....especially something so personal & binding as buying property to live on. When I get down there perhaps I may change my mind about the way I feel. I know that this opportunity will not wait forever but this is a change I will have to take. If you feel that you want to buy all the Falconi land go ahead Fred I would not mind. If you buy part or all of it do you think you can sell it easily enough if you had to?

As I said before I want to get to work on the business-agricultural plans as soon as I arrive. If you The only thing I am saying here is that I feel I shouldn't buy land right now. You will have to decide on the Falconi land yourself. I will help you all I can with whatever you do. I am trying to be as practical as I can. I don't believe you can blame me, can you? My thoughts on this are not for myself alone but for you & the others also.

Maybe I can bring some or all of your medicine down when I come. I hope that you are feeling better. I can well understand the strain you must have gone through up to now. P. B. new decision will give us all more time to get settled. Who knows why P.B. has had these sudden changes come into view. I don't. I have faith in him and believe what he says. I'm sure there are many good reasons for whats happen. In a way I am happy that it has happened it takes the pressure off of a lot of things for a

while. We have all made major efforts....it would be wise to reflect deeply at what we have accomplished in this direction so far so that we can continue more sure footed

After rereading your letter, and feeling my way through a good part of it . . . I was relieved. Admittedly selfish, yet there is mixed some concern for your health, and I xxxx guess some worry over our recently come by acquaintance. At any rate Fred be a little patient with me. I have a great deal of figuring out to do ...and the circumstances are not the best for that sort of thing right now. But I will try as briefly as possible to outline a few ideas, when Charley arrives, and we spoke to each other on the phone about it, he can explain fully to you my position. He intends to follow through with what we spoke about briefly in the past letters.

In the meantime I would like to mention what is of great importance to you. I have pack all your packages very neatly between two cartons of books, I am [ready] to ship them to you, and I will do so, and assume [full] responsibility for them financially and otherwise....I will mail them to you this week unless you stop me. They will be mark Books, and it will be unsealed....but well tied, I think it will get through. Will you please allow me?

You mentioned in your last letter that the chance of war was put off until 65, this is not so, only until he end of the year...and that is as far as P.B. went.

Another point[,] when I mentioned to you about the approximate cost of freight for me would amount to a thousand\$ or so you seemed surprised. Try to keep in mind the size of my library, I believe that my library will fill up at least twenty foot lockers, and I have been selling quite a few, and this is one of the reason I am staying on to make a little more money. If I leave now I would arrive there with about 4400. after

paying bond, freight, and passage, if I could raise this about a thousand or two I will feel much safer.....I don't have that absolute trust in IT....or perhaps I feel that I should do all I can while I can.

For one thing homeopathic medicine works in very small doses so small that I have a lifetime supply in the area of a cigar box, and this is for all types and varieties [illnesses] that children might be subjected to. The dosage could very easily be slipped into an envelope or brought to you be Charles. In this matter[,] anything I can do for you <u>please</u> allow me to, even to setting up a business.



Upon arrival would like to have a house rented and waiting if possible as you suggested. N.Y. to Miami about 3-4 days, one day to Quito, and another day in case.

Dear Fred,

By now you probably have already gone to the Immigration authorities with Mr. Falconi. I am slowly gearing my mind to the point of getting ready to leave. Lots of little things remained undone because of this uncertainty about when the visa was coming through, but now I will have to go into high gear again. Every move I have ever made since first planning for this trip has had to be made with the upmost caution because of my parents interfering meddlings. As a result of this I have had to work twice as hard on getting things done. I must sound like I am very impatient with them.....I have tried to be as good a son as I know how, but some things will not change easily and can become real difficulties no matter what you do. There is a limit to everything. But you can't let these things get the best of you in spite of what is happening on the surface. In the long run some things happen for a purpose of instruction so one does not really have the right to complain too much...it has to be accepted as part of the sacrifaice of living in a personality. The important thing is to keep working and moving ahead on the path.

There are a few questions I want to ask you so that I can get a few things straight in my mind.

