# **Jim Covell Letters**

Editor's Note: James "Jim" Covell came into PB's orbit sometime in the 1940s, along with Anthony Damiani (q.v.), Romaine Stevens, the Waegners, the Massons, Nora Briggs, Norma Hutzler, and many other Americans. PB lived for a time in NYC and also in California – and while in these locales he gave talks to groups interested in mysticism and Eastern philosophy. A few of the individuals in these groups (including most of those just named) volunteered their services to PB in hopes of gaining greater access to him – or from a genuine desire to make themselves useful to him, or both. Wherever possible, PB accommodated these offers of help, with mixed success. Jim Covell became – or was – mentally unbalanced and a ne'er-do-well, always flitting from one money-making scheme to another, and he had an inflated sense of his own spiritual development. PB distanced himself from Jim after a few years, but Jim persisted in reaching out to PB, often mailing him massive mystical ramblings or requests for investment funds. PB rarely replied to these after the first few years, since he found that tactful responses were ineffective. Most of the letters in this file were handwritten from between 1939 to 1987.

PB had a tendency to make edits, write notes regarding his replies, or insert address information and meeting times on the letters themselves after receipt. We have noted PB's insertions and marginalia, but have not noted edits made by the original author, assuming that they were corrections made at the same time as the rest of the letter. To preserve both readability and the voice of the author, we have corrected spelling errors but have generally left grammar as is.

Less interesting letters have been summarized instead of fully transcribed. Please refer to the scanned PDFs for the full content, or to view all stationary headers, postmarks, unidentified markings, marginalia, etc. Proper names and dates have been written exactly as found in the original for each letter in this file; where we discovered multiple versions of a person's name, we have noted the full name either in the body of the text in {curly brackets} or in a footnote.

In many letters, there are words that are illegible or missing; in such cases we have included either our best guess or the word "illegible" inside {curly brackets}. In rare circumstances, we have added a word or phrase to a letter for readability, which are also noted with {curly brackets}; a footnote was added where we deemed it helpful. – Timothy Smith (TJS), 2020

I read your interesting report and news with much interest, Jim,

and answered it mentally. Your service here was much appreciated and if it had been possible for me to carry on a large establishment you would certainly have remained -- if it had not been against the interests of your professional career also. I much admired the ego-less way in which your service was given and the emotioncontrolled character which you showed here. Even more, however, I appreciated the fact that you appear to have mastered the Ultimate teaching far better than any of the others who have come in contact with me so far in this country. It seems to me that any future work which you may have to do for me, whether of research or of writing, should be directed to the Higher Philosophy, as there are so many who are able to deal with ordinary mysticism, but I have found so few who can comprehend the philosophical mysticism so well as you have done.

With regard to your work, please do not make San Francisco a fetish. If, after sufficient time and investigation, you do not find what you seek there, feel free to proceed to Los Angeles, or any other part of the country that you deem prudent. I merely suggested San Francisco as a possible, interesting place for you to look at and work in. I do not wish to convey the suggestion that it is the only place you should work in. However, for your own sake, I hope it will turn out to be a worth-while visit, and even more.

I have decided that next winter I shall most probably move to California as the cost of living here is too high in Arizona. I have also acted and have definite arrangements in hand for departure during the first week of May for Europe, returning by the end of September to this country.

Please write to me as often and as freely as you feel, for we understand each other well enough and I know that you do not demand written replies. Moreover, if at any time, you find yourself free to do so and wish to visit me, you will always be welcome.

Dear Jim,

Sorry to have kept your script so long but I only arrived in this country last month from Mexico, where I spent several months in retreat, and have had to get reorganized again

Here it is. I like it. However I have no idea whether the American editors will like it too; I seem to be getting more and more remote from their commercialistic atmosphere, of which I sometimes despair. Perhaps you will have to try the openly 'spiritual' magazines to get a more favorable hearing, only I don't know what they are now. However I picked up one the other day here which might be worth trying: "Science of Mind" 3251 Street Los Angeles 5.

Your article is very sensible but we live in such a senseless society! I suggest that you drop the last two words "Will you?" from the last page; as it seems like preaching. Otherwise I have no criticisms and I'd like a carbon copy one day for my records, or possible magazine!

I would like to know the precise meaning of the German words "lagernd" when it appears in a publishes-booksellers catalog prefixing a title not published by the firm.

