Themed Paras - Objet D'Art

Editor's note: This short document is a collection of PB's original hand-written paras relating to his "Titled Items" theme "Objet D'art" – which has to do with items he owned, many of which had historical or occult value, and most of which were lost during the final years of his son's life. It appears Kenneth Hurst's widow sold the collection to unidentified dealer(s). All the handwriting here is PB's. The "Siamese" Buddha was given to PB by the head monk of Siam (now Thailand); PB always had it on his desk when he wrote. The large painting of Chou Tuniwas hanging in his apartment in his final years, along with an equally large painting of Confucius; both are now displayed at Wisdom's Goldenrod in Hector, New York. The Dante medallion was given to me when I was working for PB.