1. I am coming down with a 3 suiter suitcase and a small canvas type bag that I will be carrying with me....How is the weather right now? Is it warm enough to just include one sweater and not too²⁵³ much heavy stuff? I shall be carrying, or wearing most of the way, a heavy type overcoat. I want to bring only what I need till the trunks

arrive. Please advise how to dress as best you can. Do you wear a suit a lot when you go out to meet people? Do you thingk I should bring a real lightweight suit like for t[r]opical wear? Are suits and sport jackets available at reasonable prices? I have almost all I shall need for many years to come but I thought I'd ask this in case I thought I needed something when I got there. Do people dress casual when they go out or visit? I imagine they do....is it something like here in California? I have enough sweaters and light and heavy type waist type jackets....also a heavy three quarter coat beside the full leng[th] one I shall have to wear because of stopping off in New York. [No] matter how much you have you always wonder if you have the right things....especially if you are an inexperienced traveller like me. The point is that once I get down there I don't want to have to think about getting clothes so I want to make sure now.

2. About the trunks. I am in the midst of finishing packing. As soon as I get definite word my visa is here I will then close up everything and send it to Allied lines for shipment to E. First I thought I would only send one trunk on first and the rest latter. Then I thought it would be best to send all together.....2 fairly large trunks one suitcase and 8 foot lockers. (this is another suitcase not the one I'm bringing with me). I have decided to send everything on as soon as the Visa is here so that it will not be so long before it arrives in E. How long did it take you again? About a month or was it Six weeks....What do think of sending everything now? Do you think I should wait till I g[e]t to Quito first before sending for my things?

3. There has been a lot of talk and action on this matter of shots. Jim Covell in SF told me he got all the shots already....small pox (which is the only one the consulate here in LA and SF recommend, and which I got already) these others such as yellow fever, Tetn[u]s and cholera (tropical disease).....do you think it is necessary [to get them now?] If so can they be had in Ecuador if needed?

Those are all the questions for now. Let me know of i if there is anything else you need from here. I got 6 Popular Science, 6 Science & mechanics, 4 Popular mechanics, a Mechanix Illustrated <u>FARM</u> handbook a²⁵⁴ Tom Mccahill's CAR Owners handbook, and 6 issues of National Geographic Magazine. All are 1958 and older, . . . I picked them from a pile of stuff in a ussed magazine bookstore in LA....I thought these were the best there for use . . hand picked. Will keep eyes open for any more stuff. I think that Tony in NY would be in a good position to get some more good stuff real cheap . . . he works for a large book company there . . managed the place must have contacts for this and other kinds of material. Will talk it over with him when I get there. I looked in Goodwill . . . they didn't have a single magazine there. By the time we get through a[c]cumulating all these things we will have one of the best libraryss in all of SA. Have decided to ship on to you by mail right away.

I am getting my International driver's license at the Auto club of Southern California here in Van Nuys. Have application . . must fill out bring 2 photos with me . . cost one dollar ...takes five minutes to get. You know an old issue of Popular science or any of the others costs 15 cents each. [(cheapest I could find)]

I'm still working on getting a 7 volt auto generator. Do you need any special tools for your car? Do you think Two generators would be of more use to us instead of one? I have a friend who is due back from NYC any day now. He is not a quester but he is a good friend...when he gets back I will go with him in his car to get the generator, battery hydrometer, ammeters voltmeters. Did you ever get a good altimeter? You know Fred I am not up on all this mechanics and instrument stuff but I am learning. When I go in to get something like this sometimes I don't have the slightest idea of what it looks like it often turns out to be altogether different from what I had in mind. I'm a real lug head when it comes to mechanics . . .but I always wanted to learn about these things . . .parents always forbid me to have anything to do with any of this stuff. Maybe someday I'LL learn. I think I have the ability to work with tools. I've always liked carpenter work and could do a lot of odds and ends around the house. I think I would like to try my hand at building my own house someday. Been fortunate with gardening, though. I know a little about it. Say Fred are extension cords for electric machinery available there? Still think that an electric power hand saw, SKILL SAW, would be very good to have. With all that wood it would come in handy. Am also considering a wood lath machine as you advised would also be valuable to have . . .will buy this in NY though and let Tony bring down with him....