If you are in communication with Kay Hamill you might tell her that I wrote last July c/o Romaine, as I hadn't her address with me and was traveling, and hope she got the letter. Anyway I want to thank her for her repeated offers of service but there is no need to repeat since I accept no service that I can possibly do for myself; and I have so simplified matters that I am almost selfcontained. Tell her also that I have withdrawn from interviews and correspondence and don't give personal guidance nor any other help than remembrance in prayer. She need not write so often to express her gratitude etc as I am trying to keep my mail down in size, and I understand clearly her attitude, and am unable to reply; more letters will only defeat her object; right thought is better. However I have asked Mr Samuel Lohr, who spends most of his time in prayer and meditation and correspondence, having nothing else to do, to correspond with her, if she wishes.


I also send some translations to be done at your convenience.

My Dear Ken Hurst...

I am so grateful to CM for letting me know that the work on PB's biography is going forward. The first request for the shipment of his file, 13 FEB 85, following on the heels of a series of various ideas - working for PB, a book from an earlier incarnation of his, forming a publishing company, retirement plans, Arizona or Malaga, an MS on Mentalism - all dropped in a rapidly changing scene, seemed at the time like just one more likely to fall by the wayside. CM's tip-off re your present activities - lectures, move to Valois <u>and actual</u> work on the biography - changed all that. I am so glad it is going on in earnest!

Preparing the j-file for research was quite an eye-opener: the WWII years, 1st marriage, translations, 2nd marriage, articles, book, poems, Ecuador, final efforts to work on material eventually taken over by the new now generation of "Centrists" - all have passed in review in better perspective.

Unlike the uncomplicated P-file, this one at first seemed to bulky to fit into 1 envelope. The first step was to trim the fat: numerous letters from jc to PB (still on file if needed.) Next, a clutter of small pieces, not easy to handle, some with writing on 2 sides. These have been consolidated wherever possible on 8  $1/2 \times 11$  photocopies holding 2 letters of a letter and a card on 1 sheet. Larger pieces with writing on both sides have been marked P.T.O. when combining verso and face was impractical. Only towards the end of the photocopying did I get the hang of lining 2 pieces up with dates in consecutive order from left to right. So those copies that reverse that order have been marked (1) and (2) respectively.

Working with PB brings great rewards but also high costs. If he could be incredibly gentle and generous, he could also be extraordinarily tough and waspish. But disciplinary action was never arbitrary or whimsical, never spiteful or random. Criticism was always precisely directed and controlled by reason and intelligence, discreetly adapted to the fault and the evolutionary status of the fumbler. He rounded on me cuttingly for placing name and address to high on the envelope. Reason! The postmark could obscure data needed for sure delivery. Yet summing up my stay in Croton-on-Hudson, I much preferred PB's Joan Surbrug's fine china cups, he just said: "Try to think why that happened."

Your close association meant many more such encounters with him than any of us could possibly have had. Such training exercises accelerated our growth and steeled us against the world's malignancy. How few of us can really know what it is like to be so vulnerable and accessible, as he was, to malignant forces that burrowed from within on the mental plane, unseen and unapparent in the physical world. Withdrawing from society into solitude was no guarantee of immunity from these sinister psychic powers. The only safe place was in the Overself, into which he could withdraw at will. One day, in Croton, he had to lie down a while. The immense psychic weight of even nonmalignant beings wanting him to solve their problems for them was overpowering.

As the son of such a sage, your position in the world cannot but be in public in a world of spiky unseen unheard "slings and arrows" that is unique. None of us can really share your high rare privilege but neither can any know your keen heartbreaks, non can feel the weight of your burdensome responsibility. For those who have known the father will naturally expect much of the son. Some will not understand that a sage's mantle does not pass from parent to child and<sup>8</sup> you must, like him, earn your own salvation. They will therefore expect more of you than of any other student. "Tis a harsh world, my masters!"

Still, on the lecture tour and as his biographer, you have the peerless privilege of revealing a PB most of us could never know. And that is precisely what most of us want to know better: the sage <u>and</u> the father. What is it like to be the son of a sage? When all of us are permitted by Destiny to be his students only? I know he wants us to say "students of philosophy" not of Brunton, yet from the very beginning, PB has been the <u>only</u> one I could really trust in the whole world to tell me the truth.