I'm thinking a lot about the business plans Fred. In your last letter....there being a definite demand there for packaged and washed vegetables of new classes...and about fruit raising, drying and canning. This all sounds very good. Is there anything I can do here before I leave? How do you intend to package vegetables,what kind of rapping, ...cellophane? Is this packaging material available in E? About canning...is material for this in E also? If there is any work to be done here now in regards to materials please advise. Did you ever find out about a Fig newton making machine? Johnny Haindel s[ai]d to me that he knew where he could buy a donut making machine for about \$100 or was it \$200. Is th[ere] a need in E also (Donuts)? How about a pizza business? This sounds a bit off but [I] thought I'd ask. Pizza business is terrific here in the {states}.

Boy are my trunks and lockers going to be heavy. I hope they make it without damage. Did you buy a 3 or 5 HP Gasoline engine yet? Did you locate any water pumping equipment yet? Boy am I anxious to get started.



Two statements which I have heard that Bernard has made to you, need correction. The first that Bernard is working for me on secretarial work. He is doing nothing of the sort and has been too busy attending to his own affairs. Secondly, that I am arriving in California in the beginning of January. The truth is that I am leaving New York on Dec. 31st. but will be going to a southern state (Louisiana). I certainly intend to come to California,²⁶⁹ but can give you the date of my actual arrival only in strictest confidence. The reason for this is that I have many matters to attend to which are urgent and important, and I cannot meet individual questers before this is done. Some of them unfortunately, have not learned to respect my privacy sufficiently, and therefore I am forced to protect myself by requesting you to pass on no information to anyone else, especially to Romaine, as to my dates and movements.

Immediately after arrival, I wish to spend two or three days in your neighborhood in order to go through all the stored goods and dispose of them in various ways. I do not want to be interrupted in this work by having to see other people than yourself and Clara. I shall be arriving in San Diego, Friday, Jan. 3rd. – [A]s this is a weekend, you may be having visits from neighbors and friends or from Romaine and Ellma. 



I hasten to tell you of two important developments. First, Jacques Masson has become somewhat disappointed in Uruguay – climate in winter and huge floods-and he is now thinking of having a look at Ecuador, after all. I suggest that you write to him at once and come up with definite advantages that Ecuador has over Uruguay. He is ready to start his trip soon, so write at once. If you haven't his address, it is: J. Victor Masson, Casilla de Correo 233, Montevideo, Uruguay.

Second, the Brooklyn group is very disorganized and uncohesive, and may, I hear, end up by becoming a group of one family only—Tony's. For you to go on waiting for them until the end of the year would be to take a gamble with the odds against you. Since Tony himself is determined to emigrate, it might be more prudent for you to deal with him as a unit alone, instead of wasting your precious time and missing opportunities. However, Tony has not had the business experience which you have had, and you must be the leader if you want to see action. I think you had better press him for some definite arrangement and take the lead. Please treat this information as confidential.

There may be a possible opportunity for you in the following. As you know, Siegmeister has interested some Americans in his colony in southeast Brazil. Among them is a man who is a chemist, scientist, and business²⁷⁹ executive. His name is A. W.



I am glad that your early disappointment with Ecuador has passed away, and that you have a better opinion of the country, so that your venture may justify itself. Whatever information you send is being carefully studied, since you are the only Quester in Ecuador so far and your impersonal impressions are more useful than what books can't tell us.

I am following your own experiences with great interest. Can you tell me whether you got all your belongings through customs without having to pay any duty, or what you had to pay and on what articles?

You ask for Bernard Masson's address. It is: Caixa Postal 7541, Sao Paulo (SP) Brazil. He is still quite enthusiastic about Brazil. His brothers, Jacques, is strongly repelled by the idea of living in Ecuador, so do not waste your time sending him details. However, since he believes in diversification of investment, I believe there is some possibility still of getting him to buy a share of a farm or business if you have some definite enterprise to put up to him. As you know, he has become the disciple of a master in India.

I understand that those who grow fruits and vegetables in Ecuador use human fertilizer. Does this not create a health problem for vegetarians? Mr. Gerhart, a Quester visited Ecuador and Peru a year ago, and was sick for several months afterwards with dysentery. He said that the Indians live in such filth that he would rather go to Brazil when finally emigrating. What is the use of a plentiful supply of fruits and vegetables if they implant²⁸² harmful bacteria in the human body? I mention these points only to learn how you are dealing with them, for every country in South American has its own kind of demerits.

My own work for Peace will reach its climax with the summit conference of the great powers. It will then be possible to determine whether there has been any real response, or whether it will end in failure. Until then, I cannot come to a decision about emigrating, but when I do, it will be on very short notice. I still have not any particular country in mind, as I cannot see the advantages of any one as being strong enough to influence a decision.