And now I commit these few testimonials of his meteoric passage through our lives to your competent care. If part of this work may seem to stretch beyond your reach, by reaching for the heights you will extend your stretch to become a finer, greater grander human being. You have made such progress this lifetime! The lecturer and biographer I know today is a far far cry from the unemployed youth badgering his father for a car in Croton-on-Hudson. Now he has his own car! The best! His life is now dedicated to making known to a generation who never knew him the greatest sage of all time to date: Mr Philosophy Himself!

I don't know how I can really help you in this work, which is such a highly personal assignment, when age has begun to slow my step. But I can still raise you aloft to the Overself in daily prayers - and do, still send upholding supportive thoughts in your high endeavours. As you forge on with your monumental task, part of me goes with you, walks by your side. The task is one that only you can do.

Dear Jim Covell,

This letter will update and conclude all the correspondence to date on both sides regarding the possibility of your visiting PB. Your most recent letter, dated July 10, cancelled the request for a visit, and relieved PB from certain difficulties he would have had to face in making arrangements for you.

Physical and mental difficulties which have arisen from or have been worsened by PB's last operation make everything move more slowly and take more time to get done.

"It<sup>10</sup> is very interesting that you are able to take your studies in mentalism so deeply, when most others find it something of a struggle, and not too convincing. However, the few who do, find it's satisfying and helpful, for the Maharshi himself, when I first met him, replied to my statement about having to return to London because of 'pressures,' "Why not suppose that you are in London?""



29 - 30 Letter from Paul Brunton to Jim Covell Thos. Cook & Son, Postbox 171, Madras, India. April 15. 1940

Dear Jim Covell,

Your letters of August and February last, and your photograph have been received. In response to your urgent request I have today sent you a cablegram reading: "Wait eight months writing."

This triangle is somewhat complicated and cannot be adjusted so abruptly without causing a slip back on the path for both you and Pauline Pohlmann. I am well aware that the prospect of a happy time with her after the rough going you have hitherto made, is very tempting. And she has an eager impulsiveness in this matter which is quite natural in view of the mental harmony between you. However the fact that George P. is not a brute but an extremely fine soul who treats her in a most considerate unselfish way, renders it necessary for you both to tread warily unless you want to bring some painful karma down on your heads. I have therefore counselled you to drop the entire question of divorce etc for the period until the end of this year. By that time it will be possible for all of you to review matters more coolly and we can then decide what is the right thing to do. Meanwhile relations should be kept on a high level as friends, not as lovers. This will give you both the opportunity of undergoing a terrific self-discipline but if you want to tackle the quest seriously, you must undergo it. Remember our chief obstacle on this path is the 'I', the ego, so to put it down for a while will only help you.

It is unwise to take the view that destiny is working to bring you both together in the way you think. I pass no comment upon the truth of this view, but only upon its wisdom. You are not in a position to see what destiny desires to do. Better put that angle of approach away and consider matters as reasonable human beings. This does not mean that I am not sympathetic towards the feelings of both, but it means that I want to save unnecessary pain all round.

I say neither yes nor no, but wait. The final decision will be made by next New Year.

Myron has been giving you some sound advice on other matters and I agree with his counsel; it will certainly benefit you to become more realistic and adjust yourself to a career in the world with more ambition as its mainspring. You need not fear about losing any spiritual growth because so long as you keep in contact with the right source, that wont happen. Aim at a balanced existence. You will do some useful work for others one day but you have to find yourself first. In any case the worst is over for you, whatever your personal feelings are.

I am glad you are keeping in touch with Myron; it will help you. However - patience, things will come right in the end.

My dear Jim,

Your letters of April and September last year, and of January '41 reached me, and I was very glad to hear from you each time. You have lived through a profound experience which has marked a turning-point in your life. In a sense, it has awakened you from a semi-dreamlike condition into which you often used to lapse. However even the suffering it has brought you has had its value, too, and in the better perspective afforded by time you will later come to understand what all this has meant but it is not quite possible to do this so early. But some of the lessons you are beginning to comprehend.

Pauline Pohlmann sent me a not last September too but as it does not call for a reply I have not written her. Anyway I much appreciated her words.

And I am happy that the Schirmer friendship has been mutually beneficial as hoped.

Whatever the near future holds for you and Pauline, you must accept the present uncertainty as a discipline not without its value.

If the army service is to be your present destiny, accept it in the spirit of righteous duty, of a service to your fellow-humans which is their due. Keep this thought as the compensation-balance to whatever environment you may be thrown into.

If I am not sending any further counsel at the moment anent P.P. it is because the necessity of waiting has not yet passed.