It is generally thought that the summit conference will take place in about three months' time and that it may require several weeks of talks. However, even if peace is really established, I would still want to emigrate in order to get the unsprayed fruits and vegetables, which are almost unobtainable here.

After you have visited Ambato, let me know your impressions, and also check on the exact figure for its rainfall. The figure you send is twenty years old.

With all good wishes for your spiritual and physical welfare: I am delighted that so many friendly people have unexpectedly appeared to help you.

Thank you, dear Fred-Clara..

for your informative letters about Ecuador. It is interesting that you will apparently be the third family to emigrate to South America. It does not seem that anyone else among the questers will be able to have enough money to go before the late summer or early fall.

The newspapers here report rapid economic deterioration in Chile, Argentina and Peru. They predict trouble there. So perhaps your choice of Ecuador may not only be as good as any other available but better. Time will show. Until I go there personally and form my own impressions I feel unable to recommend any particular country in S.A. My interviews with top fallout experts have led to the discovery that they hold differing opinions about S. A. This is unhelpful to a layman.

At present I have no plans for travelling there as I have gotten into an activity which may keep me here for some months or even send me to Europe. I refer to work for peace²⁸⁴ and avoidance of war. All this is on high level and in great secrecy, so I can say nothing more. This does not mean that I am optimistic about results, but only that I feel it is a duty [and a mission;]²⁸⁵ and something which lies on my conscience to attempt.

Regarding your enquiry about the book THE SECRET LAW OF MAGIC, I recommend you to have nothing to do with it. There is great danger in such a mixed-up mess of good and evil.

Concerning the stainless steel pans, you have no assurance other than a probability that Pyrex glass is any safer. I don't know how you could investigate this matter unless you ascertained just how Pyrex is made, what chemicals are used in the process, etc. It would seem that the ancient Hindu method of cooking in unglazed clay pots is still the best, and is probably in use by the Ecuadorean Indians, too! It has disadvantages of its own but they are not so serious and do not endanger health. You may be interested to learn that just lately a new kind of utensil has come on the market which may be the answer. It avoids the disadvantages of the clay pots. It is called

Corning-ware, and looks like beautifully decorated porcelain. It is made by the Corning Glass Company, and is guaranteed against breakage from extreme heat or extreme cold. However, it is costly, \$6.50 for a $1\frac{1}{2}$ quart saucepan (dish, handle and cover.) Nevertheless, surely if ordinary care is exercised with stainless steel not to use acids or salts in cooking, it should be safe enough? You²⁸⁶ will be interested to learn that Johnny Lovewisdom has apparently left for Ecuador. He was supposed to depart before the beginning of December. His mail address there is: Calle Valparaiso 1712, Quito.

I understand from Tony Damiani that he has been corresponding with you and that apparently there have been some differences of opinion at times. Since he and the group who are following him seem inclined to favour Ecuador too, it might be of mutual advantage for you all to cooperate together. I would like to explain that Tony has a very independent character and takes offence a little too quickly. You have to be somewhat tactful and tolerant in dealing with him. Underneath these defects he is very well intentioned, keen and sincere.

Since Quito, and perhaps even Ambato, are too high, while the coastal areas are too low and malarial, you would apparently do best by settling at an altitude of 4 or 5,000 feet. I do not know of any suitable areas at that height.

You will doubtless meet Jacques Masson eventually in Ecuador as he is probably land[ed] already in Buenos Aires. He will be travelling for the next three months. I don't think he wants to settle in Ecuador, but I believe he might be willing to invest in it. As you know, he likes high class living conditions[,] which are more available in the other countries. When you finally settle your travel arrangements, please let me know by what route and what method you will go – and what cost, for personal transport as well as household goods.

I don't think P.B. could, at the present time, add anything further regarding the world situation. He has reported on it as it appears at present and the enclosed extracts quote his words exactly.


May I suggest (and I hope you will forgive the liberty and accept the spirit in which I offer it) another alternative to returning to the U.S. for treatment? This would

be to obtain the treatment elsewhere in South America. Surely, large cities like Buenos Aires or Montevideo would be able to afford similar treatment? The move within S.A. would not be as expensive as returning here.

If Montevideo could provide suitable treatment, I have another thought to suggest. You know Jacques very well. He seems to be settling roots in Uruguay, and has purchased some farm land outside Montevideo. No doubt he told you about this when he visited you recently. What would you think of working out an arrangement with him to put your agricultural know-how to work on his behalf on the farm? This would give you some income, and you would be close enough to Montevideo to visit there for your treatment. Cost of living is low in Uruguay, I am told. Thus, you could put the interim period of a year or so (until Anthony et al come down) to good and profitable use, and you would have the advantage of being close with friends, the Massons. If this idea appeals to you, I suggest you write Jacques right away.

We have not had a word from you in a long time and have missed hearing anything—in the meantime pressing problems have come up and I thought it would be a good idea to try and contact you before making any move.

Clara and I have been waiting a year for Anthony and Charles to arrive here so we could join in buying a hacienda and since one would be too expensive for us alone we have put off buying anything else. Anthony was positive he was coming here this March 1st but we have received a letter today saying that he has changed his mind.

This has been caused he says by the fact there will be no war-at least in the foreseeable²⁹⁰ future.. This is good news...

But in our case complicating factors have come up.. The worst is the cancer I had on the outside has gone inside and has become most painful and worse.. Here there is no treatment that I would count on and further this country does not permit direct shipping in of medicines...thus preventing me from securing medicines I want...I had counted on those coming to bring them as they are permitted to do so..

The sickness and costly moving, rents etc has put us on a steady downhill slide financially and as I cannot work there is no income outside of a large garden I manage to keep going..

The language barrier is hard and especially on one sick as I have been...Foods are much better here than in the US but it costs to live where you have no business or home...This is complicated by the fact I do not know the investing systems of S. A. countries..

The whole move has been costly to us and in the light of the whole situation we wonder if we might not be better off in salvagxing what we can and returning to the US—to where I don't know—but there I could get medicine etc not found here..


I don't know if Anthony is correct or not in his assumption there will be no war but if there is one soon if we make such a move back there would be little chance to return here as our funds will be too low..

The country here is with an excellent climate[,] fruits etc very good.. The soil is excellent.. But the red tape of the post office – governmental regulations and the like make things tedious to the American. From the natural standpoint the country could be a paradise. – minus the Spanish and Indians.. (and Catholicism)

was read with appreciation and understanding. You have a heavy cross to bear and you are facing up to it with great courage. I took the liberty of sending your letter on to Dr. Brunton.

By a coincidence, a letter from Dr. Brunton which arrived last Monday suggested I discuss your case with a Mrs. Kaehele who cured herself completely of cancer some years ago. As it happened, Mrs. Kaehele came to New York and the next day and I had dinner with her Tuesday evening.

She allowed me to read the manuscript of a new book she hopes to have published as she felt that some of the material in it would be of interest to you. The chapter she recommended was No. 2, and I have had it copied and enclose it herewith.

Mrs. Kaehele has had two other books published. The first dealt with her own cure, "Victory over Cancer." I have ordered a copy and will send it to you as soon as it arrives.

You will be interested to know that she spent some time at the Hoxey Clinic (after her cure) interviewing patients there. From this, and an analysis of the hundreds of letters she received from cancer patients following publication of her book, she feels she can detect a pattern that runs constantly throughout cures. First, the patient is utterly dependent on the doctor with full belief in him. Then, when he realized that the

doctor of himself can do little, he becomes desperate and tries to help himself. Then, when he realizes again that the problem is too great for him, he turns it over to the higher power, asking for help. The help which may then come is independent of any regime, which is why some people say they have been cured by carrot juice, others by grapes, etc.

My dear Fred - Clara,

I am very sorry that you have not heard from me for a long time; that is the complaint made by all friends. During that time I have had to withdraw from personal contacts to engage in a very special work which requires concentration and secrecy.

Your statement that Tony declares there will be no war in the foreseeable future probably derives from my opinion that there will probably be no war during the present year; I do not know what will happen after that. No-one dare state all predictions with absolute positiveness under present conditions. It would be presumptuous for me to attempt to do so. You, and Tony, must therefore make your own decisions about the present and your own appraisals of the future. I know that there has been a great change for the better since I last saw you and that there is some hope for peace now. Beyond that I do not know.