My final word to you is that you need not worry, neither about the events of the past nor about what is to come in the future. You have to remould your personality, to fit it for a more strenuous career of service, and these things will play their own part in the process. Avoid self-pity and melancholy moods as far as you can; the clouds will pass eventually and you will learn what beauty there is in the sunshine.

Space is only a figment of the mind; I am near you already; stick to the Quest and we shall meet in the flesh at the appointed hour. You have my kindest thoughts always.

35 - 36 Letter from Paul to Jim care Thos. Cook & Son Postbox 171 Madras August 18. 1941

Dear Jim,

I have your letter of March 30. I am glad you were able to complete requirements for the M.A. degree before you were called up for the army. I think it was most important for you to have done so, from the standpoint of your future career.

The question of the effects of your nervous collapse still pursuing you will, I believe, find much of its solution in the Army life into which you have entered since writing your letter. For it will build you up physically and the rough open air existence

will harden your body. The rest of the cure cannot be effected by physical means but I can very easily put you right after my return to the West.


Now I want you to understand that an old phase of your life has come to an end, and that you are being drafted into the Army symbolised a new cycle which you must learn to accept gracefully. I know well that Military life will not be very pleasant for a scholar of your type but I assure you that it is just what you need at the moment. I have myself been through that phase and know its value for persons of our type. It will make you more balanced and bring you down to earth from the dreaminess and vagueness in which you are apt to lose yourself at times. So welcome it with the deeper part of your nature, understand what you are going to gain from it spiritually and physically and remember that in the end it is only a temporary and transitional phase. Finally there is still the much higher standpoint of service first for the protection of your country and second for the protection of civilization from Hitler's onslaughts. Never before has such a gigantic effort been made by the forces of evil to enslave the mind and bodies of men as is not being made through the instrumentality of the Nazis. You should therefore be glad that you are taking our part on the right side in this worldwide struggle.

Now regarding the other matter of Mrs Pohlmann you may now appreciate the wisdom of the advice which I gave you about a year ago. I have indeed received a letter from her written during April in which she herself now realizes the wisdom of her waiting policy. There is a destiny behind the whole affair and it will work itself out in the best way. Meanwhile don't yield to regrets or to melancholy thoughts and wait and watch how all this is going to work out as it should.

I am glad you were able to meet Miss. Schirmer.

Please tell Mrs Pohlmann that although I am not going to write her a letter she has my kindest thoughts and peace and the advice which I had given you about this matter may be communicated to her. Tell her that every one has behaved splendidly -her husband, herself and yourself -- and that as all three are seeking to express their highest ideal we may rest assured that the right outcome will be shown at the proper time. And it is better that the light should come out of your own inner growth than out of my dictation, and the growth of all three during the past twelve months has been marked indeed.

P.S. I regret to inform you that I have cancelled Myron's representation of me. He remains my legal representative but has no authority to speak on my behalf in spiritual matters.

P.P.S. Hold to the thought of the Overself. Remember its aspect of divine strength and courage. You are not doomed to failure but rather destined to attain.

(This is a copy of a letter from PB to my first wife. He knew that our marriage was not right for wither of us. It lasted 9 months.)

Dear Mrs Pohlmann...

Your letters of September 16th 1941 and January 2nd '42 were safely received. Thank you also for your Christmas 1941 greetings card which has such an attractive picture that I have kept it until now. The scene of an American village under snow raises a kind of nostalgia in me and makes me a trifle impatient for the coming of peace when I shall be free to get back to the West and settle down there for good. It reminds me of some villages in Connecticut whither I had escape from New York in the past for relaxed week-ends. Please pardon the long delay in writing you. I have been under terrific pressure of work all through this year and had to neglect correspondence. However this will relax shortly.

Another reason for my silence is that it is impossible for me to deal satisfactorily with the triangular problem between yourself, George and Jim by post. I know that it will be possible to solve the problem adequately and finally at a personal interview and as this is impossible under present conditions, I prefer to do nothing at all other than what I have previously suggested to Jim which was to let matters move very slowly and to make no irrevocable decision in haste.

I fully appreciate the complexities of this problem and sympathise with all three of you and know that there is a way out of it, although it is not necessarily an easy way, but you will please pardon my inability to do more at present under the circumstances, especially so as I also know that the process of time would by itself tend to bring a solution without my advice. The complexity arises mainly because of the fine ideals which exist in each one of you. Each of you has to find a balance between the three forces of personal desire, idealistic aspiration and practical wisdom. This is not easy. So please forgive my further silence on this matter, although I shall always be pleased to help solve the intellectual problems which may arise as a consequence of the study of the books.