Your reconsideration of your emigration and your thought that it might be better to return to the USA is natural under the circumstances which have developed since your arrival in Ecuador, in view of the peace prospects and the xxxx return of your skin cancer, for which you had not allowed when leaving the States. Anyway I am now discouraging others from attempting to leave unless they are very clear in their mind as to what it all involves, such a tremendous upheaval is very risky and costly, and fleeing from one evil to fall into a new one, from the familiar to the unfamiliar, must be well weighed. Better the devil we know than the one we don't know, is the old saying.

As regards the cancer I believe you are acquainted with what I know about the subject as we have talked it over at times. I do not know any new²⁹² treatment. But there is a lady who cured herself and I want you to get in touch with her, since you might possibly benefit by it. She lives in the States.






Regarding the four-page journal you sent me last week, please note that I would rather not receive political literature as that is entirely out of my field and might lead to misunderstandings.


people to visit the Ashram. This should be a remainder to you [us] of the need of keeping an independent line and not becoming a "joiner"[, although I know you don't need it]

By permission of the author, we reprint it because it will be of special interest to <u>you.</u>

A REMARKABLE PLANT FROM THE EAST

A new Youth Vitamin discovered? By P. de B-Layman, M.H.P.A. (Eng.) Research Medical Herbalist

Arriving next month at the London Docks from the Eastern Tropics is the largest consignment yet to reach England of what must surely be one of the most intriguing and valuable cargoes that has ever been introduced to Western Medical Science. Packed in several double canvas bales, marked only with a number for secrecy, is the result of several weeks' careful collecting and slow drying of a low-growing herb found only in certain jungle districts, known to Chinese Medicine as Fo-ti Tieng (The Elixir of Life" or Long Life Elixir").

The event of this shipment, consigned to the Herbal Research Institute of London, recalls the considerable interest aroused in the World's Press when, in 1933, there died near Pekin, Professor Li Cheng Yun, at the age of 256 years – the oldest man so far authentic records show. The fact that he had been married twenty-four times rather goes to bear out the correctness of his attributed age. During his life he was a

sort of botanic chemist or herbalist who regularly made himself an infusion of tea from a herb which he found in his earlier years and thenceforth throughout his extraordinarily long and active existence.

An interesting sidelight is thrown upon the unique vitamin aspect by the assertion many years ago of Nanddo Narian, a then 107 years-old Indian sage, to effect that Fo-ti Tieng provides a missing ingredient in man's diet without which he can never wholly control disease and decay.

As a Research Medical Herbalist, I have given long and close attention to Fo-ti Tieng and have found it in practice to be the finest of all Herbal Tonics and nutrients. It appears to have no equal in the treatment of general debility and decline.

Digestion is strengthened; other foods better absorbed and the process of metabolism increased with a noticeable improvement in the appearance of the patient. I find it best administered in powder form and this is certainly more handy too. In larger doses it proves to be a safe Aphrodisiac when required.

Maybe the name "Elixir of Life" given it by the Chinese may be somewhat exaggerated if immortality is implied; still, there can be little doubt that the regular use of Fo-ti Tieng can assure for us the next best thing – a useful, ripe old age.

I was astonished at your news, dear Fred - Clara...

about the government's action, but you do not make it clear whether they are threatening or have actually closed your business. The excuse offered is so trivial that it would seem that you are either the victim of business jealousy or that you have incurred the animosity of the American Medical Association. If the latter is the case, you ought to take it as a lesson on the necessity for prudence, since you have probably either in your literature or your letters to customers attacked the medical profession. As you know the A.M.A. is extremely powerful and you are not in a position to buck them. It is therefore wiser to make all criticisms of their errors temperate and cautious, leaving to other critics the more violent expressions.

Anyway even at the worst you ought to be able to continue the sales of all your products by wording your descriptions in terms that would satisfy the Food and Drug Act as that is necessary. After receiving your news concerning this matter I may give you the address of another friend in California who has had considerable experience on higher levels than yours in fighting the A.M.A. and influencing the officials who administer the Food and Drug Act. His counsel would be based on twenty years' experience of these matters.

In regard to the stationary, do not worry about the difficulty of getting the paper to take the gray ink. I do not usually use an oil paper and will take care not to use it again, so that the difficulty need not reappear.

I am also considering a new suggestion which has arisen out of my needs of curtailing the time given to individual letters, and this is to use small sheets of stiffer paper folded over like the informal note. Their small size would make brief messages I'm being forced to write if I am to write at all to the hundreds of correspondents who³²⁰ communicate with me. These notes vary between five by four to a little larger or a little smaller. In that case the name and address would be printed in the top left corner and the lines would have to be set closer together than on my present letter hears. The imprint would appear on the front flap. The message could then be written on the blank space left on the flap or in those cases where it was necessary to extend it on the inside two pages or on the other outside page. Perhaps you may have some ideas about



The celery stalk and parsley powder is also not being used henceforth, if alone. But the broth concentrate, no salt, no onion is very much used and appreciated.

Your mention of the Maharshee books containing veiled references to me reminded me that I ordered and paid in advance for the only ones of his I did not have. "Maharshee Talks" from a New York bookseller who imports from India. This was several months ago but for some strange reason he still has not received them. Since I want to reply to the ashram official who invited me to come and live there and devote my talents to spreading M's teaching, I ought to see these references first. The irony is that I worked for the conjunction with the reporter, and then the brother of M, who was manager, acting under influence of persons hostile to me, seized them, locked them up in a safe, and there they lay unprinted. Many interviews were asked for and promised during my absence in the Orient over a period of several years. Since my return to the Western Hemisphere and during my travels in America and Europe, these have all been gradually given. Now, on my return to America, from Europe this task is complete.

It is now necessary for me to attend to my proper work of mystical research and literary writing. This requires solitude and leisure. As it is a full-time activity, I can give no further interviews to those who have already had one or more. And as it has not been possible to engage a permanent secretary, I can give no more attention to the stream of letters than to read them.

Those who seek a teacher may be reminded that they may take anyone who appeals to, or inspires, them and by their own mental attitude of faith in and devotion towards him, together with obedience to his published teachings, are able to draw inner help and inspiration telepathically from him. Thus they create for themselves a mental relationship which to that extent is not different from what would have come into being as part of the regular teacher-disciple relationship. They need also to be reminded that in all cases a teacher can be found only when they are sufficiently sensitive to feel his mental presence within themselves and only when they are sufficiently developed to be ready for him. Doctor Brunton is so busy has asked me to write to you in answer to your letter of November 10. Of all the places you mention, the house at Temecula sounds most interesting. Some questions arise, however which are important. You note that the smaller house is next door. How close is "next door"? Also, what does the small house contain, in addition to the two bedrooms?

Respecting the rental, you observe, "for more rent he would move away, I think." It would be desirable from P.B.'s standpoint if he could have the privacy that would result if the small house were available to him as a guest house. Hence, I suggest you make casual inquiry from the owner in the endeavour to find out what would be the rental for the two places together. Incidentally, how far is the house from the nearest trading center? And how far is it from the Valley Center Post Office?

You did not mention whether or not the house was furnished or if it had running water. Also, does it have electric lights?

I agree with you that the rent is very high for these places. However, this situation obtains everywhere. Since P.B. has a heavy schedule of work this winter and will need to have one or two office staff with him there is no way of his avoiding the need for a large house which is not only private but which is also relatively easy to operate. The problem is not solved by having a local caretaker who is {illegible} by the owner since³⁶⁵ this only introduces a discordant note. It is therefore necessary that P.B. have a sufficiently modern place so that with the aid of the people with him and parttime assistance of friends, he can manage effectively. Considering all these requirements and the present market, a rental income of \$200 to \$300 is not out of proportion.

A furnished house is essential but if an empty house is otherwise desirable, furniture would be rented.

P.B. wishes me to acknowledge with appreciation the offer of Clara and yourself to assist him in any feasible way. If your circumstances permit, he will welcome such assistance but only to a degree that would not be a burden to you when the care of your children and the requirements of your own business are all considered.

Speaking for myself for the moment, I have only just returned from Africa and I am trying to dig out from under accumulated mail and pressing demands from my business associates. As soon as possible I shall write you in answer to your letter. In any case, I hope to see you sometime during the winter.

About the house in V.C. I have no plans for purchase or settling down at this stage. My object is only to rent a temporary house so that I can <u>test</u> V.C. for its climate and residential possibilities. It remains to be seen what the result of such a test would be. Hence for a single writer's residence, I am not so exacting in requirements as I might otherwise be.