Certainly Jim needs a process of psychological healing and I shall be very happy to help in this after the war is over. Incidentally it is a long time since I had written him too. Will you please let me know what is his latest address as I wish to write him also.

I am glad you were able to meet Miss Schirmer and do hope you find it worth while to know her.

With this letter I send you my peace and kindest thoughts.

(When Dan took us on to work as his house help (if we got married), upon our arrival in Beverly Hills, Dan's wife, Linda, had received a psychic message from PB then in India: "This marriage is a mistake. They have left New York.")

(Incidentally, PB told us in a bus on the way to the movie in Westwood in 1955 that Miss Schirmer had been lured into Communism.)

My dear Jim,

Your letters of October 13 and December 6, 1941 were received and since then your letter of March 3, 1943 has come in. Please note that should you write again by airmail, the letter must be registered or it will most probably fail to reach me. I shall always be pleased to hear from you.

I have not written you for more than a year although I wanted to do so three or four times. The principal matter about which I wish to write was unfortunately too involved in your intimate life and too concerned with our esoteric philosophy, for me to be able to do so under wartime conditions of correspondence. So I had to be content with thought messages instead. Now however you have ventured to raise this matter yourself in your last letter. So I merely wish you to know that I was seriously concerned about it all last year, because some of your other major troubles hinged in upon it. What help I could give, has been given -- or rather, it was given by the Overself as grace for I in my ego can do little. The past is done with, now, and you may confidently adopt a hopeful attitude towards the future. The worst is over; the better is coming. You have learnt some much-needed lessons. Profit by them in personal life whilst you have also learnt that what you failed to do by your own powers has been done for you by the diviner ones. There is no need for despair. Hope on.

About P. you will now realise the wisdom of the advice I gave you a long time ago. Precipitate action would have been wrong. Apply this same lesson to your present situation. You will lose nothing by waiting until you are sure that this is right for you. Your whole outlook had formerly been confused by the other trouble; now it is clearing up. The clearer it becomes the more easily will you see the truth about this situation.

About your army service; you will remember how I encouraged you to take it up. Whatever the external side of it be, you have greatly contributed your bit in this world struggle against the evil forces of Nazidom. Your fighting life must be carried through in the spirit of Prince Arjuna's counsel from Krishna: With inward calm but outward efficiency, fight bravely as a duty but without hatred and impersonally. I have faith in you -- but the real You has yet to make an appearance. When it does you will at the same time find your real work in life -- which is something quite other and much more important than you yet know.... There are two chapters in my new book, which has now been published, ("The Wisdom of the Overself") which should be particularly useful to you.... One day we shall me again and until then you may count on me, for I appreciate your loyalty.

41 - 42 Letter from Paul Brunton to Jim Grindlay and Company, Postbox 49, Madras, India 8th April 1944

My dear Jim,

Your letters of September 6, 1943 and January 1, 1944 and the telegram announcing your change of address were all received and read with pleasure. I feel that this whole army experience despite the difficulties involved will work out in the end for your very great benefit and is providing you with a range of experience which your former scholastic and academic life could never have provided. All this quite apart from the fact of obvious duty in this terrible life and death struggle against the Nazi attempt at world domination; as you know I have already expressed in the book "The Wisdom of the Overself" my view that in this war we are not merely fighting evil men and their duped followers but also evil spirits who seek to put back the clock of human evolution. They will be defeated of course but the conflict becomes increasingly more desperate as it nears its end.

Your reference to the difficulty in accommodating the practical and philosophical view of existence is understandable. However these dual views of existence should not be mistaken for contrasting and opposing ones. As you may have read in my last book the ultimate insight synthesises both although it cannot prevent the continuance of their variation. It is as though the foreground of the mind must hold the practical view whilst the background simultaneously holds a philosophical view. This would be the condition for you to achieve in your present stage of development. In the adept however there arrives after long practice and profound experience a condition of illumination which treats all experience for the idea that it is and at the same time keeps in the light of the ever-burning lamp of reality -- Pure Mind. --

Let me know from time to time how it is with the nervous and muscular illhealth from which you used to suffer in the past. It has been considerably relieved already compared with its former condition. Physical helps to the cure are important. Have faith that it would be permanently eradicated in the end and certainly so when we are able to meet again. It must be eradicated for it obstructs all progress, spiritual, intellectual and personal career. Moreover as you may now be aware this is not unconnected with the various attitudes you took at different times during the Pauline affair.

Should the fortunes of war bring you with the American Forces to India I hope you will endeavour to obtain furlough and come to stay with me as long as possible as my guest. My home is in Mysore City, capital of Mysore State, Madras being only the address for receiving my overseas mail. I should be delighted if this could happen, so please bear it in mind. Please note my new mail address as given on the head of this letter.

Do<sup>13</sup> not speculate prematurely about the form which your post-war work may take. My reference to it was en passant and will not be developed, important though it is. Let the pleasant skies of peace first return and then we shall discuss such subjects.

With reference to the P affair no decision will be a safe one until the element of doubt is quite absent from it. Until then, the best course is to wait patiently.

The most important factor at the moment in your inner life is the cultivation of the harder qualities like will, decision, execution, endurance, determination, energy and the like. Your present experience may well help you do this.

....four letters from Jim and two from Pat which all made interesting reading. Thank you for the ear stoppers too which seem effective.

I was very pleased, too, that the visit to L.A. served some useful purposes for you both. However, I feel it necessary at this stage to modify some of the counsel given you regarding citrus fruit. I thought you had taken more of it than was advisable and the only way to redress the balance was to abstain completely for a time. The cleansing period is now over so that you may return to a moderate use of them provided the following safe-guards are observed. (a) eat no more than a small quantity of oranges (b) use lemon and lime juice only in small quantities (c) use neither fruit unless it is fully ripened.

As regards the vegetable water fast, you can alternate this, should you wish to fast again next spring or summer, with a lemon-honey fast. For this purpose use distilled water. Use 1/2 teaspoon of lemon juice and one teaspoonful of honey to half-pint tumbler of distilled water, which should be heated until it is warm, but not hot. However, lemon acid being so destructive to the teeth its effect should be counteracted by using an alkaline toothpaste immediately after drinking it.

The name Everett Gregory has a pleasing sound except that it seems to have too many "r's" in it. It would seem better to keep the surname, Gregory, which is excellent, but to find a different first name which has no "r" in it.

About preparing the loose manuscript for shipment, the usual method is to punch all the pages and insert them in a thick manila loose-leaf binder of the type which costs about 20¢. If there are too many pages for one binder you may use the two binders and divide the book into two halves. There would then be no need for stapling. Next, whatever pen name is used your real name and mail address should appear at the bottom of<sup>18</sup> the title page, with a notation "To Be Returned To The Author." Next, as regards a publisher, since the University Publications have failed to respond favourably, there are two suggestions. The first is the Philosophical Library, 15 East 40th. St. New York City, who are not publishing my friend, Prof. Wood's books, and second Henry Regnery of Chicago whose street address you will have to get from a telephone directory at the San Francisco chief exchange. I have enclosed a cutting concerning him. There is no advantage in sending me a copy of the manuscript yet. I am living in almost complete solitude on the eastern most tip of Long Island, trying to complete my book and also a cycle of meditation so that I have not visited New York City for a long time. But of course, if something favorable turns up to make it worth while I will send for a copy. You may inform both publishers that I have agreed to write an introduction if the work is accepted.

There has been some renewed activity with regard to the proposed magazine. The chances of its publication are favorable but since they will necessitate a journey by me to England, it may be delayed for another year.

I am sending you some of the mail for translation. Knowing how busy you are with your own work, please do not give this too much time of be too conscientious and


scrupulous in the work, and do not hesitate to summarize or condense at your own judgement.

What is the decision of Regnery, dear Jim...

It may be advisable to make some changes in the arrangement in the script so as to make it more attractive commercially. The most likely one would be to move the present opening chapter further on into the body of the text and to replace it by a shorter prefatory one that would start from the average readers present standpoint. The publishers have to spend so much to produce and push a book by an unknown author that some concession has to be made to their commercial standpoint.

The offer made you by the Philosophic Library cannot be properly appraised without knowing exactly how much money they require to subsidise the book. The estimate of \$2,000 which you made may or may not be correct. If correct, it is of course not to be considered, but it might have been useful before rejection to have inquired from them what figure they had in mind. Moreover, it will be needful also to inquire whether this subsidy will be in exchange for the 600 copies delivered to you or whether they had something else in view.