It is most kind of you to offer services for moving in, and for occasional household work. But there are two questions here (1) How could you spare the time away from your own work (for a living)? (2) How could your wife spare time from her own household work? I intend to bring only one general assistant to stay with me and help me, but I have not decided³⁶⁷ who it is to be. He will have enough to keep him busy; with office as well as house, so that spare time contributions of service from outside would certainly be useful.

The work in Europe has been immensely fruitful. Several countries were visited and several hundred interviews given. It was a pleasure to have brought a little peace to the minds of those who had suffered so much.







She returns in September to establish her retreat at David's place and to proceed full steam ahead with her spiritual work there.




How are you getting on with the business?



Thank you for your two letters of July.

When the Maharishee died I was almost on the eve of boarding a plane to complete my journey to him when he passed away.

He was holding on by sheer will power and his physicians were astonished how it was. he could live so long, but even he reached the limit of his remarkable resources. All the Indian newspapers carried eulogies and notices about him and the government of India declared his original cave a national memorial. Its ceremonial dedication being attended by the Governor-General.

I know he was happy to get out of his failing body for he did not consider his going an even other than in appearance -- according to what he said during the last few days. That, too, is my own experience with him since then.

Your London parcel was safely received and enjoyed. Thank you. However, I no longer use nutmeal but Willow Run Margarine a soybean product which I am able to buy locally in New York. I use it because of the fat content. In England, I was able to get a white colored nutbutter, the same color as the margarine, but here I can only find the greyish-brown color which I dislike. Do you know if it is possible to obtain a white nutbutter in this country?



This letter is being sent from Rome, Italy, but mailed thru my British agent, Mr Parrott, hence the British stamp. Can't stop too explain why.

I have your letter of May 1st. Perhaps the Los Angeles newspapers published a write-up about Maharishee's death, there was one in the New York Times. Life is emptier without him.

I am glad to hear that meditation has become easier and more habitual with you; that is a good sign indeed

A sum of money has been placed with Romaine Stevens, of NYC to pay various bills. So please send your bills as they arise to her for payment promptly, and thus you need not wait till my return.

You ask me whether you should send trial packages at times to Mrs Cotter. No please don't do it. You see she is not a Health Food person. Secondly the apricots were not for her but for her family, who have been helpful to me but who are also not Health Fooders. She herself never eats apricots but loves Uncle Ben rice very much, so I shall keep her supplied with that; she needs and eats nothing else from the States. However I could use apricots when I return to England but I do not know when that will be. I shall write and tell you when the date comes near. There is too much difficulty here on the Continent to carry food, owing to airplane freight being costly, so I carry none. You could substitute a different dried fruit for Cotter, if necessary.... Here is an order for a new address. Please send 8 lbs of Fruit Salad -- say Libbys or Hunts or some other make -- and of Pineapple Chunks or Slices. The fruit should be in the smallest size cans available to you, as this person has no refrigerator, and it should not be dried but in syrup, as they don't like druid fruit. Also send 2 lbs of butter, 2 lbs of "Mars" candies, assorted kinds, and 2 lbs of Kellogg's Breakfast Foods (Corn Soya, Krumbles and Rice Crispies preferred) in the smallest size packages available. A couple of days before I was due to embark by plane for India, the Maharishee died. He could hold out no longer. It was cancer of the left arm. I was in trance meditation at the time, and completely out of my body. According to the newspaper account which arrived by plane today from Madras, a meteor was seen in the sky over the hill Arunachala at the time of his passing,

I cancelled my journey and remain here in London for the present. Later I shall visit several European countries and then return to England, for very important developments in connection with my external work. The parcels you sent to Arram and Cotter arrived safely and were appreciated. Will you please send another parcel to the following: Mrs MAUD COTTER, 68 Clitherow Avenue, Hanwell, London, W.7. She lived in India as a missionary for many years and is very fond of rice. However it must be "Uncle Ben's Rice and no other brand. Please send her 14 (fourteen pounds weight) of rice and 6 lb of dried apricots. She is now a highly advanced mystic, a lady of 75 years old, attuned to God and one of my dear friends in the country, whom I have known for many years. Post me the bill for these goods with your next letter please.