The entire manuscript has been gone through by a friend who does not know you but who has usefulness as representing the reader's standpoint. A number of suggestions and comments of a detailed character have accordingly resulted which I

pass on to you merely for what they are worth. I do not necessarily agree with all of them but you may find some useful, while the rest can be ignored.

The next suitable publisher to be approached would be Pantheon Books Inc. of 333 Sixth Ave. N.Y. 14 I have left the manuscript with a quester who has undertaken to either deliver it to a publisher or to return it to you, according to the instructions he receives from you. His address is: Jerry Fischer -- 6813 21st. Street, Brooklyn 4, N.Y.

However, it is necessary for you to review the situation now and to consider what can be done to give the script a better chance of seeming more saleable to the publishers. It is not pleasant to have to suggest this, but there does not seem any alternative for the present.

I am leaving for Europe and may be away there until the end of 1956. This is why I am handing the script over since I shall be traveling most of the time.

When I reach London in Sept. I shall mention your manuscript to my publishers there and see if I can arouse any interest although I know they are committed quite far ahead, and so are not eager to take on any additional titles by unknown writers.

"Wisdom" magazine lacks mysticism and therefore does not hold more than general interest. "Faith Today" is on the religious level but is still too far away from the philosophic standpoint to be of any use to us.

As regards your own personal situation, I am wondering if you get enough physical exercise of a few minutes every day. There are of an absolute necessity to counter balance your sedentary work and to keep you from falling into moods of depression. Deep breathing of pure air should accompany these exercises.

There<sup>20</sup> is a person in Italy for whom I have been asked to get a couple of addresses of scholastic bureaus in New York to whom he could write with a view to seek an appointment in a school or a small college. He is a professor, teacher, and doctor in various subjects which I do not at the moment know. Do you remember any of the addresses of the agencies which I could send him?

Regarding the sense of pressure in your head try the Hatha Yoga position of standing on your head for not more than 1 minute at a time for the first few months. This could be done twice a day. You may also apply alternate hot and cold compresses to the back of the neck twice daily.



as South Africa, where racial trouble is generally feared. There is no one are of which it can be definitely stated that it is a safe area in all respects. However, areas like South America, which are neutral so far, will presumably be free from bombing and much freer from fallout. Beyond that, it is not possible to point to any particular country in SA, since each has advantages and disadvantages. Of course, countries with bad historical records, such as Bolivia, Columbia, and Paraguay, have been ruled out from the start. I understand from my reading of scientific literature that there is somewhat less fallout at the equatorial zone than there is in higher latitudes. However, other factors also have to be taken into consideration, according to the circumstances, needs, and preferences of each person. This is just what has already happened. Thus Fred Waegner has settled in Ecuador, Bernard Masson in Brazil, and Jacques Masson in Uruguay. Each likes the country of his choice, but another person who has lived for eight years in SA dislikes it so much that he will only consider other southern hemisphere territories.

There is no question here of any organization, group, or colony, since that idea seems to have completely broken down and those who go or are going do so as individuals, to suit themselves. I myself, as you know, have never had any plan to create an ashram, center, or colony. The decision to go abroad, to emigrate, when and where, will have to be made by each person on his or her own responsibility. This is a very difficult and dreadful decision to make. It's not surprising, therefore, that the number of those who still intend to emigrate has dwindled down to so few that they can be counted on both hands. If I had been given inner guidance or authority to lead others to a promised land, like Moses, be sure I would not have shirked the task. But I have received no such inspiration.<sup>27</sup>


have made. <u>I see no likelihood of war this year, both the inner and outer situation is</u> against it."

Sometimes we felt unequal to the struggle here and wanted to give up -- but I must say our misery is not comparable to yours, though each suffers in his own way.

Jack has just left New York for Europe and will be gone about another month, which is just the time I need here to get some semblance of order into all this chaos. You can't imagine what it is trying to get things accomplished efficiently where there is none. Manana she's good enough for me. Maybe they're right sometimes, who knows, but never the twain shall meet. There is an ocean between us alright.

Still we're adjusting gradually. I am in the midst of Spanish lessons and verbs, ugh -- much harder for me than French was, I don't know why. Maybe I enjoyed French much more and learned it quickly as a pleasure.

Pat, I know that you could always get work here as a secretary, at least I could look into that, but as for Jim, I don't know. But if things get too impossible you can always think about the Eastward trek, if you don't make it Northward first! But the

world news now is certainly not encouraging. But geography is not the answer for all these problems -- rather the sword of discrimination to distinguish between the Real and the unreal, and therein lies the work. Jeff is off in Buenos Aires this week-end taking his trail entrance examinations for either Yale, Princeton or Stanford, whichever would accept him. You know how competitive it is now. Entrance would not be before September, 1961, at which time he might go as a transfer student with his work here at the university counting. He is very much loved by his professors here who think he has great talents and possibilities, especially in philosophy and English literature. He is rather brilliant and a nice boy to boot, well balanced, and most important of all, has a very deep spiritual understanding. Even PB was most pleased and amazed at his growth in some letters they have exchanged lately. You know of course that he is in Australia, and well, but for how long, does not say. He says that he has withdrawn from all involvements with personal advice requests, and rightly so. I do believe since his suggestion for Plan Survival, he was being deluged with all sorts of personal problems, which should never reach him at all. His suggestion whether we took it or not, was our affair, and he after all to us was the embodiment of Truth, and our link with that. To him, only our spiritual problems, no? He also said, if the summit meetings fail, however, optimism about peace would have a very weak basis. He also writes to Jeff and I quote,

"Vedanta is a Short Path approach to truth, and as such leads to a greater joy and peace than the Long Path (Yoga) can give. However for those who still live and work in the world it must be accompanied by the philosophic virtue of Balance as this is very important because you have to work out the realization in Yourself by your own understanding of the ego through which you are being active in the world, as well as of it's Source.

Please forgive my delay in writing. Since my return five weeks ago I've been swamped with business matters, and am only now caught up.

First, PB is well and sends you both his kindest remembrances. We discussed "<u>Operation Jupiter</u>" in a sunny garden in Malaga. PB is grateful to you both for your generous offers of help. And he is in general agreement with our proposed plans. The operation, you recall, fell into three parts:

1. This, of course, is the most immediate, and in due course would lead naturally into the second part.

PB would, as a first step, appreciate your writing him and confirming your offer as follows: that <u>Jim</u> would undertake the <u>editorial part</u>, taking PB's <u>rough</u> notes and putting them into correct grammatical form, syntax, etc. Then <u>Pat</u> would <u>type</u> them; and you'd then send them to PB He would then, in due course, arrange these by subject, and {wield} them together into connected prose form.

You are both familiar with PB's method of creative writing, jotting down thoughts and inspirations on scraps of paper. These represent the raw undistilled material, yet to be refined and polished.

Following<sup>31</sup> this current batch of rough notes - a job which {if} I understood PB correctly - could take three years, then following its satisfactory conclusion a <u>further</u> assignment could be for Jim to take PB's early "immature" (his phrase!) writings and update and improve in light of Jim's knowledge of the Quest.

2. The above would overlap with or lead into the Plan #2 we discussed Labor Day - to work together on deciding what should be published and then putting it into shape for {same}.

3. The Plan #3 we discussed Labor Day - PB and I did not resolve fully. It gets into the technical arena of copyright, etc. (Riders' contracts call for option on the next

book.) But I have a feeling it would unfold when the time comes. But this is less important than seeing that the right material <u>is</u> made available to the world - through whichever channels are most appropriate at the time.

Now I realize Jim is due to retire 1 December 1976 and your plans were to retire to California. And you kindly offered to remain in the East, for closer proximity, on these assignments. There is time to think about this, but personally I feel Pat's health should take priority - and if California is more suitable, then there seems no need for these projects to interfere with your<sup>32</sup> move back to California. After all an annual trip by KTH to Calif. could be arranged almost as easily as an annual trip to Providence! And this would not really be necessary until we got involved in Plan #2. I had envisaged Plan #2 as a retirement project, originally and hopefully in about five years' time. But the economy now may necessitate my postponing retirement until I can afford to! And I've {reviewed} down possible relocation sites to two: Spain and {Arizona} (for their day sunny climates.) And the latter seems to be emerging as a stronger contender all the time.

So, in that event, Arizona and California are quite close! Anyway we can discuss this more fully on the next visit to Rhode Island.

The immediate requirement is Plan #1, and for you to write PB of your willingness to undertake this assignment. (He is concerned about drawing unduly on Pat's strength.) I forget if you have his Swiss address? Confidentially it is, and please write to him at, Bloc A, Appt. 11, Chemin De Ballallaz 14, <u>CH 1820 Montreux</u>, Switzerland.

He will then write you with detailed instructions.

Well,<sup>33</sup> things are unfolding! And I am sure they will continue to do so. And the opportunities for service will develop.
